



EQUATION OF TIME—ECLIPSES.

[1888.

All the calculations in this Almanac have been adapted to "Mear-Time" at St. John, except the Sun's Declination and the "Equation of Time," which are for Mean Noon, Greenwich.

"Mean Time," is that shown by a well-regulated clock, and differs from "Apparent Time," or that exhibited by a Sun-dial by what is known as "The Equation of Time." When the Sun is slow this is to be subtracted from "Mean (or Clock) Time," and when the Sun is Fast, to be added to "Mean Time" to get the "Apparent Time."

Light Houses in Bay of Fundy.

CAPE SABLE, N. S.—Revolving white light on Cape; bright 15s., dark 24s. Latitude 45d. 23m. 19s.; longitude, 65d. 37m. 11s. Octagonal white tower, 53 feet above high water. Visible 12 miles in clear weather.

CAPE SABLE, W. E.—A revolving white light, with three flashes at intervals of half a minute, then a cessation of light during a minute and a tervision at a finance, then a cossation of light during a finance and a light, making a complete revolution in three minutes. It is elevated 118 feet above high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of about 17 miles—The tower is an octagonal wooden [uilding, 98 feet high, and is painted white. The Illuminating apparatus is catoptric. Latitude N. 43d, 57m.; longitude W. 60d, 8m.

Steam Fog Whistle on southern point of Cape, elevated about 40 feet above high water, sounds in thick weather, fogs, and snow storms, a blast of ten seconds duration each minute, with an interval of fifty seconds be-

tween each blast.

SEAL ISLAND, N. S.—South point, ½ mile inland, lutitude 43d. 23m. 34s. N.; longitude, 66d. 0m. 52s. W.—Fixed white light, white octagonal tower, 98 feet above high water mark. Visible 18 miles. The Blonde Rock lies S. by W. 3½ miles from lighthouse. A fog whistle, near lighthouse, during fogs and snowstorms, sounds in each minute a blast of five seconds duration. and after an interval of five seconds, gives another blast of five seconds, with an interval of forty-five seconds.

CAPE FORCHU, N. S.—Flash white light on E. Cape, S point, latitude 43d, 47m, 28s. N. Longitude, 66d, 9m, 21s. W. Light 14 min., dark 4min. Tower, octagonal, vertical stripes, red and white. Fog whistle on W. side. Sounds in fogs and snow storms 10 seconds in every minute. Visible 18 miles.

CAPE ST. MARY, N. S.—East side of Bay, latitude N. 44d. 14m. 20s.: longitude W. 66d. 12m. 4s. Flash light, alternate red and white, at intervals of 30 seconds. White octagonal tower, 103 feet above high water mark.

BRIAR ISLAND, N. S.—N. W. point, latitude N. 44d. 14m. 57s.; longitude W. 66d. 23m. 30s. Fixed white light, visible 13 miles. Octagonal white lighthouse, 92 feet above high water mark.

Steam Fog Whistle on N. w. of Briar Island, south side of lighthouse, sounds during thick and foggy weather three blasts of 4 seconds duration, with intervals of 4 seconds between them in each minute.

BOAR'S HEAD, N. S.—50 feet from edge of cliff, on S. entrauce of Petite Passage; latitude N. 44d, 24m, 16s.; longitude W. 66d, 13m, 0s, Revolving red and white alternately, every minute. Lighthouse white, square, 70 feet above high water mark. Visible 14 niles.

POINT PRIM, N. S.—S. point of entrance to Annapolis Basin; latitude N. 44d. 41m. 17s.; longitude W. 65d. 47m. 20s. Fixed white light, visible 13 miles. Vertical red and white striped square tower, 76 feet above high water mark.

Fog Whistle on Prim Point sounds 8 seconds in each minute, making an interval of 52 seconds between each blast.

PORT WILLIAM, N. S.—Marshall Cove, South Shore, latitude N., 44d. 56m. 52s.; longitude W., 65d. 16m. 0s. Two fixed white vertical lights, visible 10 miles, 20 feet apart. White, square, 60 and 57 feet above high water, lantern on top of dwelling, lower light in bow window visible from W. S. W. round N. to E. N. E.

