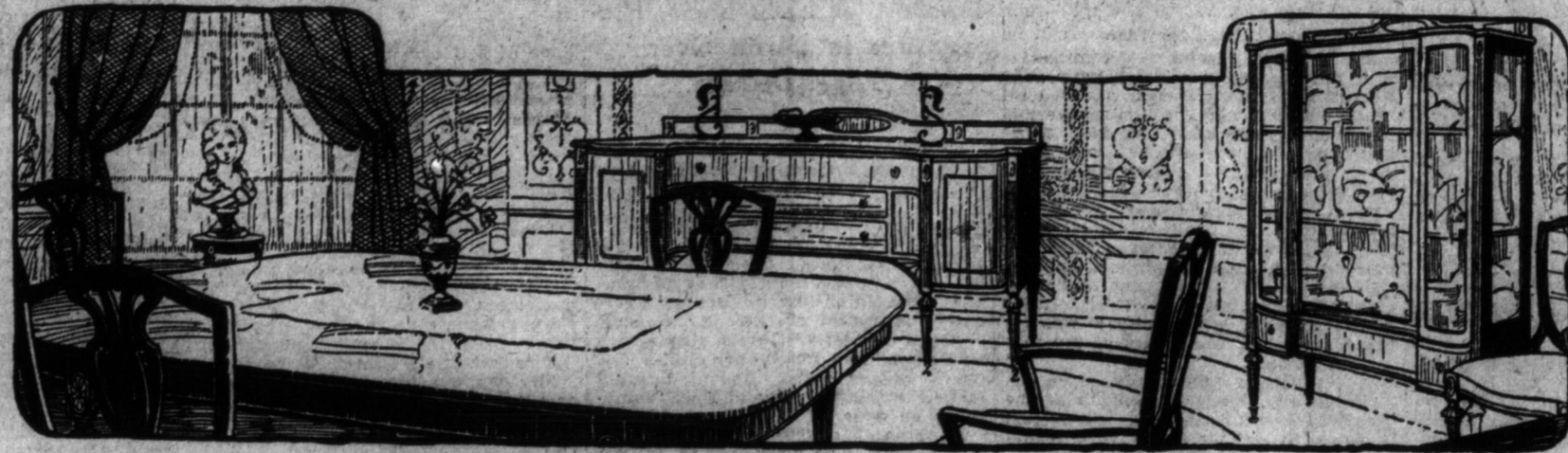

CITY MAY CUT TREES TO ENSURE FIREWOOD

Parks Committee Recommends Expenditure of \$25,000 -- Would Furnish 400 Cords.

At a meeting of the parks committee yesterday afternoon, the board of control was requested to appropriate \$25,000 to be expended in cutting down trees which would furnish good firewood. For this sum, 400 cords could be cut and stored by the city for emergency purposes.

The committee decided to recommend the purchase of 32 1/2 feet on Geneva street at a cost of \$1,225, as an improvement to Riverside Park.

NORTHWAY EMPLOYEES DID GOOD GARDEN WORK

The report on the results of their gardening efforts made by J. W. Sheather, acting as secretary for the group of employees of the John Northway & Sons, Company, in gardening is deserving of note.

One and one-half acres of land located on Kent road, East Toronto, was divided into five plots and cared for by ten employees, two to each plot. From seventeen bags of potatoes planted, one hundred and ninety-two bags of good sound crop has been harvested. Besides the potatoes there has been produced: 10 bags of carrots, 10 bushels of beets, 4 bags of Swedish turnips, 1 bushel of tomatoes, 200 heads of cabbage, 140 vegetable marrows.

The organization of resources committee will be pleased to report on the results of the work of other groups. Calculated at very moderate prices, the ten co-operators of the Northway Company have produced \$450 worth of produce--an accomplishment that helps very considerably towards the provision of foodstuffs for overseas.

OVERSEAS CHRISTMAS PARCELS.

Christmas parcels for the Canadian Expeditionary Force in France and elsewhere should be mailed in time to be despatched from Canadian ports not later than the middle of November, and as much earlier as possible. Transportation is congested during the Christmas season, and the mailing public are requested to endeavor to have all parcels posted in time to be despatched from Canada by the middle of November. The postoffice department desires that all parcels for the troops overseas shall be mailed in time this year--to permit of delivery by Christmas, and the co-operation of the public in this will be appreciated.

CANADIANS CONGRATULATED.

At a special meeting of the grand executive council of Canadian Militia Veterans the following resolution was passed: "That this council of veterans extend to General Currie, officers and men of the Canadian forces in France and Flanders, our heartfelt thanks and undying appreciation of the gallant deeds and actions performed by them while helping our allies in the defence of King and country, and in defence of those principles that make life worth living."

AIR FORCE TAKES GREAT PRECAUTIONS

As a precautionary measure against Spanish influenza, all members of the Royal Air Force in Toronto are to have their throats sprayed twice daily. The R.A.F. men were notified that they must parade every morning before starting on their day's duties, and every evening before going off parade, to have their throats sprayed by the medical officers. The new orders come into effect today.

HEAVY FINE FOR APPREHENDED MEN

Eight of the Military Service Act defaulters who were arrested by the civil section of the military police corps in a search for delinquents in West Toronto on Monday night, appeared yesterday in police court. Their punishment was a fine of \$50 each.

COAL SHORTAGE DUE TO NEGLIGENCE

Municipalities Did Not Carry Out Instructions of Provincial Administrator.

Many Ontario municipalities may get little or no coal this winter, and there is no one to blame but themselves. Some time ago 900 circulars were sent out asking each municipality to appoint a local fuel controller, but so far only 160 have responded. Coal dealers were also asked to send in statements of the business done last year, in order that the fuel administration might know in their dealings with Washington just how much coal would be needed in Ontario.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT REPORT.

Eighteen cases of smallpox, with one death, were reported from various parts of Ontario to the provincial health department during September. Six were at the Nipissing district Indian settlement. Scarlet fever showed an increase of 20 cases over September, 1917. Typhoid was prevalent in 19 municipalities, and 42 other places reported one case each.

VETERAN APPOINTED AS DISCIPLINARY AID

To aid in tightening up discipline among the members of the subordinate staff at Toronto military headquarters, Sergeant-Major Fred Hargreaves, formerly camp sergeant-major at Exhibition Camp and Borden, has been appointed for duty at the College street military offices. He is a veteran of the Chitral and South African campaigns.

TORONTO OFFICER INJURED.

Lieut.-Col. R. C. Windeyer of the adjutant's department, Toronto military headquarters, received painful injuries to his knee when he was knocked down by a motor car just outside military headquarters on College street. After attention at the base hospital he proceeded to his home.

LIEUT. IRVING FINDLEY HOME ON SICK LEAVE

Lieut. Irving Findley, M.C., 88 Admiral road, has arrived home on six months' sick leave. Lieut. Findley was severely wounded in the first German offensive on April 2. For services during the period between March 21 and April 2 he was awarded the Military Cross by General Rawlinson, the official citation in connection with the award being as follows: "On one occasion, under adverse climatic conditions, he carried out during a flight of three hours at an altitude of 900 feet, a most valuable reconnaissance. During recent operations his work in attacking enemy troops from low altitudes has been of the greatest value, and he has set a splendid example of energy and determination to all ranks of his squadron."

UNIVERSITY IS OPENED WITH GOOD ATTENDANCE

The University of Toronto opened for the new term yesterday and according to the registrar, the attendance will be up to that of the past few years. Sir Robert A. Falconer reached the city last evening and will take up his duties today, after an absence of three months overseas, where he has been acting in an advisory capacity and as lecturer at the Khaki University, England.
