OR FEMALE HOUSE OF REFUGE.

January 1st, 1867.

Again we present to our friends and the public our Annual Report, with the hope that they will find in its details enough to satisfy them that this Institution is deserving of their most hearty support. And with deep and heart-felt gratitude to the Great Disposer of all events, who has not only permitted us to work during the year now closed, as a Committee, with undiminished numbers and with unanimity of feeling and purpose in this portion of His vineyard, but has blessed the work, and in the midst of much discouragement and disappointment has given us to see, in the persistent and steady improvement of a goodly number of this unfortunate class—who in the opinion of not a few persons are *utterly hopeless*—the fruits of our labours.

What a depth of woe and desolation is in these two words, *utterly hopeless*. Do we grasp the full meaning of them when we utter them? Do we realize that the *end* must be *eternal death*? We fear not, else we who are professing Christians would labour more continuously, more earnestly, and above all more prayerfully for the reformation of these poor outcasts than we now do. The magnitude of the evil appals us—the number of the victims overwhelms us; and a sight of the wretchedness, the misery, the degradation, and great waywardness of these poor creatures is apt to make us despair of doing anything towards lifting them out of this great depth of sin and sorrow; forgetting that He who desires us to labour has promised to be with us, and that He is the Mighty to save—yea, even to the uttermost.

Of those sent out to service during the past year, about half continue to give satisfaction to their employers. Of those sent out in 1865, *five* are known to us as doing well; and of those in 1864, it is ascertained that *four* are hopefully reclaimed. Besides these, instances are every now and then brought to our knowledge of some one who looks back to the time spent in the Magdalene Asylum with great thankfulness, as the turning point in her life. One of these, a woman, met a former matron in the country last summer, made herself known to her, took her to her home, and entertained her most hospitably. She was married, and very comfortably settled on a farm. The two restored to their friends were both quite young—under twenty years of age. The two who went to the States were middle aged women, who after passing the prescribed time in the Refuge, remained a few months in the situations got for them, and then, with the wages earned, left to join their friends. We have always a large number who either insist on leaving before their time is up, or who run off. These are restless minds, who cannot bear the restraints necessarily imposed on them, and rush back to their wicked courses. Those dismissed were incorrigibly lazy, very foul in their language, and insubordinate. Among the thirty-one remaining are several young girls between fifteen and nineteen, whose behaviour is such as to warrant the belief that they are being reformed, not only in morals, but that a *real and saving* change of heart is taking place. One middle-aged woman, who for years was well known to the police, after remaining the stipulated time (twelve months), begged to be allowed to remain another year, not wishing to leave, she said, till she was quite sure there was no danger of her returning to any of her former bad practices. She is still in the Institution, although the two years are up, and is one of the most indefatigable workers in it.

We have also to mention several most pleasing and gratifying instances of gratitude on the part of some who were formerly inmates. One sent two donations of five dollars, and two and a dollars respectively. Another sent three dollars, being part of the first money she earned: while a third sent three dollars, to purchase a shawl for a young daughter, who also had been an inmate.

The average number in the Institution at a time, during the past year, was twenty-nine.

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We are frequently met with the questions, "Do you really think you are doing any good?" "Do they not, after all the trouble and expense, just break out again?" To the first question we answer emphatically, Yes. We not only *do think* we are doing good; we *know* we are. To the latter we say, No. *All* do not return to their evil courses. A large proportion do; but the Report of this and former years show conclusively that some have really been reclaimed, and are now living as respectable members of society. The long period of twelve months which we insist on each one spending in the Institution; the freedom from stimulants; the regular and industrious habits required from all during that time—these alone have a beneficial effect, so much so, that even the outward appearance is so much changed, that it is difficult to recognize them as the same who a few months previously applied for admission. Then the regular religious services on the Lord's-day; the Bible Class, on the Tuesday evening; besides family worship morning and evening, must have a tendency to soften their hearts, and lead them to long to be once more respectable members of society. Our present matrons, too, are such as readily inspire respect on the part of the inmates; and taking as they do a deep interest in the well-being of the Institution, foster and try to strengthen every step towards improvement.

Every year we feel more and more strongly how necessary to the proper and efficient working of such an Institution is accommodation beyond what we have. We have about four acres of land, and have thus room for two separate and distinct dwellings, and with such accommodation could carry out a system of classification, which is utterly impossible under one roof. But the want of funds has hitherto been an insuperable barrier to this most desirable end. Our expenses are necessarily considerable, and we have not as yet been able to do more than simply keep our present building in good repair, and build an addition.

There is a class of women we are not able to assist at all, and of whom a large proportion might be saved—at least that is the experience in London, England—we mean young women who have in the first instance, perhaps, been shamefully deceived, or taken advantage of. By and by they find themselves thrown on

the world with an infant, with no means of support, and the door of every respectable home closed against them; and this alone frequently drives them on the street. This class we cannot receive with our present accommodation. But looking back on the liberality hitherto extended to us, may we not hope that means also for this most desirable end will be provided.

The large sum of \$808 64 has been realized by the work of the inmates during the past year. Family washing, plain sewing, and embroidery continue to be done at the Institution, on reasonable terms.

The testimony of those friends (both clerical and lay) who unweariedly attend to the religious services is very gratifying. They speak of the earnest attention paid to these services; and the good selection of passages from the Scriptures and hymns made by some of the inmates themselves, for the exercises in the Bible Class. Our thanks are heartily given to these friends. May they, while feeding others, be abundantly fed themselves.

Our thanks are also due to the Directors of the Bible and Tract Societies, for a liberal donation of Bibles and Hymn Books. This enables us to give to each girl, as she leaves us for service, a Bible.

To Dr. Robinson, our kind and attentive Medical Officer, we offer our sincere thanks; and to Mr. Cumberland, Manager of the Northern Railway, for a quantity of cordwood, at a reduced rate. To Mr. Severn, Yorkville, the thanks of the Committee are also due, for his liberality in furnishing the Asylum with a supply of pure water.
