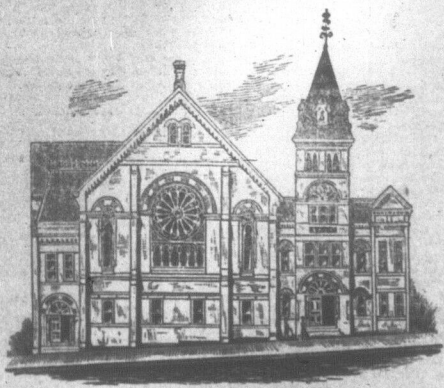

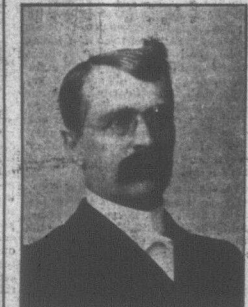

THE S. S. TEACHER'S WEEK-DAY VISITATION.

THEIR IMPORTANCE AND POSSIBILITIES.

An eminent Christian worker has said: "The builder for a century was for eternity. The painter painted for a generation; we forever. The sculptor cuts out the marble that soon perishes; let us try to cut the likeness of Christ, to endure forever and ever. A hundred thousand men were employed in Egypt to construct a pyramidal tomb for a dead king; let us feel that we are engaged in a far nobler work constructing temples for the living God."

In the 2nd place I believe it important, because in this way the teacher gains a knowledge of the week-day surroundings and associations of her pupils, which is a very important part of the information that a teacher needs. The influence amid which the pupil lives during the week are going to form a much more important part in the formation of his character than the teachings of the S. S. teacher for half an hour each Sabbath, if the teacher does not know or understand these influences that she may cooperate with or conquer them. A teacher needs to be "where the pupil is" and to be familiar with the conditions under which he is living.

The 4th reason, and the most important of all, is that Jesus Christ our great example and living head, the greatest Teacher that the world has ever known, but with whom we are co-laborers, made his visitation important by himself presenting it and thus bridge us up to our possibilities. Listen! Do you remember two disciples walking by the way in sadness and despondency being joined by one whom they knew not, but they recognized him as he talked to them by the way? And yet the difficulty was not removed, but the Teacher saw that there was a possibility of its being removed if he paid them a visit, and so he went, and broke bread with them and they knew their risen Lord. He recognized the possibility of teaching them through that little visit, the great cardinal principle, on which the faith of the Christian church rests—"The Lord is risen indeed."
