MEMORANDUM --- -- The Sun's Declination will be found arranged in the outer columns of the Calendar pages for each month.

We have extracted the following piece, and the other passages which are annexed to the pages of the Calendar, from the Letters of Agricola. They consist of practical directions for the more important opertions of husbandry—and at the present moment when every individual is interested in the success and diagnosment of our agriculture, they will be found, we trust, more acceptable to the public than any

other matter we could have chosen:

Analysis of Soils .- In the field to be examined, take earth a little below the surface, from four separate places, about 1 41b. avoirdapois from each. Expose it to the sun, or before the fire, till it is completely dey; and turn it over frequently that it may be well mixed together. From the heap take exactly four ounces, and pass this through a fine sieve, which will allow all the particles of sand and gravet to escape, but which will hold back stones, small fibrous toots and decayed wood. Weigh the two parts separately, and take a note of each. The stones and other bulky meterials are then to be examined apart from the roots and wood. If they are hard and rough to the touch, and scratch glass easily, they are silicions or flioty; if they are, without much difficulty, broken to pieces by the fingers, and can he scraped by a knife to powder, they are aluminous or clayey; orif, when put in a wine glass and common vinegar poured upon them, small air bubbles ascend to the top of the liquid, they are calcareous. The finely divided matter, which ran through the siere, must next undergo the test of experiment. After being weighed, egitate the whole in water, till the earth be taken up from the hottom and mechanically suspended, adding water till this effect be produced. Allow the mass then to settle for two or three minutes; and in that time the sandy particles shall have all sunk to the bottom. Pour off the water, which will then contain the clay in suspension, and the insoluble earth arising from animal and regetable decomposition. The sand should first be attended to, and if from inspection it be thought either silicious or calcareous in its nature, the requisite tests may be instantly applied .- By this time the mixture will have deposited at the bottom of the vesset the clay, and other earths, with the insoluble animal and vegetable matter. After pouring off the water, dry the sediment, and apply a strong heat by placing it on the bottom. of a pot ignited to reduess, and the animal and vegetable matter will ourn and fig off is aeriform products. The remainder lying in the bottom will be found to consist of clay, magnesia, or lime. To obtain accuracy, another 1-41b. of earth should be taken from the same heap, and the whole process gone over a second, a third or even a fourth time, that the operator may rectify any blunders. be had previously committed, and be satisfied as to the results of his experiment. He should provide himself with a pair of fine scales and a set of weights divided at least into ounces and drachms .- Although vinegar will detect time by effervescence, it does not dissolve it so effectually as the nitric or muriatic acid; small quantities of which may be procured from the druggists.

Value of Urine. - It appears, that in five months, each cow discharges urine which, when absorbed by loam, furnishes manure of the richest quality, and most durable effects, for half an acre of ground. In an experiment made by Charles Alexander, near Peebles, the dung pit which contained all the excrementitious matter of 14 cattle, as well as the litter employed in bedding them, and which was kept separate for the purpose of the experiment, only furnished during the same period 240 loads, and these, at the same rate could only manure 6 acres. which they produced, he received into a pit filled with earth and it yielded 288 loads, so that its aggregate value when compared with that of the dung, was in the ratio of 7 to 6"; and we are borne out by these premises in this extraordinary inference, that the putrescible liquor which in this province, and under the management of our farmers, is wasted and annihilated as far as regards any useful purpose, is intrinsically worth more than the dung, as an efficacious and permanent dressing; and if we take

into consideration, that this latter manure is not treated with any skill and judgment, it will not seem surprising, that the culture of white crops has never been carried here to any extent, since we have despised and neglected the only means of creating them.

Nature of Manure.—Exerementitious matter may either be the remains of animal substances only, as that of the carnivorous tribes—or of vegetables only, as that of the domestic and working cattle—of a mixture of both, as that of men, dogs, or cats. The first is the richest, the second the poorest, and the third occupies an intermediate place between the two: and the cause of this is obvious without any laboured demonstration. Flesh is clearly cirborated from vegetable food, and, as it were, contains its substance concentrated into small space, just as ardent spirit does the essence of grain. The beast of prey, therefore, that lives on flesh, must discharge a richer matter than that which is sustained solely by partial of the carnivoration and the carnivoration.

