

The bill presented to parliament by the minister of the interior for the consolidation of the Dominion Lands Act, contains a provision that will meet with the thorough acceptance of settlers throughout western Canada. Owing to the enormous grants of agricultural lands made by the late government for the encouragement of railway construction in Manitoment of railway construction in Manitoba and the Northwest, aggregating some 32,000,000 acres in all, the odd numbered sections over the best part of the prairie provinces have been tied up until the railways selected the particular lands that they preferred. This selection has now been completed in all but the region north of Lake Winnipeg, that was reserved for the Hudson Bay Line so that there is no longer any need of tying up the odd numbered sections that remain from settlement.




