





R E P O R T.

THE Council of the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, in presenting their Report, have much pleasure in announcing a very satisfactory decrease in the number of offences coming within the especial province of the Society, and may be regarded as the legitimate fruit of the workings of the organization.

It is a source of regret that many cases of cruelty, more or less public, still occur of which the Society is not cognizant, but, when it is remembered that its means enable it to employ only one Inspector to do the entire patrol work of this large City, it need cause no surprise that some of these cases escape the notice and action of the Society. An occasional letter to a newspaper, mentioning one of these occurrences, is often the only notice the Council receives, and that perhaps some time afterwards, when it is too late to investigate the matter and trace out the culprit. A timely letter to the "Secretary" or "Inspector of the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals," Toronto, stating the circumstance, and giving if possible, the names of the offending parties, will ensure the most prompt attention.

Among the many beneficent influences arising from the efforts to prevent cruelty to animals, the Council are gratified to report a great improvement in the condition of laboring horses, among which formerly were frequently observed sore backs and galled shoulders, now the interests of owners and the sympathies of drivers have been enlisted through the Society's influence and education, and consequently cases of this nature are now extremely rare.

In the transportation of fowls, calves, sheep and lambs to market, the Society have succeeded by persuasion and legal measures, in effecting important changes for the better. Instead of being conveyed for miles with legs tied tightly together and in many cases piled on the top of each other, as was the general case before the organization of this Society, they are now con-

veyed in racks and open boxes, with LEGS UNTIED, thereby preventing much unnecessary suffering to the birds and animals, besides, at the same time improving their quality and condition when converted into articles of food.

In many cases the persons chargeable with cruelty to dumb brutes, are transgressors more through ignorance or thoughtlessness than from indifference or deliberate intention to abuse. In all such cases the Inspector remonstrates, and in doing so he has very rarely met with obstruction, and seldom has to enforce his request. When necessary a summons is promptly issued, and he endeavours to secure proper punishment of the offender in order to deter him from any subsequent acts of cruelty.

In the absence of any law limiting the number of passengers to be conveyed in public vehicles, this Council have found it impossible to prevent the overloading of street cars, particularly as in no instance of appeal to the public has any effort been manifested to aid the Society in abating the evil. In any case of injury to a horse through overloading, the Society can interfere, not otherwise. The Council would express the hope that the public will speedily awaken to the importance of this matter. A little thoughtfulness and some self-denial on their part, together with a little more accommodation at busy hours on the part of the proprietors of the Street Railway Co., will lesson this particular evil very greatly.

During the summer of 1877 the destruction of dogs impounded by the City Corporation was superintended to a great extent by the Inspector of this Society. The animals were deprived of life without pain by suffocation with fumes of charcoal. During the summer of 1878 the same attention was given to this matter and similar measures carried out.

The Council regrets that their finances have not permitted them to issue pamphlets and other publications which would be the means of extending the usefulness of the Society. They have however purchased from American Societies for distribution gratuitously as many as their means would allow. During this year it is hoped that the commercial prosperity of the country will be revived, and they hope to be able to do more in this respect.

There is much pleasure in announcing the creation of a Branch of this Society at Woodstock, Ont. A list of its office

bearers and a detail of its work will be found affixed to this report.

The Society hopes to be able to extend its good work in this manner through the Province, and the Council will be glad to assist in the formation of other Branches. The Secretary will be glad to give any information necessary, and correspondence on the subject is desired.

The operations of the Society have been restricted in a very great manner by the want of sufficient funds to carry out its work, but when all things are considered the Council cannot but feel grateful that they have been able to accomplish so much. They desire to express their sincere thanks to the subscribers by whose timely and kind aid they have been able to carry on the important work of the Society, and on behalf of helpless suffering animals, appeal for more extended sympathy and support.

The thanks of the Society are tendered to the Royal Society, London, England, for copies of the *Animal World*; the Massachusetts Society, Boston, for copies of *Our Dumb Animals*, both of which have been received regularly; and to the American Society, for copies of their pamphlets, forms, etc. The Council also begs to acknowledge receipt of annual reports from very many of the Sister Societies, and notes with pleasure the increasing influence of the work in which they are actively engaged.

The compliments received from the Press are also gratefully acknowledged, as having been of great service to the Society.