Alternate Husbandry .- The great line of demarcation between the present and old courses of cropping consists in the invariable alternation of green and white crops. The best cultivators never take from the same field two corn crops in successions but interpose between them either beans, carrots, or other green vegetables; or when the soil is a stubborn tenacious clav, and unsuited to the production of turnips, they have recourse to a summer fallow, recurring at as distant an interval as is compatible with the cleanness of the land. White crops are experienced to have an impoverishing, and green an enriching effect; and therefore the due and regular interchange of these preserves a sort of perpetual fertility, and affords every other year an opportunity of extirpating all weeds, and of subdividing and loosening the soil.

Collection of Manures.—In the English barn-yards a pit is opened, varying from two to three feet in depth, and proportioned to the size of the area; paved either at bottom with flag stones, or coated with clay—The cow-house, the pig stye, the feeding stall, the stable are all so contrived; that the urine and vegetable juices, in the separate subdivisions flow inward, and empty themselves into this excavation. It is the common receptacle of all the dung made by the cattle, of the refuse of the kitchen, of the aweepings of the barn-floor, and in short, of all the waste of the farm.

First of all, a coating of the common mould, by most of the enlightened & scientific agriculturists, is spread all along the pavement of the pit, from 9 to 15 inches deep according to the con-

venience or fancy of the operator. On this the manure is laid, as it is brought by a wheel-barrow out of the different offices and stalls. When fermentation becomes violent, and this is indicated. by the heat and strength of the vapour, the cleansing of ditches. and roads, or, in want of these, common earth, are carted often from a considerable distance, and regularly spread over the dung-The gases are thus absorbed and prevented from escaping; and recourse is had to this remedy, whenever the rapidity of the putrefactive process points out its necessity. From experience it is discovered, that the earthy materials which are thus added to the animal and vegetable substances, are impregnated with as putritive virtues as the dung itself; and that they increase the bulk and value of the manure by their whole amount. Nay, so attentive are some farmers, that they empty their dungstead twice or thrice, during summer, cart the contents to the field for which, they are destined as a dressing, and form there a new compost on

the same principles. A layer from the barnyard is first spread down in the form of an oblong square or parallelogram; above this is laid either earth, or the surface sward cut off by the spade; again, another layer of dung; and so on alternately, till it is raised to the height of 3 to 4 feet. The sides and top are then covered over with soil; and in this state a new fermentation takes place and all the gases are confined within the boundaries of the heap. In this manner the skilful occupier of land multiplies his manure, repairs the waste of decomposition, and exerts a philosophic control over the powers of fertility.

Line, as a manure—No investment of capital pays with, a more liberal return than the purchasing of lime to cumbrona, soils; and the reason of this is palpable and of satisfactory eluciadation. Their grand fault lies in their coherence, and proneness, to cake and consolidate after rains. A mixture of sand would to a certain extent rectify this defect, but lime does it more effectus.

ally; for it not only causes and multiplies interstices in the soil, rendering it loose and friable, but it imparts likewise the other beneficial effects which result from its application.

On dry and light land, from one to two hundred bushels of shells are accounted a sufficient dose; on heavy loams as much as three hundred have been used; while on clays and stiff marshes, some cultivators have gone the length of four hundred, and deemed this quantity neither dangerous nor excessive.

Limestone, during the process of burning, loses nearly one half of its specific weight—as a ton of lime stone put into the kiln diminishes to eleven cwts. when drawn from it. The shells should be removed immediately, for such is their affinity to carbonic acid, that they begin to attract it greedily from the atmosphere, and in a short time, will be nearly as heavy as at first. Neither should they be slaked, till they are carried to the field for which they are destin-

ed; as the eleven cwts. when reduced to powder, will increase to about twenty three, and from the absorption of the water, will become heavier by the whole of its weight. These calculations are founded on the data furnished by pure lime, but if there he a mixture of sand or clay in the native rock, this conclusion will be proportionably affected.

Lime should not only be laid on the surface, but intimately mixed with the soil. It is on this account, that a double preparation should take place before its mixture-it should itself be slaked and brought into a powdery state; and the land should be well pulverized. The two bodies will be then susceptible of a close and entire union among their respective particles, and will exert on each other a reciprocal influence and activity.

As an exuberant dose of lime is pernicious, so any quantity, whether great or small, is useless on poor and

exhausted land. It is an undoubted fact that when a field has been worn out by continued cropping, it is in vain to lime it for the purpose of restoring the powers of fertility. Dung, in this case, would be beneficial; but calcareous earth is hurtful and ineffective. It lies dormant in the soil, either till putrescent manure is added, or till rest and time have replenished the natural herbage, on both of which it begins quickly to operate.

