THOUSANDS OF POLICE ALONG LINE

Protective Measures for Coronation Parade Now Completed

WATCH OUT FOR CROOKS

More Than 900 Detectives Besides the 20,000 Uniformed Troops—Premier and the Veto Bill—The Burial of Lafayette

(Canadian Press)

London, May 15—The police arrangements for the coronation are practically completed. For the next six weeks no member of the force will get a leave of absence. On coronation day, besides the troops, there will be 20,000 uniformed police along the line of parade. They will be drawn strictly from the Metropolitan area and no man will be from the provinces.

There will be more than 900 plain clothes men from Scotland Yard, in command of Chief Supt. Frost, who has organized a special branch to deal with American and continental crooks.

The Daily News makes the important announcement this morning that the premier feels certain the veto bill will be carried, with a concession or compromise, during the next few weeks, or the longest in a few months. It would be most convenient for the peers to pass the bill before the coronation.

"At the same time," continues the News, "if they are obstinate it may be well to let the coronation take place before bringing in the prerogative. The affair will be cleared up finally in good time for the King's Indian tent."

The actor of Lafayette the Great, a ravelle actor, who was burned to death in the Empire Palace Theatre in Edinburgh, was interred yesterday in a vault in Pier Hill cemetery there. The urn was placed between the arms of the actor's dog Beauty, the body of which lay in an oak coffin lined with lead. A rabbit objected to conducting the funeral ceremony because the man was buried with the dog. The services in the vault were read by an Anglican clergyman.

It is by no means certain that the necessary facilities for the further progress of the woman's suffrage bill during the present session of parliament will be refused by the government.

Although Mr. Arnold is naturally reluctant to do anything toward facilitating the progress of the bill, it is thought that he may recognize the tactical advantage of passing it on to the House of Lords where it would in all probability be rejected.

By that means the active hostility of the militant women suffragettes to the government would be deflected from the government and turned on the lords.

LONGBOAT AND SHRUBB

Toronto, May 15—(Canadian Press)—Tom Longboat appears to have regained his old time form. His recent races have been run in remarkably fast time.

The Indian, who has hitherto declined to race Shrubbs ten miles, now says that he will meet the Englishman any time or place Shrubbs has always maintained that he could not run over ten or twelve miles and do himself justice. Some local club may match the pair.

POSITION OF THE ANGLICAN CHURCH SET OUT

Mixed Marriages Deprecated But Valid When Duly Solemnized is Decision of House of Bishops

(Canadian Press) Toronto, May 15—Mixed marriages are to be deprecated as they deprive husbands and wives of that mutual help, which the one should be to the other in life. Nevertheless we emphatically assert the validity of such marriages when duly solemnized.

This decision of the House of Bishops of the Anglican Church of Canada is expressed in a letter which is being sent to every Anglican clergyman in Canada and to be read in the churches next Sunday.

NEW EMPEROR WAS MARRIED TO BRIDE SEVEN YEARS OLD

Menelik Succeeded on Throne of Abyssinia by Grandson

Addis Ababa, Abyssinia, May 15—Princess Lidj Jessem, grand daughter of Emperor Menelik, was proclaimed Empress of Abyssinia yesterday. The coronation ceremonies will take place later.

Prince Lidj Jessem was proclaimed heir on May 13, 1908, when he was thirteen years of age. Two days before, he had been married to Princess Romana Onok, the seven year old grand daughter of the late Emperor John and the niece of Emperor Taitu. At the same time Ras Tseama, who had taken over the affairs of the empire, because of incapacity of Emperor Menelik, was appointed guardian of the heir apparent. The regent died on April 13 last.

Menelik was born in 1844 and has long been in ill health. Several times during the last two years there have been reports of his death, but always followed by official denials.

MAY BE DOROTHY ARNOLD

Body Found in East River—Brother Not Sure of Identity

New York, May 15—(Canadian Press)—The body of a woman, which was discovered in the East River this morning, was identified as that of Dorothy Arnold, a sister of the late Senator John Arnold, who has been missing since December 12. He said it might be that of his sister though he could not be sure. The body is fat decomposed.

