## Railway Accidents in Canada Show Marked Increase For Year of 1923

Ottaws, March 11-A marked increase in the number of railway accidcommissioners, tabled by the Minister of Railways in the House of Commons yesterday. There were 3,187, compared with 2,588 in 1922. Last year 295 were killed and 3,597 injured, compared with 248 killed and 2,886 injured in 1922. Fifteen passengers were killed in 1923, an increase of ten and 558 injured, an increase of 182. Employes killed last year totalled 122, an increase of 39, and 2,542 injured, an increase of 458. Others killed totalled 158, an increase of three, and 497 injured, an increase of 101.

David Lawson, of Collins Street, Fairville, Leaves 51 Descendants.

David Lawson, a respected residen of Fairville, died at his home in Collins street, Fairville, at two o'clock this morning at the advanced age of 97 years.
