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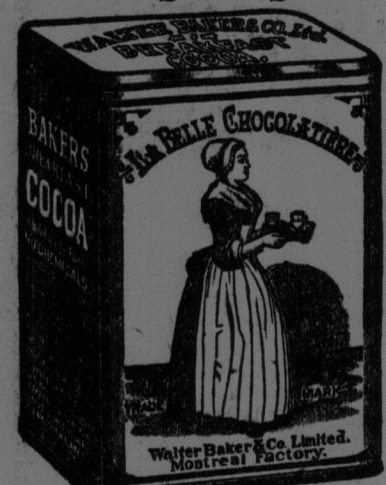

WOMAN SUCCESS IN INDUSTRY

A silk spinning factory near Marseilles founded and managed by a woman and run on model lines almost exclusively by women, has within nine years, risen to be one of the most important industrial concerns in the neighborhood.

Mme. Garnier, the owner, employs 1,000 women. There are only fifty men in the factory, and they are etokers or responsible for other work not suitable for women.

The factory was constructed according to Mme. Garnier's own plan. The machinery for silk spinning, which is her own invention, is so perfect that the country in production enables her to pay her hands more than the average wages and at the same time to compete successfully with her rivals.

WHERE IS CAPTAIN SCOTT, BRITISH EXPLORER?



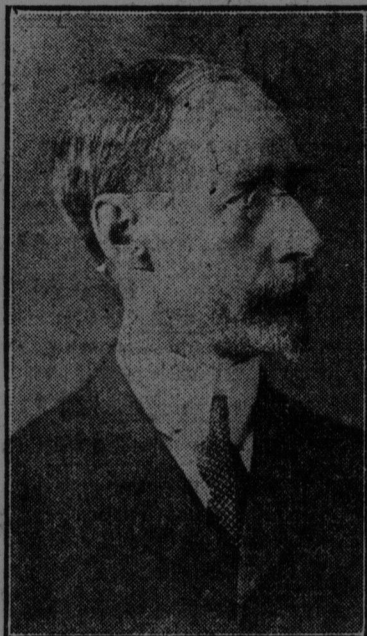

Citizens, no doubt you noticed in Saturday evening's Globe, March 23rd, a letter signed by D. Millidge, Esq., also one signed "Tax Payer" referring to the rate of \$1.88. I admire Mr. Millidge for his fairness in signing his letter. "Tax Payer" I will reply to later. Mr. Millidge feels the change I am attempting to bring about is most drastic; and, electors, I might say to break the bond that binds us to nothing less than slavery to improve and enrich a few land owners the word "drastic" is indeed mild. There are a few who, through no great personal effort on their part, have acquired a greater part of the vacant lands of our city and have shown no desire to improve the same, but are contented to lease many instances at exorbitant rates, a small piece of land where the working man may build his home; consequently the worker has to improve not his land but that of the land-owner. He builds his home and then if he wants water, sewerage, etc., he must guarantee to the city, according to law, 4 per cent. before he can have water in his house. Now, if these land owners were fairly interested in the progress of our city they would guarantee to the city the amount required and have these extensions made on their own account, putting off their properties into lots and selling them to people who would be willing to purchase, and, I might say, there are many. But not all this burden must fall practically upon the income-earner of our city. Is it any wonder, from Mr. Millidge's view point, he would say this is a little in advance of the times. The nearest thing that I know of as an illustration to suit the land owner is the policy adopted in Great Britain about six hundred years ago when they decided to release the slaves from the large estates. They placed upon their owners a tag of \$5.00 per head and in a remarkably short time the world of humanity was improved by the releasing of humanity from the bonds of slavery. Some five hundred years after, it cost the United States millions of dollars and hundreds of thousands of lives to accomplish the same object. In my opinion, the policy adopted for the freedom of slaves in England would improve the lands in our city, and that is the land tax. The land to the land owner becomes more valuable; in fact, so valuable that he must improve it or sell it to those who will improve it, thereby adding to industry and labor and giving opportunity to people to purchase ground to build a home. We have spare land enough in the city of St. John for a population of a million people and if, in reason, people could be obtained there, I believe the population today would have been upwards of two hundred thousand (200,000). I will just quote one instance of man; that has happened within the last year or two to the public, if they do not know the terrible drawback it is to our city to be placed at the mercy of the owners of these lands, where we have lost from one city a well established industry employing 200 hands. A few months ago a representative in the interest of T. S. Simms & Co. offered a piece of land at our Mars Bridge upon which to erect their new improved plant. It happened that a quarter of this piece was owned by one of these estates and it was necessary to have this quarter to give the facilities required by this Company. They approached the owner with a view of buying this quarter interest and offered the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for same. The answer to this was—"I will not sell it; I will never sell it; and when I die I will so bequeath it that it never can be sold." Drastic measures—the word is only mild. Are we as a people going to be held up forever by estates of this kind? I am asking your support, asking because I feel, if elected by a strong majority, it will be impossible for me to determine against money interests in favor of the masses I have had the honor to serve and would ask your earnest consideration in marking your ballot in the coming election to reserve one vote for F. L. Potts and the Land Tax. Respectfully, F. L. POTTS.