JURY OF MEN SAID SKIRT DID NOT FIT; VERDICT FOR DAMAGES

Spokane, Wash., May 15—When a dozen men, good and true, sitting as a jury in Judge William E. Hunter's department of the Spokane county superior court, said in a verdict that the skirt of a \$75 suit bought for Helen Spangenberg by Madison Campbell, did not fit, a precedent was established in western Washington.

The jurors also awarded damages to the extent of \$75 to the plaintiff and held the modiste for the costs of the trial, a matter of more than \$1000. Miss Spangenberg donned the offending garment several times during the hearing, while a score of tailors, dressers and employees of suit houses testified for and against the defendant. Appreciating the fact that the skirt was not a fit, Judge Hunter cautioned the latter not to discuss the testimony outside the court room.

RESUME HEARING ON THE RECIPROcity BILL

Washington, May 15—(Canadian Press)—The senate finance committee resumed the hearing on the Canadian reciprocity bill today, and later when the senate met it was to continue the deadlock effort to elect a successor to Senator Fry as president of the meeting of the ways and means committee of the house today by drafting the revised tariff schedule on wool which has been submitted to the Democratic caucus for ratification. The house was not in session today.

PRISONERS TRY TO END LIVES ON TRAIN

Toronto, May 15—(Canadian Press)—Avery McLean and Beattie Smith, arrested in this city last Thursday, yesterday endeavored to commit suicide as the train upon which they were passengers in one of the defective pulled into the outskirts of Philadelphia where they were being taken to answer charges of stealing \$2000 worth of jewelry.

The girl had concealed a package of cyanide of potassium in her hair and attempted to swallow it when Detective Ulrich knocked it away from her hair. Her companion attempted to take the package but was prevented.

Seize Smelting Plant

Cobalt, Ont., May 15—(Canadian Press)—Searching a little house in Galbraith street, in the French quarter, where Clay Montell lived, police seized a smelting plant to reduce his high grade ore into little nuggets found in his trunk when arrested in Toronto on Saturday. With it was discovered about 300 pounds of silver worth about \$2500.

The police believe that Montell has been acting as a "fence," and that he has disposed of thousands of dollars in ore.

KAISER IN LONDON FOR UNVEILING OF VICTORIA MEMORIAL STATUE



The winged figure of Victory which surmounts the Queen Victoria Memorial in London, to be unveiled tomorrow, the late queen whom it commemorates, and the Emperor of Germany, who will take part in the dedication ceremonies. This memorial is said to be one of the most wonderful structures of its kind in the world, and has been more than nine years in building.

ATTEMPT TO BRIBE OFFICERS

Alleged Scheme to Undermine Power of Mexican Rebel Leader Fails—Peace Go-Between is Ordered From Juarez

Juarez, May 15—Notification from Provisional President Madero yesterday that the Mexican rebels, who are in possession of the city of Juarez, had agreed to a general peace, led to the belief that the military chiefs of Madero to desert his standard.

General Pascual Orozco said last night that while no definite sum had been offered him, it had been strongly intimated that he should abandon Madero and would not be sorry to do so.

Senator Obregon was a candidate for president at the last election on the anti-revolution ticket against Madero; and this split the vote against Diaz. His party as a whole sided with Madero in the revolution, but Senator Obregon has been acting as go-between on behalf of the government.

Orozco is once more in full favor with Madero and the provisional president has recovered his ascendancy over all the men composing the revolutionists. Obregon denials any attempt at bribery.

Mexico City, May 15—Cherishing the faint hope that the quarrel between Madero and Orozco would result disastrously for the rebel forces and thus relieve the government of the necessity of facing a crisis, President Diaz and his cabinet had decided to await the developments of another twenty-four hours before altering their policy.

Following the meeting of the cabinet minister De la Barra said that it had been decided to await developments at Juarez. Speaking for himself the minister manifested some more his optimism. He declared he believed that the unofficial effort toward a resumption of negotiations for peace would yet prevail.

Mrs. Taft is Better

New York, May 15—(Canadian Press)—Mrs. Taft, who was taken ill yesterday, is better this morning and it was said that President Taft would be able to return to Washington today. Her illness was said to be a recurrence of the nervous trouble from which she suffered two years ago, but in a less severe form.