On the application of lime it has been found, that the succeeding crop receives more benefit from a warm than a cold summer; that grain of all sorts is later in ripening, because from the increased action of atmospheric absorption the land is kept cool and a more vigorous growth communicated to the plants; and lastly, that wheat on timed fallows seldom appears superior, until the weather becomes

hot in June.

Directions for coming into Halifax Harbour, taken from the printed Directions in the Custom-House at Halifax. AMBRO Island and Light House is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N. and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W. From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E.; if it bears more easterly stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please. Note-The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two miles, the other W. S. W. about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water; the outermost one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E. N. E. When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chebucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger. When a breast of Chebucto Head, run N. 1 W. for the south point of George's Island. When within half a mile of George's Island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15. In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's beech, run nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off s. W. from the beach. There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point. Coming from the eastward, run for the light, and you cannot fail seeing Chebucto Head as you open Halifax harbour; the light being 4 miles distaut from the Head to the S. W. THE Falls are level (or still wafer) about three hours and an half on the Flood, and about two hours and an half on the ebb, which makes it passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the river St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by winds, and in preportion to the height of them.

#### THE HERMITAGE.

Dear was to them the Hermitage Of this unploughed, untrodden shore, Like birds all joyous from the cage, For man an eglect they lov'd it more.

The first pleasure carriage that ever came to Alesbury, brought, a couple of young adventurers from one of the seaboard towns. It was when I was a boy and I well remember running down to the old Washington tavern in the town, with my satchel over my shoulder, to see the strangers; for in those days of peace and quietness, when the name of our village was scarcely known beyond a circle of twelve miles round, it was a rare thing to see new faces. The visitors proved to be a gentleman, apparently about twenty two, and one who looked several years younger, a beautiful female, probably not more than seventeen; I was then too young to fix my attention upon the glance of a sunny eye, or the wave of a glossy ringlet; but I well remember that our village beaux said he was not handsome, and said it so anxiously that it was evident that they felt themselves in danger of a rival ; and that the little beauty was worshipped by every one of the fond mothers and rosy cheeked daughters of the village,

Nothing of their history, their parentage, their former place of residence or circumstances was known. Impertinent curiosity was, in those days, subjected to such rigid discipline whenever it appeared, by the common consent of the society of fathers, that it had its head; and a stranger had to conduct in a meritorious manner to be esteemed whatever might have been his previous The behaviour of the soung strangers was marked with so much modesty, their tempers appeared so amiable, and their whole deportment so winning, particularly that of the younger, that every tougue was soon let loose in their praise, even jealonsy became liberal, and the Innkeeper's daughter was said to have had more female visitors, during the month they remained in Wash-

ington than she had for a whole year before.

At the end of the time however, the youngest stranger prepared to depart, and the eldest whose name was Gustavus, and who had spent much of his time in travelling through the country and nounced his intention of settling in the neighbourhood. He left Alesbury, however, with his companion, and was gone three days, at the expiration of which he returned alone, and shortly after having sold his carriage and some other little effects he purchased a small island in the river containing about sixty acres, three miles below us, on which he erected a neat cottage and commenced improving it with a spirit that seemed above his years.

He was beloved, and frequent parties were made up in the neighbourhood to assist him, so that in three months he had a charming residence in the bosom of the waters, to which he gave the name of the Hermitage. Perhaps it was not miscalled, but it was a delightful place. The cottage was in the centre of the island, and invisible for the trees that surrounded it; a gushing spring rose by the door and flowed in several channels to the river, the land was naturally meadow; and Gustavus at a small expense possessed a retired but an enviable home. He appeared to enjoy it, for

he was not to be seen any more at the village; and one day his bont was discovered gliding with him in it to the western shore ; it remained there fastened to a tree three days and three nights. On the fourth day it returned and bore him to the rural retreat,

he had prepared with a young and lovely female.

A variety of conjectures followed, but there was one which seemed to be strengthened by a thousand circumstances which had not heretofore been naticed-it was that the beautiful boy who had been his companion and friend-who had loved him and left him, was in reality the personage, who came to share his home dressed in her proper garb, and claiming to the relation of a foud and fervent friend the character of a wise.

