In this contest the allies were bound to win, if it was only a case of matching physical loss against physical loss. So the war, if won, must be won. from the German point of view, by moral attrition. How long would the allies hold out if Germany held her own in the conquered lands of east and west and at the same time continued to keep up opoular spirits at home by physical victories where they were still to be had namely, in Servia? Observe how Major Moraht described it. On the one hand, the will to conquer is to be nurtured at home; on the other hand, the belief ir victory is to be shattered among the al-lies. With German bulletins still re-cording victories, if only over the Serv ians, with allied bulletins recording onl, deadlock, this war of endurance and "herves' is bound to turn out as favor-able for Germany as the actual test of armies has proved, when measured by the vision of England with her back against the wall somewhere around Sues and the Pyramids is just the sort of thing to keep up flagging spirits at home and to accentuate depression among the allies. Costly Experience-Could Not

Manage There

(Montreal Star. The wives of many Canadian soldiers on active service have gone to Great Bri-tain in the belief that they can live cheaper there than in the Dominion. In doing so they have ceased to be recipients' of the Patriotic Fund grant, and have found, to their cost, that living in the Old Country is much more expensive than they had supposed. The consequence is that every week soldiers' wives are returning to their Can-adian homes, and once more seeking the aid of the Patriotic Fund. In the past ten days half a dozen women, whose hus-bands are with the Canadian contingent, have returned to Montreal, reporting to Miss Reid, convenor of the Montreal Auxiliary of the Patriotic Fund, that they could not afford to live in the Brit-ish Isles, even with the government al-lowance of \$20 a month, and half the assigned pay of their husbands. These statements are borne out by the sister in the Old Country of a sol-dier's wife in Montreal. The former ad-vises the latter not to return to Scotland, owing to the cost of living. 