CARVELL MAKES STIR IN HOUSE OVER APPOINTMENT OF MORINE AS SCANDAL HUNTER

Carleton Member Quotes Men in High Places on Acts of Man Chosen by Borden -- Premier Evidently Much Perturbed -- Morine Replies

Ottawa, March 29.—To use the power of filling positions as a reward for party service and without regard to the character and capacity of the individual selected, is a gross breach of a solemn public trust. The character of a government may be judged by its appointments, said R. L. Borden in denouncing his "Halifax platform."

The commission is officially named the "Public Inquiries Commission." Its purpose is defined to be the conducting of an investigation into the department of the government extending back over the Laurier regime with a view to unearthing anything of a character to do injury to the reputation and record of the preceding administration. It was hurried into its work with a view to furnishing material for the ill-fated ministerial campaign against Hon. George F. Borden in South Ontario. But so far it has failed to furnish any "scandals" even for partisan exploitation.

The commission consists of Hon. A. B. Morine, chairman, and Messrs. Ducharme and Lake. Mr. Lake was a defeated Conservative candidate at the last election. Mr. Ducharme's record and character has been dealt with in the house by Hon. Rodolph Lemieux, and today parliament heard from F. B. Carvell, in a vigorous address, something of the career and reputation of Chairman Morine.

Mr. Carvell spoke on motion to go into supply. He opened by quoting the Halifax platform declaration of Mr. Borden and said he proposed to address himself to the premier regarding the manner in which he had kept faith with the country in respect to these pledges. He referred at once to the Morine commission and said he proposed to deal with the chairman of that commission.

Mr. Morine was minister of finance and minister of customs in the Newfoundland administration of Sir James Winter. Owing largely to the influence of Mr. Morine, the Newfoundland railway, for the construction of which R. G. Reid had been paid \$2,000,000, was turned to him for consideration of \$1,000,000.

Mr. Carvell declared that he had other matters in his hand dealing with the record of the Carleton man. He said that he had a letter from the Bishop of Newfoundland in which his lordship described the members of the Carleton government who entered the colony, and added that he was "an unmitigated rascal and a nuisance, who was expelled from the colony for dirty and infamous work."

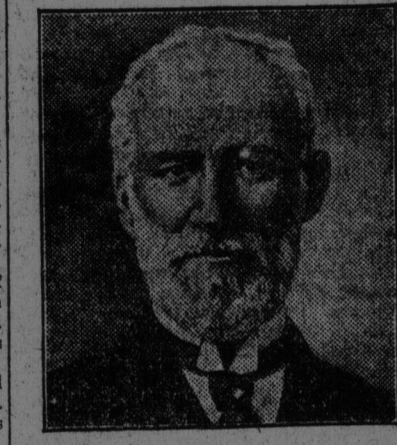

old actor, Joseph Cave, who is probably the last living player who actually appeared in the famous Richardson Square—almost the one reputable attraction that then remained in the fair.

Amongst the stretch 16th-century Smithfield as it is shown in the old prints, with the pleasant rural uplands of Pentonville and the "famous" buildings of the City of London pastimes will be going forward everywhere—bowling and archery and tilting at the ring. The whole scene will be crowded with the many-colored throng that used to make holiday there in Queen Bess's day for evergreen days.

Even by Shakespeare's time, it appears the original serious purpose of the "Bachelors" as a public entertainment has almost completely disappeared. It is now almost entirely a game for the young. Mr. Kipling will have historic authority for letting genuine merchant give place at most everywhere to booths and shows, and motley crews of tumblers, jesters, mountebanks, acrobats, mimes and merry-andrews.

Some of the horribly cruel pastimes that were prevalent in Shakespeare's time will have, of course, to be tempered with mercy. Only by a picture will be recalled the paper that two Elizabethan youths actually did make, to put a bull-dog, with its fore-paws cut off against a bull. An Offer to Socialists

Jonathan Peate, a Leeds manufacturer, offered to let the local Socialists have the use of a mill rent free if they would demonstrate the practical utility of their theories by running a manufacturing concern of their own, and a similar offer was made by Alderman George Hime, of Batley. Neither offer has been accepted.