PEOPLE OF NOTE

Time Gallery of Men and Women of Prominence

Staff Sergeant T. S. Bayles, Officer of the Royal Grenadiers, Toronto, and a veteran Bayley man who is on the team this year for the seventeenth time. He has been doing remarkably good shooting at the Long Branch ranges, and with his experience and ability it would not surprise his Toronto comrades if the German royal guests are here for a week's visit to King George.

Though the Festival of Borneo, with its beautiful decorated Crystal Palace; its gigantic operatic performances by the imperial German troops; and the magnificent pageants with which it will be celebrated, will extend over a longer length of time—the main feature of interest will be the unveiling of the great Victoria Memorial.

Those who view the coronation ceremony from a marvellous standpoint, have fostered the impression that to see the King and Queen would be an easy matter during the festivities of the coronation season. Such is not the case. Except for the royal presence at the dedication ceremonies, and on four other occasions during the summer, the throngs of sightseers will have to content themselves with the provisions made for their entertainment by the committee in charge of the different functions.

The dedication ceremonies will take place next in the Royal Albert Hall, where the great monument to the late queen will be set up. The unveiling of the statue of Victoria, done in bronze, will precede the opening of the hall and the queen; then will follow many more baroque scenes, bearing the Prime Minister, members of the cabinet, dukes, duchesses, members of Parliament, and a host of other notables.

The unveiling of the monument a great platform has been erected, and it is here that the actual ceremonies attendant upon the dedication will take place.

After the dedication ceremonies are over, the royal family, together with their guests of honor, the Kaiser, Kaiserin, and their daughter, Princess Victoria Louise, will repair to the palace where a dinner will be given in their honor. This will probably be followed by a royal entertainment, which will include among its guests prominent Germans who make their home in London, including the members of the German embassy.

The monument itself is one of the most striking structures ever undertaken by man, and has consumed a period of building commensurate with its magnitude. Nine years ago the scheme for this memorial to the late Queen was set on foot by King Edward. Tomorrow, when the king, surrounded by most of his court, together with the Kaiser and Kaiserin and their daughter, give the official word, the great structure of gleaming marble rising eighty feet in the air and surmounted by a twelve-foot figure of Victory, will be dedicated to the public for the first time since its completion.

THE CHURCH AND STATE IN PORTUGAL

Pope Condemns Separation Law, Says Newspaper, But Withholds Official Statement Till Deree Date

(Canadian Press) Lisbon, May 15—A Lisbon newspaper says that, according to a communication from the Vatican, the Pope has concluded an examination of the separation law and absolutely condemns it, but as it is not to be enforced until July 1 he will await that date before expressing his opinion officially, in the hope that in the interim the unwavering opposition of the Portuguese government to the law and their refusal to alter some of its most stringent clauses, especially concerning interference by the government with the clergy's canonical rights which wholly appertain to the church.

It is reported that in view of the actual decree being enforced many churches will be closed and the priesthood will be deprived of all property and reduced to poverty. However, it is well known in official circles that the government desire to avoid a rupture with the Holy See as that would tend to aggravate hostility on the part of the section of the country which is almost wholly Catholic, especially in the north, against the government in the forthcoming elections.

HE TURNED THE POWER INTO SELF

Ontario Workmen Gets Fearful Electric Force Through Body

(Canadian Press) Brantford, Ont., May 15—Albert Yeop is suffering from a shock sustained on Saturday in Freelon, where he was working on the Hydro-Electric power line.

In turning on a switch he got the full strength of 110,000 volts, knocking him from a fifteen foot ladder. When picked up he was partly conscious but soon recovered sufficiently to be brought here. His hands are badly burned and gold fillings were taken out of his teeth as if by magic.

DISASTERS OF DAY

Four Trainers Die After Collision in Fog in Vermont—Several Deaths Follow in Fight After Murder by Negro in the South

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White River Jet, Vt., May 15—(Canadian Press)—Four trainers were killed and three seriously injured when two freight trains met head-on two miles south of here in a heavy fog on Sunday. The wreckage caught fire and the bodies were badly burned.

The dead were R. T. Webber, of Ware, Mass., driver; Ralph H. Fairman, Brantford, Mass.; and James H. Livingston, of Greenfield, Mass., a brakeman on the Boston & Maine train which was northbound to this point, and Roy Kendall of Brantford, Vt., brakeman of the Central Vermont train southbound to Springfield.

