Whatever the result may be, the figures will be close, and until complete official returns shall have been

The total vote for the state, so far as returned, including the Democratic stronghold of the City of Greater New York, for lieutenant-governor, is Chanler 604,234, Bruce 519,479.

Within the last few days he has looked over the ground, and he now has the survey department at work making calculations as to the relative cost and advantages of viaducts at Bloor-street and points further south, such as Howard-street and Wellesley-street.

Mr. Forman thinks that great benefit

Mr. Forman thinks that great benefit would accrue to the township, and would like to see a meeting of the township council take place for determining how much Chester would be willing to contribute towards the cost. He estimates that there would be immediate and material appreciation in the value of the township research. immediate and material appreciation in the value of the township property on Danforth-avenue.