Alderman Ben Turner, the general secretary of the Westcott and Textile Workers' Union, announced publicly that he would accept Mr. Peate's offer, "but I do not expect that I ever shall. I have no comments to make. I have made a fair offer, and it has not been accepted."

Alderman Hime told a similar story. "I met Alderman Turner the other afternoon," he said, "and I repeated with me the offer that the mill I offered him was a good one, and eminently suitable for the works of manufacturing."

"Then what are you going to do?" I asked, and he replied, "I am going to do nothing."

"I offered to give him a five years' lease on the premises immediately, but the only answer he would give was that he would consult his colleagues and see what could be done. It will all end in smoke!"

It is interesting to note that the general body of opinion among the Socialists is against the experiment being tried. Alderman John Bealmer, who has just contested the southern division of the city at the last election said that neither the offer of Mr. Peate nor that of Alderman Hime was fair. "We don't want piecemeal Socialism," he said, "and we never pretend to take any money out of the pockets of the ordinary workers, and should not have a fair chance. We are sure to be overwhelmed by the syndicates of capitalism."

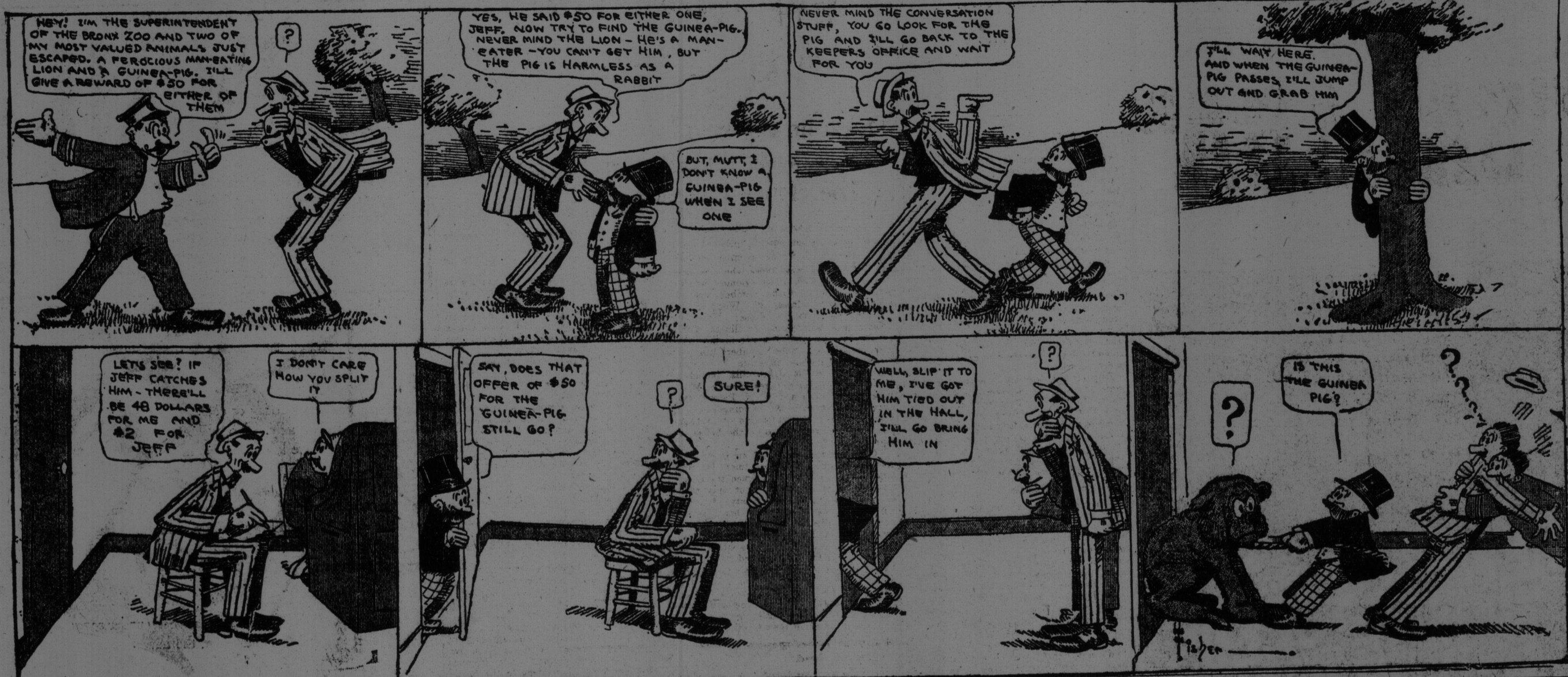



SEEN THROUGH CANADIAN'S SPECTACLES

Regina Man's Views on Progress and Problems of England and Continent—The Labor Unrest

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, March 19—An important Canadian visitor who is now staying in London is J. H. Haslam of the Haslam Land and Investment Company of Regina, who is here on a visit, combining business and pleasure. He and Mrs. Haslam, made a tour of many of the chief capitals of Europe, visiting among other places, Portugal, Madeira, Algeria, Spain, Italy and France.