MARGARETVILLE, N. S.—On extremity of Point, S. Shore, latitude N., 45d. 2m. 57s.: longitude W., 65d. 40m. Two red lights, visible 8 miles Lighthouse, horizontal white and black stripes, square, visible from W. S. W. round N. to E. N. E.

BLACK ROCK, N. S.—South Shore, latitude N., 45d. 10m. 0s.; longitude W., 64d. 46m. 0s. Fixed white light, visible 12 miles. Square white lighthouse, 45 feet above high water mark.

Fog Whistle on extreme point of Cape D'Or, on the opposite side of changul from Black Packs counted in this procedure, twice in each minute conduction.

nel from Black Rock; sounds in thick weather twice in each minute, each blast being of 6 seconds duration, with intervals of 24 seconds between.

CAPE ENRAGE, N. B.—On pitch of Cape, latitude N., 45d. 55m 34s.; longitude 64d, 6m, 55s. Fixed white light, visible 15 miles. White square tower, 120 feet above high water mark.

A Steam Fog Whistle, 150 feet N. E. from lighthouse, 'sounds during thick weather four seconds in each minute; will probably be heard in calm weather 10 miles, and in stormy weather from three to five miles.

QUACO, N. B — A new Lighthouse Tower has been erected upon the pitch of the Cape at West Head, Quaco, to replace that on the rock off Quaco, Latitude N., 45d. 19m. 30s.; longitude W., 65d., 32m. 0s. It is a revolving white catoptric light, attaining its greatest brilliancy every 20 seconds. It is elevated about 110 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 10 miles from all points of approach seaward. The building is of wood, painted white, and consists of a square tower 40 feet high from its base to the vane on the lattern with lowership deadling extends.

This light, which will be a general coast light as well as a guide to St.

Martin's Harbor, is distant 1,200 feet N. W. by W. from the site of the old

lighthouse.

A Fog Bell in a framed tower on the lighthouse block strikes every 12 seconds during thick and foggy weather and snow storms. Under favorable circumstances it should be heard two or three miles, and in stormy weather or

against the wind about a nile.

A Bell Buoy was placed off Quaco Reef, in the Bay of Fundy and Province of New Brunswick. Latitude N. 45d. 10m. 5s.; longitude W. 65d 41m. 40s. The Buoy is painted black and moored in 14 fathoms water at low tide. From the Buoy the point of the reef bears N. N. W. distant ‡ mile, and the lighthouse distant ‡ mile (approximately) in the same direction.

ST. MARTIN'S HEAD FOG ALARM.—Latitude N, 45d, 29m, 10s.; longitude W., 65d, 11m, 25s. The Horn, which is located on the summit of the Head, will, during thick weather, sound blasts of 14 seconds duration, with intervals of 48 seconds between the blasts. The engine house is an oblong wooden building with a pitched roof and is painted white.

GRINDSTONE ISLAND, N. B.—On west part of island, latitude N. 45d-43s.; longitude W. 64d. 37m. Fixed bright light, visible 12 miles. White square tower 60 feet above high water.

Fog Syren N. E. of light, sounds 4 blasts every minute.

CAPE SPENCER, N. B.—On pitch of Cape, latitude N., 45d, 12m. 20s.; longitude W., 65d, 54m. 9s. Revolving red and white alternately, at intervals of 45 seconds. Visible 20 miles. White square building, with tower 207 feet above high water. Partridge Island light by compass N. W. by W. ‡ W., parthally distance being 61 miles from light to light. northerly distance being 61 miles from light to light.

PARTRIDGE ISLAND, ST. JOHN HARBOR.—Latitude N., 45d 14m. 20s.; longitude W. 66d. 3m. 20s. Fixed white light. Visible 17 miles. Tower, vertical red and white stripes. 119 feet above high water. Steam Whistle on Island sounds for 10 seconds in every minute. A Bell Buoy near east side of Partridge Island Reef.

