

WOMAN EDITOR REFORMS A MICHIGAN VILLAGE

Following scathing criticism of the police of Chebaning, Mich. in the columns of her newspaper, Miss Blanche Ingalls has been put in charge of the Chebaning police department by the village council. The position was offered in a spirit of sarcasm. But Miss Ingalls accepted before the offer was withdrawn. For a long time Miss Ingalls had not been in sympathy with what she termed "tax law enforcement," and she threw the light of publicity on every flaw in the village government which she could uncover. Since she has been in office she has put into effect many reforms. In about six months, she says, Chebaning will be the model village of the country.

MARKED SUCCESS OF SOCIAL CENTRE WORK IN BOSTON SCHOOLS

Some Pithy Comments Which Indicate in Measure Good That Has Been Done

(Christian Science Monitor) Statistical returns show that the policy of the extended use of Boston school buildings worked out by the department of evening centers, R. E. Hawley in charge, called out a total attendance of 168,016 persons at social-educational activities in school-hours after school hours in February. The evening centers proper called out an attendance of 126,128 persons. Accommodations to school alumni, associations, parents and teachers' associations, home and school meetings, meetings of improvement societies and other associations called out an attendance of 24,678. Public travel lectures outside of the centers were given to audiences numbering 7,280. Lectures in Yiddish, Lithuanian, Armenian and Italian were attended by 8,266 persons. In all there are 129 clubs in the evening centers divided as follows: recreative, including games, folk and special dancing, athletic, knittosecure, camp fire girls and boy scouts, 81; musical, such as orchestras, bands, drum corps, mandolin, choral and mixed chorus, violin and mandolin, 161; industrial, sewing, Irish crochet and embroidery, cooking, millinery, basketry, art, 17; literary, dramatic, library, current events, 14; clubs for adults, civic, lecture and motion picture clubs, mothers and homemakers, 11; opportunity clubs, clubs for young women's civic clubs, junior city councils and debating clubs, 6; independent outside clubs, 10. The centers in Roxbury and South Boston evening centers number ten. Clubs on trial, supervised by volunteers, number sixteen. Comments on the work made by opportunity club members, showing results of the work, are as follows: "It has taken more than one gang from the streets," by member of musical club; "The opportunity clubs help me to save my money and at the same time have more pleasure than I ever had before," member of band; "We get more for what it costs than from any other appropriation I know of," citizen of East Boston; "The manager found me a good position," member of mixed chorus; "These clubs make a fellow want to do something worth while," member of junior city council; "It started me in my business," member of orchestra; "Every activity is planned so as to benefit the whole community," member of the Mothers' Club; "Nothing to do now but to stand on the street corner and wait," police officer; "The results justified the experiment. I expect a great extension of the work," Professor Munro, Harvard University; "The center is one of the institutions of our town and its discontinuance would cause a riot," editor of East Boston paper.



TO CUT LIVING COST, EAT MORE CANNED SALMON.

Washington, March 16.—To reduce the cost of living, eat more salmon, especially of the cheaper grade and less meat. This is the advice of Dr. Hugh M. Smith, federal commissioner of Fisheries in a statement commencing the important factors in favor of salmon as an article of food. He asserts that not only is salmon cheaper than meats but will keep indefinitely if unopened. "The best grades of canned salmon," said the state are richer than meats in body building materials and contain about the same amount of fats. Pink salmon, which is a cheaper grade, is better than meats for making fish and bone but has less fats. Either is as digestible as the best sirloin steak, but there is no waste and nothing has to be thrown away except the can."





The Woman's Council at its annual meeting dealt with many matters of importance. It is a representative body whose plan for action along various lines to improve social conditions should receive the respectful consideration of those in authority.

The Fleming government has succeeded in increasing very materially the debt of the province, while it has spent all the money it could lay its hands on and increased the burden upon the municipalities. How much longer will the people of the province stand for an administration of this kind?

Two thousand five hundred new settlers were landed at Halifax during the last few days. It may be hoped that they will not swell the army of the unemployed in Canadian cities, but that all of them are financially able to make a good beginning in their new home.

SOCIAL EFFECTS AND CAUSES

Because the social conditions under which men live have a tendency to make criminals, it is the duty of society to do what it can for the criminals and for the delinquents who through committing minor offenses are also numbered in the jail population. Nevertheless organizations for social betterment would commit a fatal blunder if they confined their attention to effects and ignored the causes. It is worth while to remember that in the present state of society, in the city of St. John for example, the man who has been a persistent violator of the law and a burden upon society, to whom sympathy is extended and for whom work is found, is taking the place of a man who has never been in jail and who would be very glad indeed for the sake of his family to receive sympathetic consideration and to be given something to do. Misplaced sympathy does nothing whatever to lessen the social total of human misery, and falls utterly to reach the cause by which that misery is produced. Of two organizations, one of which deals with causes and the other with effects, which should command the most sympathy and support? It is well to show some consideration for what is called the "down and out," although in the vast majority of these cases experience has shown that only in exceptional instances do the results warrant the expenditure of time, money and sympathy. What is of infinitely more importance is to make the few less dangerous for the children, from whose ranks will come in later years the wastrels and delinquents of human society.