Mr. Haslam's father was born in Ireland; Mrs. Haslam is descended from a distinguished Huguenot family from Lyons, France. During their visit they have derived much pleasure and revived many old associations by visiting the places connected with their parents' early life.

Mr. Haslam, in chatting over his recent tour, said to your representative: "What impressed me most during the trip was the wonderful progress that is being made in all directions of human effort by the Latin races. This was particularly noticeable in France and Italy. The last century seems to have been peculiarly the time of the Anglo-Saxon race while the first half of this century appears to be the time of the Latin races. Both as regards progress in mechanics, commercial pursuits, and philosophical research, they appear to have taken the lead."

"What has been accomplished in Italy during the last forty or fifty years is simply marvelous. They have built out of a number of scattered principalities and kingdoms a great nation which has become one of the powers of Europe. I was told by our British ambassador in Rome that some of the finest and largest warships in the world are now being completed in Italy."

"France, on the other hand, is somewhat restless under the perpetual dread of German invasion, and what the French nation consider the 'bulldozing' attitude of Germany, and they have made up their minds to prepare against such a possible emergency. The general feeling, so far as I have been able to ascertain in Paris, is that eventually there must be either another war between France and Germany, or else some far-reaching readjustment of ideas."

While in Rome Mr. Haslam had the honor of an audience with the Pope, and in England he has met and been entertained by distinguished people, including Lord Grey (late Governor General of Canada), Lord Haldane, (the war secretary), Winston Churchill (First Lord of the Admiralty) and W. T. Stead, (editor of the "Review of Reviews.")

Mr. Haslam said that he would like to see a rejuvenation and revivifying of the Royal Colonial Institute. He would like to see its name and purpose changed, and a great expansion of its work on more democratic lines. He also believed that the name "colonial" was repugnant to a great many people. Speaking on the question of business generally he said:

"Business for the time being is very much paralyzed on account of the coal strike which is now pervading England from end to end. The results of this strike will be, in an informed, more far-reaching than is generally supposed. To a Canadian it demonstrates particularly how poor and how completely the industries of the country depend on the coal mines. The struggle is more than a mere contest of strength between the coal owners and miners; it is a general demonstration of the labor cause in England. The miners, owing to their peculiar position, are very thoroughly organized, and have greater strength and unity than any other trades' organization. They have pretty plainly hinted that they will have no 'take-it-or-leave-it' American term, meaning something written into a contract, which in effect may tend to destroy the purpose of the contract—in the settlement of their dispute."

In conclusion Mr. Haslam said he believed that there was a great work to do in western Canada; a work that was being done unconsciously and perhaps totally unobserved on the part of the majority of people. That was the process of assimilating and embracing into the agricultural, industrial and commercial fields of western Canada, the peoples from different nations and countries. The work of assimilation was a trying one, and to make its operation more efficient and complete they wanted not only Englishmen and their capital, but the English's best. The money was needed badly enough to carry on successfully Canada's great operations, but a greater need was that of the men and their families.

The central station at Frankfurt, which had heretofore held the record for size among the railway terminals in Germany, must now give place to the station at Leipzig which has just been completed. This station has been building for the last nine years and it has cost \$34,000,000, an outlay represented not so much by ornament and decoration as by enormous size for the accommodation of freight as well as passenger traffic.

A Governor's Testimony

Gov. Johnson, of California, in a recent speech said:—

"In the beginning I was not an ardent advocate of equal suffrage, but I thought it should be left with the people. I insisted, without taking any side, that if a large proportion of the people wanted the question submitted to them, it was their right to have it."

"We have had three municipal elections given by women who happened to be present in California since the woman suffrage amendment was adopted. In the bitter contest in Los Angeles the women registered in many districts in a greater proportion than the men, and they voted in a greater proportion than the men, and they voted quite as intelligently as the men. One judge, who presided at an election, told me that there were four men who asked instructions as to how to vote in the Los Angeles election, and he said that in each case these instructions were given by women who happened to be present."

A Good Yield of Eggs

(Hartland Observer)

Kenneth Drake of Avondale, writes to the Observer that he has a flock of forty-two hens. In the month of December they produced one egg less than seventeen dozen. In January they laid thirty-six dozen and five, while in February if they had laid one more egg they would have completely filled a forty-nine dozen case. Thus from the prolific flock Mr. Drake harvested 102 dozens and three eggs, during the three coldest months of the year.