Time for Going Through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

Time Ball.

The Time Ball on Northern Tower of the Custom House Building, will be hoisted half its elevation each day (Sundays excepted) at fifteen minutes before one o'clock. At one minute before one o'clock it will be hoisted its full length; and at one o'clock, mean time, the Ball will be dropped. A Chronometer, keeping correct G eenwich time, should then show 5h. 24m. 15s., and the difference between this and the time shown by a Chronometer, is its true error on Greenwich time at the moment. As the above hour of one o'clock, when the Ball drops, represents 5h. 24m. 15s. at Greenwich, the error of a Chronometer may be ascertained no matter where the ship is lying. Masters of vessels arriving at St. John should compare their Chronometers by the Time Ball, as it will enable them to get the sea rate, which frequently varies from harbor rates. Latitude 45d. 16m. 42s. North; Longitude in time 4h. 24m. 15s. West of Greenwich.

An order to place in a box letters belonging to another person than the owner of the box cannot be recognized, unless such letters are addressed to the care of the box or its owner.

Post Cards.—Dominion and United States, 1c. Great Britain and other Postal Union Countries, 2c. Reply Post Cards for use within the Dominion will be issued at two cents each.

Post Bands and Stamped Envelopes.—One cent post bands for newspaper or book packet wrappers, and one and three cent stamped envelopes are issued by the Department, and may be had at the stamp vendors at a trifle above their face value.

Drop Letters.—City, Carleton, and Portland, 1c. per half oz.

Mail Letters.—From one place in Canada to another, and between Canada and the United States, 3c. per half oz.; between Canada and Newfoundland, and between Canada and Great Britain, 5c. per half oz. Insufficiently paid letters to Canada, on which the first half ounce

rate of postage is fully prepaid, are forwarded, charged with double the deficient postage.

Insufficiently paid letters for or from the United States, on which a single rate of postage or more has been paid, are charged with the de-

ficient postage on delivery. Book Post. - From one place in Canada to another*; from Canada to the United States, and from Canada to Newfoundland*, 1c. per 4 oz.; from Canada to Great Britain, 1c. per 2 oz.

Limit of weight for Book Packets 5 lbs.; for the Maritime Provinces Quebec, Ontario, Manicoba, the North West, and Victoria, B. C.

Parcel Post. - From one place in Canada to another, 6c. per 4 oz., and from the Maritime Provinces and Quebec to Great Britain, 30c. per lb. or fraction of a lb. There is no parcel post with the United States or Newfoundland.

A parcel for Great Britain must not exceed 3 lbs. weight, nor be more than 2 feet long by 1 foot wide or deep. A custome declaration form, noting contents and value, must be securely affixed to the parcel with mucilage or paste.

By inland Canadian parcel post the weight of parcels is limited to 5 lbs., and the size to 2 feet by 1 foot. The rate is 6c. per 4 oz. or fraction of 4 oz. Parcels must be plainly marked "By Parcel Post."

Legal and Commercial Papers. - Legal and Commercial papers, posted for places in Canada, generally are subject to letter rate unless sent by parcel post; except deeds and insurance policies, which are allowed to go by Book Post. Postage rates on Legal and Commercial papers, addressed to Postal Union Countries, are as follows, viz.: To countries where the letter rate is 5c. per one half oz., the rate of legal and commercial papers is 5c. for the first 10 oz., and 1c. for each additional oz. or fraction, or to countries where the letter rate is 10c. per one half oz., the rate is 5c, for the first 4 oz, and 2c, for each additional 2 oz. or fraction.

exceeding 24 oz in weight, when posted in Canada for places within Canada or Newfoundland, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of one cent per 4 oz, weight, properly labelled, and put up in such a manner as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, not being actually trade patterns or samples, are not admissible as such.

Patterns and samples of merchandise, posted for places in the United States, are subject to the special rate of 10c. each, prepaid by postage

stamp, and must not exceed 8 oz. in weight.