Still the custom that foreid the prying scrutiny of curiosity, and that sought no further disclosures than such as were voluntarily made, prevailed. The strangers saw it and testified their gratitude by throwing off their reserve. They lived in constant intercourse with the villagers many years. The island became one of the best cultivated places in the country; and while a large and lovely family of children grew up around them and a long residence endeared them to an extensive circle of acquaintance, the mysterious circumtances which took place at the time of their settlement were almost forgotten.

Gustavus might possibly, in the lapse of 15 or 16 years have become rich, but his object seemed constantly to be to attain simply to such an independence as would best promote his happiness.-He was industrious, frugal and managing; keeping aloof from every hazardous speculation, he was nevertheless prompt to profit by every opportunity which afforded the certainty of profit; and he denied himself none of the little delicacies and amusements of life, to save a trifling expense; he, on the other hand expended nothing

foolishly to gratify childish pride or capricious whim.

Go to the Hermitage when you would, every thing was in the neatest style, and you was sure to be entertained in the best manner-the most delicious fruit and the choicest pound cake, excellent cider, and plenty of nuts, and, what was even better than all, smiles that said as plain as smiles could say, " you are welcome," always awaited you. Thus this amiable family secured and enjoyed independence and happiness, pure and without alloy.

At length, early in the spring of the sixteenth year of his residence at the Hermitage, Gustavus took a journey to the eastward; it was the first time he had been from home any distance since his settlement among us. He remained abroad two months, and brought with him when he returned, a pale, sickly, dejected looking boy, wearing a bandage of mourning. eral of the aged villagers went down to the island to spend an af-A few days after sevternoon and an evening; and when, after tea, the little circle was formed on the green before the cottage door, Gustavus laid aside flute and thus addressed himself to the company :-

" I am about to let you into the history of a portion of my life, with which you are acquainted; this, gratitude prompted me to do long ago, but prudence forbid it: now the necessity of silence does not exist. You knew not sixteen years since, to whom you were of bearitality when my vonne friend and my

self received your welcome we have fired happy with you you know every incident of our lives since then, but you shall know more than this.

"My father was the wealthiest farmer in the country where he lived, and I was the eldest of two only sons. The parents of Mastilda were our tenants; I became attacked to her, and when I found the penalty of marriage with her was distuberitance, I chose to incur it. But persecution followed as not only from our home; it pursued as wherever we wast, antil in disguise we facted our escape hither, and lound repose where the sam of parental severity could no longer search out our retreat, I know that I only confirm your coujectures when I add, that the friend who accompanied me when I first came to Alesbary now sits beside me—it was Matilda.

"My brother inherited the family estate, worth a hand of thousand at least—he increased his wealth by marrying a woman whose money was the only attraction she possessed; and white Matilda and myself were left to set out in life with but health and radustry, he rolled in wealth. But mark the issue. He, my one fortunate brother died three months ago, a bankrupt, and brokes heared; of a disease, the foundation of which was taid by interperate habits. His estate passed into the hands of grambless, partners, and horse-jackies; and his wife absconded with a memial, and left hehind this poor child, heagared and dispraced—While i," and he raised his eyes to heaven in thankful adoration as he said it, "am happy in the possession of a virtuous wile and leating flocks "besides."

What a lesson for the proud and grasping ! How even is virtue, and all the noble, and generous, and delightful feelings of our nature sacrificed at the shrine of wealth! and how often does that wealth prove a curse to those whom it has intended to bless.

Socivizea, the Greek Robber.—From the year 1745 to 1760 the Torks were greatly annoyed on their Venetian frontier by a bandit of the name of Socivizea, who had conceived an invelorate animosity against the Ottoman race, and made them the constant and exclusive objects of his marauding enterprizes. At length pursued an every side, and anxious for a short repose, Socivizea retired with his family to Carlowitz, in the Austrian dominions where he resided three years, distinguished during the whole period for the most irreproachable conduct.

While living here in peace, he was betrayed into the hands of Turkish Pacha, who had most cruelly put to death one of his brothers, and his wife and children were soon after entrapped in the same manner. Fortune had not however, yet deserted Sacringers As the Turks were conducting him to Trannick, he contined to make his escape from them, though he had still the mostification to see his family prisoners.

When his own safety was insured, he entered into a negociation with the Pacha for the liberty of his wife and children, but in value All other methods falling he determined to write; and his letter is a curious specimen of social feeling, operating on a rogged and ardent disposition.—It was in these forms