SOCIAL ENGINEER NEEDED

A great many busy men and women in St. John at the present time are discussing social problems and means of bringing about improved conditions. This is a healthy sign, and it may be hoped they will not become discouraged in well-doing. It must have occurred to the most thoughtful among them that the greatest social need at this time is a trained community worker, who could direct movements, co-ordinate forces and get practical results. There never was a finer example of what can be accomplished in that way than is now afforded in connection with the Separation Army Metropole. Several trained men who know what they want and how to get it have organized one of the most effective combinations of citizens of various creeds that has ever been brought together to effect a common purpose. If there were in the city all the time a community leader, connected with no particular organization, but representing all of them in social work in which all are alike interested, there would be more practical work for social betterment. STANFORD PARK GREAT RECREATION CENTRE

Annual Report Shows That Chicago Place Was Well Patronized and Much Pleasure Given

The following is the annual report of Stanford Park, a public recreation centre in Chicago, for the year ended Jan. 31, 1914.
Stanford Park, formerly known as West Park No. 2, was opened to the public on February 22, 1910. The fourth official year is counted from January 1, 1913, to January 1, 1914. During those twenty months the different facilities and activities of Stanford Park were used as follows:
Total attendance, 885,184; swimming pool, open ninety days, attendance—Men, 117,692; women, 20,886; total 148,578. Outdoor gymnasium and playground—Men, 88,485; women, 97,865; children, 90,246; played, 99,860. The attendance at the athletic meets was 880. Four band concerts were given, total attendance, 15,000. During the winter the playground was flooded and used as a skating pond; attendance, 1444. Indoor gymnasium, men's registration, 1,956; attendance, 29,071; women's registration 698; attendance 18,291. The game and playground had an attendance of 16,473 and a registration of 628; shower bath attendance—Men, 94,808; women's, 57,919, total 152,727. The number of books and magazines circulated through the library was 35,583; reading attendance, 65,168. Club rooms attendance was 14,940 boys and men, 10,379 girls and women, representing an average of forty-two different children and adult clubs meeting every month. During the year 180 children and adult clubs met at the park, having a total membership of 1,768 and holding 1,608 meetings. These clubs were organized for dramatics, debating, social, pleasure, singing, athletics, military drill, literary, sewing, civic, educational, radio work, school alumni, public speaking, moral progress, cooking, musical, and charitable purposes. 

Brown said that in the United States in slavery days many well intentioned people sent clothes, Bibles, tracts and missionaries to the slaves in the south to improve their conditions. Today the people in dealing with social problems are not so well intentioned. The speaker contended that the single tax system, which would eliminate the land speculator, make vacant lands productive, and bring them within the reach of the people, providing more work and ensuring greater production, would do more than any one single reform that is projected to improve social conditions. Before Mr. Brown delivered his address, A. E. Beidling played selections on the piano, and E. A. Beidling sang a solo. Mr. Brown went to Fredericton this morning, but will return to the city on Wednesday.

HEAVY STORM ON COASTS OF ENGLAND AND FRANCE

The Swedish bark Tritolium was driven ashore on Lands End during Sunday night and Captain Olsen and four sailors were drowned. Storms all along the coast did damage to small craft and there also were several vessels wrecked in Queenstown and Liverpool harbors.

Paris, March 15—A terrific gale and the highest tide of the year tonight's made great havoc along the coasts of Normandy and Brittany. Three hundred feet of the sea wall at Graville were swept away. The damage at Dieppe was very great. Pebbles were washed in by the sea in such quantities that the River Seine was dammed-at its mouth and the valley of the river flooded for several miles.

London, Eng., March 16—Severe rain storms prevail throughout England and the country is flooded at many places. Several rivers have overflowed their banks.

At Queenstown several houses were unroofed, and the sea was so high yesterday that the Cunard liner Andania from Boston for Liverpool, was unable to land her passengers and had to proceed to Liverpool with her Queenstown pilot. The American liner Haverford was five hours late in starting from Liverpool, and did not call at Queenstown, and proceeded to Philadelphia, carrying her Liverpool pilot with her.

The cable steamer Telocita has for five days tried in vain to repair a broken cable and returned to Queenstown yesterday.

WHO BROKE IT?

Charles Diggs, business agent, commercial traveler, etc. etc, is in trouble again. This morning as he was walking along Mill street, and when he was just outside of the shoe-shine establishment conducted by Michael Mercuro there, came a crash of broken glass and a long pane in the door was broken in small pieces.

He went on to say that when the kicking extremely just grazed his coat-tails, the foot sped on and went through the window.