The limit of weight to Great Britain, France, Germany, and all other countries in Europe, is eight ounces—postage, 2c. for the first 4 oz., and 1c. for every additional 2 oz.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

To any place in Canada, the United States and Postal Union Countries.

—Re-Directed letters to places within the Dominion or United States will be forwarded without any additional charge if returned promptly to the Office.

Letters sent to or received from a Country of the Postal Union, and afterwards re-directed to any place in Canada, or to a Country in the Postal Union, will be forwarded even if taken out of the Office and re-adressed; but if re-addressed to a place where there is a higher rate of postage, the difference of postage will be chargeable.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to places in Canada, Newfoundland, or the United States.—Printed and published in Canada, and posted from the office of publication, or News Agency, to actual Subscribers or News Agents in Canada, the United States and Newfoundland, resident elsewhere than at the place of publication, are FREE. Such newspapers and periodicals must be issued not less frequently than once per month.

Newspapers posted for City Delivery will not be delivered by Letter

Carriers, unless pre paid by 1c. stamp.

Transient Newspapers and Periodicals addressed to places in Canada, Newfoundland and United States.—On all Newspapers and Periodicals other than those specified above, the postage rate will be 1c. per 4 oz. in weight, which must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Newspapers and Periodicals published not less frequently than once a month and weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly, if prepaid by postage stamp one half cent each. Newspapers for the United

Kingdom must be prepaid 1c. for each 2 oz.

Newspapers and Periodicals published in the United Kingdom, and brought by mail to Canadian Booksellers or News Agents, may be re-mailed by such Booksellers or News Agents, FRES of Postage.

USEFUL BINTS.

Never send money or other articles of value through the Post Office except either by Money Order or Registered Letter.

Make complaints and inquiries in writing.

Post all letters and newspapers, etc., as early as practicable, especially when sent in large numbers.

Envelopes closed and simply clipped at the ends cannot b forwarded

by Book Post

Preserve and request correspondents to preserve envelopes of missent or delayed letters.

Business men should be careful to authorize but a limited number of persons to receive their letters, and only those in whom they have full Have a letter box on your office door.

A letter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and must be forwarded according to its direction. On no application, however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer, or

to any other person.

Letters addressed to mere initials, or ficticious names, will not be delivered, unless addressed in care of a resident, or to some box in the Post Office.

Letters containing Gold or Silver money, Jewels or precious articles, or anything liable to Customs duties, cannot be forwarded by Post to any of the Postal Union Countries except the United Scates.

MATTER WHICH CANNOT BE FORWARDED THROUGH THE POST.

Any explosive substance, glass, liquid, or other matter likely to entail risk or injury to the ordinary contents of the mails will be sent

to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa,

Spectacles and eye-glasses, if securely put in cases not likely to allow the contents to escape if broken in course of convayance, may be sent by Post within the Dominion on prepayment of parcel post rates.

REGISTERED LETTERS.

Letters intended to be Registered, when addressed to places in Canada, must be prepaid by stamp, 2c. each; to the United States, 5c. each, in addition to the postage rate. For Newfoundland, Registered Letters 2c., other articles 5c. in addition to the postage.

All letters for Registration should be posted 30 minutes before the

hour of closing Mails.

No letter will be accepted at this Office for Registration addressed either to initials or what may appear a ficticious name, and any such registered letters received from another office, or deposited in the Letter Box for Registration, will be at once sent to the Dead Letter Office for disposal.

Registered Letter Stamps of the denomination of 2 and 5cts., may

be obtained at the usual places.

MONEY ORDER SERVICE

In sending money by mail it is always best to transmit by Money Order, if possible; if sent by letter, it should always be registered.

TABLE FOR FORETELLING THE WEATHER.

This table, and the accompanying remarks, are the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will, by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom found to fail.

OBSERVATIONS.—The nearer the time of the Moon's change to noon or midnight, the more nearly will the result accord with the prediction.

The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next merning.

The Moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e., from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.





