Lord Robert admitted that even the present rate of destruction, without considering the possibility of a resumption of unrestricted submarine warfare, meant a serious loss to the world's tonnage, and that consequently it could not be expected that British coal or other British facilities should be expended on ships carrying goods to blacklisted firms. The Entente Allies will increase their shipping measures, which already are proving valuable, in making the best use of available tonnage in proportion as the Germans succeed in destroying merchant ships.

The minister of war trade said that as a matter of course the Entente Allies would be favored as regards the use of tonnage, and that neutrals engaged in Entente, Allied trade, or in unsuspected neutral trade would be given the next consideration. Neutrals suspected of unneutral acts, he added, would not enjoy the usual facilities.

Lord Robert said that the answer of Great Britain to the American government's protest against the seizure of mails would be sent to Washington almost immediately, and that the reply to the American protest with regard to the blacklist imposed by the Entente Allies would follow shortly.



Larger Pensions For Our Soldiers

chairman of the board of pensions commercians, in addressing a recruiting meeting on behalf of the Trish-Canadian

night, announced some interesting figures of pensions for soldiers and dependents, for total disability, rank and file, the pension will be \$480 a year; squad commander, sergeant-major, color-sergeant or other sergeant, \$510; regimental sergeant-major, \$620; lieutenant, \$720; captain, \$1,000.

Those entitled to be awarded pensions are divided into six classes: 1st class, for total disability, 100 per cent; 2nd class, 80 per cent; 8rd class, 60 per cent; 4th class, 40 per cent; 5th class, 20 per cent; 6th class, less than 20 per cent.

To each of those up to and including the rank of lieutenant totally disabled, and in addition totally helpless, a further allowance, not exceeding \$250 a year, may be made. Those up to and including the rank of lieutenant disabled and entitled to a pension in the first three classes shall be paid, in addition to the personal pension, a special allowance of \$6 a month for each child he has.

If a member of the force is killed his widow is entitled to eighty per cent. of the full pression to be suffered to a public or until she remarries. If she marry again the pension is to be paid to her for one year afterwards, and then it ceases.

The widow is entitled to draw an allowance for the state of the s he full pension for her life, or lowance for whatever children there are up to the age of 16 for a boy and 17 for a girl. If a widower is killed in the army service each of his children is entitled to \$12 a month. A widowed

WHAT THIEPVAL MEANS IN BRITISH WAR GAME

(By the military expert of the York Times, Wednesday.)

Hardly a report reaches us from London that does not contain some reference to the position at Thiepyal and the difficulty of the British in taking it. We have read almost day after day of the capture of a line of trenches here and there about this small village of but 250 inhabitants. In fact, so many tenches have been taken or reported as taken that it seems that long since the entire section must have changed hands.

So that the situation about Thiepyal and its importance to the British advance may be seen and in order to justify the efforts the British have made to take it, it might be well to consider the elements of this now famous position.

Dutch Project Backed by Roosevelt and Others

Solicit Funds in United States - Daugh ter of Court Chaplain of the Nether-lands Tells of Her Work Among the

Under the ampices of a committee, consisting of Theodore Roosevelt, August Belmont, Horace White, E. E. Olcott, Mrs. George Biddis, Mrs. Arthur H. Lea, and a number of other prominent Americans, Miss Hindrika A. C. wan der Flier of the Harue is raising funds for a home for ibelgian children, to be known as the Holland-America Home. Belgian children whose fathers were killed in the war are to be trained and educated there, and it is proposed to found the home in Antwerp after the war. In the meantime the children are to be cared for in the different institutions and private, families where they have been for the last two years.

Miss van der Flier, who is the daughter of the court chapkain, who confirmed, crowned, and mantied the Queen of Holland, has for many years been engaged in improving the condition of the poor in her country. Since the beginning of the war she has given her entire time to relieving the sufferings of the thousands who were suddenly thrown within the nation's gates, and is now in the United States to obtain funds for carrying on the work of educating and making these unfortunate people self-supporting. She is at the McAlpin Hotel, New York, where she explained the growth and details of the plan for the home, which was started in December, 1915, with the formation of a committee consisting of Monsieur le Baron Fallon, Belgian Minister at The Hague; Dr. Frans van Cauwelker, a member of the Belgian Parliaurent, and herself. "When the war beam more than 1,-500,000 terror stricken Belgians swamped our country," said Miss van der Flier. "These desperate peopile had fied from their homes without a moment's notice, and had carried with them all sorts of strange things save what was needed—food and clothing—and we were, therefore, confronted with the colossal promlem of providing for this human flood which had fairly inundated our quiet little towns.