The policy of the Society has been one of *prevention* rather than one of *prosecution*, the Council seeing the great necessity for educating the public rather than punishing. In many cities in the United States, "Ladies Auxiliary Societies" have been formed with marked success. The Council of the Society trust that ere long, such an assistance as this will be given to them which will enable them to extend the teachings of the Society further than they are at present able to reach.

The operations of the Society are limited through want of sufficient money to enable them to be more fully carried out, and the Council would respectfully urge from the citizens a more liberal support.

This Branch has been fully organized since 23rd Nov., 1878. during which time it has interfered in 134 cases of cruelty to animals, 121 of which were towards horses. In most of these cases remonstrance has been used to good effect. The Branch is self-supporting, and progressing favourably. Its inception and success are largely due to the exertions of Miss M. L. N. Cottle, who has entered into the necessities of such an organization with a zeal and energy that has drawn to her assistance a large and influential committee who are working with discretion and earnestness in the prosecution of the good work of protecting dumb animals from acts of cruelty.

INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

TORONTO, ONTARIO.

*To the President and Council of the Ontario Society for the
Prevention of Cruelty to Animals :—*

GENTLEMEN,—

I beg respectfully to present to you my Report to December, 1878, and to call your attention to the recommendations it contains, which I think calculated to increase the usefulness of the Society, and to advance it in public estimation.

Poor Starved and Worn-out Horses.—Perhaps the most urgent class of cases I have to deal with are those of poor, starved, and worn-out horses, which are being continually pressed upon my attention by the public, and I accordingly interfere. I proceed in all cases first to remonstrate with drivers and owners, and as they seldom refuse their names and addresses no immediate arrests take place. In the majority of cases, however, remonstrance effects all that is desirable, better feeding and care being given to some of the animals, and those beyond all cure are destroyed.

It is highly necessary at all times to groom horses thoroughly, but at no time more so than in the summer season, and making such a careful inspection of harness as will at once induce the removal of parts that unduly press or chafe an animal. The dust and perspiration of the animals added to the friction of badly fitting harness produce the scalding, and eventually the sore backs and shoulders.

Working Horses with Sore Shoulders—In most of these cases I find that remonstrance on the spot and afterwards visiting the horses, etc., in their stables mitigates the evil practice, so that only in exceptionally cruel and hard cases I am compelled to prosecute. An intelligent public will see the wisdom of prevention by remonstrance being carried to its utmost extent, and not hastily draw the conclusion that the Society is slow and comparatively useless because its Inspector is not found daily prosecuting in the Police Court.

Street Railway Car Horses.—The treatment the street car horses receive has been the subject of much comment, and many persons blame the Society for what they call inattention to this matter on the part of the Inspector. I am fully aware of the difficulties of the

position, and would point out as a remedy that the Car Company should furnish a third horse or leader at the grades between Gerrard and Gloucester streets on Yonge street, and at the valley between Caremout street and Trinity College on Queen street between the hours of 5 and 7 p.m. daily. The horses of this Company are groomed, fed, and rested sufficiently, and if these facts were more generally known they would constitute strong arguments against cruelty.

Another matter should be considered and attended to in a cold climate. Horses should be covered when left standing—much cruelty is inflicted in such cases by want of thought and carelessness. This evil is much aggravated in the case of clipped horses, which cruel practice in such a climate as this is unnecessary.

Overloading—Many cases of overloading have occurred, in which remonstrances and a threat of prosecution have been effectual; some, however, have been brought into Court.

I feel it a duty before concluding my Report to return my very sincere thanks to the officers and privates of the Police Force for the numerous instances in which they have rendered me assistance, and given promptly valuable information. Indeed, I can scarcely do justice to them in this brief Report, because I feel without it my services would have been rendered of vastly less value to the Society and the public.

I must also thank many of the citizens for information and assistance, and while urging upon the public the necessity for a more general support to be granted to the Society in the way of prompt and accurate information to the Inspector of cases of cruelty, and a willingness to give evidence in support of such cases, I would ask them to remember that our guiding principle is *prevention*, which I am happy to say is effectual in the majority of cases, and I should indeed be sorry to see the reverse the case, that is when nothing could be effected but by active and continued prosecutions.