Montgomery, Ala., May 15—Two negroes were dead and one mortally wounded and four deputy sheriffs are wounded, one fatally, as the result of a murder committed by one of the negroes yesterday twenty-one miles south of here on the Mobile road, and a spectacular battle that followed an effort to capture the murderers.

REFUSES PLAGE IN HENLEY EIGHT

Trouble Among Crew of the Ottawa Rowing Club; Kill Leaves

Ottawa, May 15—What is looked upon as a serious split in the Henley eight of the Ottawa Rowing Club developed this morning in the open refusal of Martin Kilt, to turn out with the crew or go to Henley.

Kilt has been absent from the workouts for some time and it has been known that trouble was coming. He slept at the clubhouse with the other members of the crew last night and this morning was given his last chance to turn out by the committee. He refused and J. O'Donoghue is given his place in the shell.

MINISTERS' MEETING

Methodist Clergymen Endorse Rev. Dr. Flanders' Sermon—The District Conference

At the meeting of the Methodist clergymen this morning a resolution was passed expressing approval of the sermon pronounced in the sermon of Rev. C. F. Flanders in Centenary Methodist church last night.

June 7 and 8 were selected as the dates for the annual district conference in this city, and which will consider the divisibility of church union among the Methodists, Congregational and Presbyterian churches. The evening of the seventh was set apart for the discussion on union. On account of the small attendance, there was no meeting of the Baptist clergymen today.

ONTARIO TAKING HEALTH PRECAUTIONS

Toronto, May 15—(Canadian Press)—The provincial board of health has issued regulations providing for a supply of pure and wholesome drinking water by hotels, restaurants, railway trains, and depots, boats and other public places. Regulations are also issued respecting sanitary precautions in health and summer resorts, and on vessels plying on the inland waters of the province, providing against the deposit of garbage, vegetable or animal matter or fish in any inland water.

PREMIER SIFTON SEES A BUMPER WHEAT CROP

Toronto, May 15—(Canadian Press)—Hon. Arthur L. Sifton, Premier of Alberta, is in Toronto en route to England to the coronation. He spoke enthusiastically of the prospects for a bumper wheat crop in the west.

MR. BORDEN FINDS HIMSELF IN FIX

The West on One Hand, The Moneyed Protection, Men on The Other—What Shall He Choose?

It is decidedly interesting, on what may prove to be the eve of a general election, to have Mr. Borden going to the prairies for a three weeks' tour. Life would be much easier for the opposition leader if the prairies did not exist or had no voting population. He could then, without much trouble, yield to the insistent demands of the "High as a Man" tariffites, and go in for protection of the good old sort, which is what they want.

If Mr. Borden's leadership fails to receive the support it perhaps ought to in fundamental conservative circles, it is precisely because he is hard headed enough to refuse to definitely abandon the west to the Liberals. He knows very well that to declare openly for a return to the ideals which ruled when Mr. Foster was finance minister would be equivalent to throwing the west over. Refusing to do so, he has been allowed to perceive, and it is impossible for him to command the full support of his partisans and will probably, before long, cost him his position; it will be for Conservatives of later years to decide whether he was right or wrong.

His difficulties are increased by the fact that he must meet the west at a time when his action at Ottawa must appear to the grain growers to be a surrender to the high tariffs. At Ottawa he is telling the west it cannot be allowed their intention to denounce their campaign. Will he tell them at Brandon, at Edmonton, at Weyburn, at Yorkton, that they cannot have these advantages? That he will not let them? He must, if he sticks to his guns. He must, if he means to enter the general elections with, as the Toronto boast has it, the weight of money on his side.

If he does, he loses the west. If he doesn't he loses the money, for the men with the money are making no secret of their intention to denounce their campaign. It is rather a tight corner for Mr. Borden to be in, and he isn't especially agile in such circumstances.

REV. WM. LAWSON AT THE EVERY DAY CLUB

NORTH END FIRE



DOGGING THE ISSUE

The Hon. J. K. Fleming has turned up at Lakeville, Carleton county, with a new Valley Railway story. 

A road was opened up for Sir Wilfrid to his car but he was not allowed to get there. Not a bit! He had gone half way the road was blocked and the crowd surrounded the premier with outstretched hands.

