Why tax eggs?

A good instance of the injustice of the A good instance to the injustice of the present system of taxing food is furnished by the egg market. There is a duty of three cents a dozen on eggs, presumably to help the Canadian hen to overcome the severe climate that shute off her winter severe climate that shute off her winter activities. In Montreal, this week, there was agitation because strictly fresh eggs were being sold around 60-cents a dozen, with the probability they would go up to 75 cents before the winter was over.

In reply to public clamor, the leading egg brokers teck stock of the position and issued a statement. This showed that there were only 31,796 cases of eggs in storage at Montreal; that the average consumption for Montreal was 7,000 cases a west, and that the first Canadian supplies of eggs sould not be expected until March 1st next. That is, the present supply will be exthausted under normal conditions by the first of January, and between that date and March 1st, every egg eaten in Montreal will have to be imported, probably from the Southern States, where the milder climate encourages cheap egg production.