Sir Wilfrid did his best to rise to the occasion, but no mortal could have shaken everybody's hand. Sir Wilfrid's arm was going like a pump-handle. Then, in a few minutes, but many had to be satisfied with a nod and a smile.

IN THE CHURCHES
The Marriage Decree—Observance of Mothers' Day in St. John Yesterday

Rev. C. R. Flinders, D. D., pastor of Centenary church, delivered on Sunday evening a strong address on the Roman Catholic marriage decree of the Roman Catholic church. He took for his text "What, therefore, God hath joined together, let no man put asunder." He took the ground that the action of the church was contrary to the law of God and the land, and urged Protestants to show the Roman Catholic church her place in a British country and also to secure the enactment of a federal marriage law. He referred sympathetically to the stand of the church in the divorce evil and pointed out what he said was inconsistency in "her priests being and exhorting their people to secure separation for causes Christ did not and would not sanction."
He went on to state that if the Catholic church were to be welcomed throughout the dominion she must be loyal to the king and institutions, and true to the flag and the law. He urged that all Protestants should unite to demand justice.
Rev. F. A. Stevens, representing the China Inland mission, occupied the pulpit of St. Stephen's Presbyterian church yesterday morning. In the afternoon he addressed the Sunday school of German street Baptist church and in the evening addressed the Trinity church (Wednesday evening and Centenary church Thursday evening).
The closing of the special series of sermons in the Exmouth street Methodist church, under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., was marked last evening by a very large attendance. The church capacity was taxed and extra seats had to be brought in. A male choir of thirty voices rendered the vocal numbers with fine effect while the Every Day Club orchestra played four selections in magnificent tone. Rev. W. W. Brewer preached an able sermon. His subject was taken from Psalm 144, verse 12. It was a sermon distinctly for young women and was listened to with intense interest. The collection was very large and the offering was donated to the Y. M. C. A. funds.
In several of the city pulpits yesterday reference was made to the observance of "Mother's Day" and many people wore white or red flowers in tribute of respect to mother.
In Victoria street Baptist church, a special Mother's Day service was held in the morning when Rev. B. F. Nobles preached on "Christian Motherhood," S. Williams sang a solo. In the Congregational church the day was specially observed. Rev. Mr. Tucker preached.
Rev. Father Conroy, in the Mission church, Pandave Row, last night discussed the ne temere decree and referred to a pastoral letter of the Bishop of Fredericton wherein the effects of the decree are commented upon.

The following yachts have already taken to the water: Louisa, Grace M., Amigo, Ahmoek, Avis, Villain, Canada, Water Witch, Rama, Thanao, Viking, Vagabond, and Wingene, while several others are quite prepared to be launched. All the boats will be in summer quarters by May 24, although no cruise has been definitely arranged for that date. Aside from several motor boats, it is not known that many new craft will sail the Kennebec this year, and the most of the boats will be the same owners as last year. Dr. H. C. Wetmore, however, will have a fine new yacht, which is clearly ready to be launched, and S. B. Bustin will take his motor boat, the Valkyrie.

Several additions have been made to the strength of the St. John Power Boat Club, and a great number of the craft are in the water with the first strokes to be given them this week. Many of the boats have changed owners. The number at anchor in the river this summer will be much larger than heretofore. The club has had a very successful season since its organization last year, and its members are anticipating many pleasant cruises for the coming summer.

WAITING FOR MR. FLEMMING TO GIVE INFORMATION

The Latest Turn in St. John Valley Railway Affairs—Provincial Secretary Says he Has Company

Speaking at Jakesville on Saturday night, Hon. Mr. Flemming stated that a company was prepared to construct the St. John Valley Railway, as part of a trunk line from Quebec to St. John, as soon as the federal government agreed to grant a subsidy of \$6,400 per mile. Mr. Flemming did not give any hint as to who the party composing the company were, but said the contract would be signed and entered into within three months after the granting of the subsidy. He added that "every day's delay" was at the door of the federal government. The Times wired its Ottawa correspondent this morning relative to this matter, and received the following reply: "Hon. Mr. Pugsley stated, when speaking regarding the application for a subsidy by the company of the St. John, that he was awaiting information as to the proposed route before recommending to the government approval of the application."
