## GREATEST OPPOSITION CONVENTION ON RECORD RE-ELECTS MURRAY AS LEADER AND ADOPTS FOUNDATION OF PARTY'S FUTURE PLATFORM

### HON. JAMES A. MURRAY RE-ELECTED LEADER AMID HEARTIEST OF ENTHUSIASM

His Election by a Practically Unanimous Vote Was the Signal for a Tremendous Demonstration in His Honor.

#### CONVENTION SHOWS FAITH IN LEADER

The Outburst of Enthusiasm and Confidence Augurs Return of Trusted Leader to Power at First Opportunity Given.

With only a few dissenting voices from the St. John district Hon. J. A. Murray was re-elected leader of the Opposition at the big convention here yesterday, amid scenes of enthusiasm, the like of which has not been witnessed in a political gathering in St. John for many years. His election by a practically unanimous vote was

the signal for a tremendous demonstration in his honor; an outburst of enthusiasm and confidence which augurs the return of the trusted leader to power as soon as the government takes its fate in its hands and gives the people a chance to pass judgment upon its acts.

In addition to testifying its faith and confidence in its leader, the convention laid the foundation of a broad platform, which is well designed to build up the fortunes of the party, and the progress and prosperity of the Province. It also laid the foundation of a Province-wide organization, and ordered the appointment of organizers to assist in carrying on the work of the party, and rallying its forces for the conflict whenever it comes.

The Convention was a success in every way. In spite of the great storm, which prevented the coming of many who had planned to be present, there was a large and representative attendance of delegates from all sections of the Province, and all were full of confidence and enthusiasm, convinced from their knowledge of the constituencies that public opinion is setting strongly against the government, and determined to give the Opposition a leader and a platform which would enlist the support of the electors, and enable it, when it is swept into power on the flood-tide of indignation at the incompetence and deception of the present regime, to give the Province a government able and commissioned to resist the development of its resources and promote the welfare of its people. Keen attention was given to the work of formulating a platform; new planks, notably those dealing with the development of our water powers

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### New Planks In Platform Adopted By Provincial Opposition Party

- 1.—The Opposition Party, when returned to power, pledges itself to the appointment of a practical farmer as Minister of Agriculture.
- 2.—In the opinion of this Convention it is neither necessary nor desirable that the Government of the Province should be entrusted to any single class of the population, but we recognize that in the past the important agricultural interest of the Province has not been adequately represented either in the House or Government, and we therefore recommend the Convention's of the party for the selection of candidates in each rural community to choose as representatives as large a number as possible of practical farmers.
- 3.—This convention recommends that the Opposition Party when returned to power, secure information scientifically collected, as to the water-powers of the Province, which are suitable for development with a view to encourage their utilization and to discouraging their retention by speculators.
- 4.—That in the opinion of this Convention, school books should be supplied free by the Government to all public school pupils.
- 5.—This Convention recommends that Labor shall be represented on Opposition tickets wherever possible, and that if this party is returned to power, it will establish a department of labor, with a minister in charge, without increasing the present number of ministers.
- 6.—That all general and bye-elections be held on Mondays to allow commercial travelers and fishermen opportunity to exercise their franchise without unduly interfering with their business.
- 7.—That upon a vacancy occurring in the Legislative Assembly, the bye-election to fill such vacancy shall be held within sixty days thereafter.
- 8.—That the Opposition Party if returned to power, pledges itself to give preference in appointments to men who have served overseas in the theatre of war.
- 9.—That the local Opposition Party when returned to power, pledges itself to establish schools of technical education, and to introduce technical education in all public schools, so far as possible.
- 10.—That as certain speeches have been pronounced by some people, having a tendency to wish to suppress the free use of the French language in this Province, and as those speeches are detrimental to the good relations which must exist between the citizens of the same Province—Be it resolved that this Convention affirms that the policy of the Opposition Party in this Province lies in freedom of speech, freedom of language, and mutual respect, and that it therefore expresses its disapprobation of all speeches or writings which have a tendency to create discord between the two great races of this Province.
- 11.—That this Convention approves of a road policy by which the bye-roads will be put in condition and maintained in proportion to the trunk road system.
- 12.—That the local Opposition Party when returned to power pledges itself to revise our mining laws with a view to securing needed and much greater development of the mineral resources of this Province.

### RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT EMBODIED MAIN CLAUSES OF IMPORTANCE TO PROVINCE

Each Clause Given a Thorough Discussion and Adopted or Rejected as Great Delegation Deemed Best—The Importance of the Rural Sections Recognized and Their Welfare Provided for—Water Power Privileges Receive Thorough Consideration and Debate—Dept. of Labor An Essential Plank.

J. L. Stewart, chairman, presented at the afternoon session the report of the committee on resolutions, each clause being adopted or amended when read. The various resolutions embodied in this report were as shown elsewhere in this paper, and form the new or revised planks in the party platform.

On the cause advocating the selection of farmers as candidates, B. F. Smith spoke briefly on the growth of the Farmers' movement, as evidenced by the results in Ontario. Farmers as a class may have in the past entertained an opinion that in administrative affairs they are not enjoying the representation their importance warrants. We have had too much class legislation in the past, but if the farmers, as we know them today, will broaden their platform, I am sure we will welcome their advent.

Labor is seeking higher wages and shorter hours—farmers want better prices. The claims of both may be unreasonable, but, if so, there must surely be a middle ground on which we can agree. I admit that we need legal men in our legislature to look after our legal affairs, but I would like to see more of our farmers there. For too many years this province has been controlled by a group, and I believe that the influence of lumbermen exerted in former years should give place to that of wider interests.

Hubert M. Rive submitted in amendment a more extended resolution on the same lines.

Mr. Agar saw no real reason for either this resolution or amendment. The farmer voters of New Brunswick now have the authority and power to

### KING REQUESTS ABSENCE OF ARMISTICE DAY

Urges That All Activities Cease for Two Minutes on Tuesday, Nov. 11th, in Recognition of 1st Anniversary of Cessation of Hostilities.

#### MESSAGE RECEIVED BY GOV. GENERAL

Expected That All Loyal Subjects of King Will Observe This Request Insofar as Possible to Do So.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 6.—A complete suspension of all normal activities for a period of two minutes on Tuesday, November 11, the first anniversary of Armistice Day is the desire of His Majesty, King George, as expressed in a cable from Lord Milner, secretary of state for the colonies, to His Excellency the Governor General. The message which was read in the House of Commons tonight by Sir George Foster, acting Prime Minister, follows:

"London, November 4, 1919. I am commanded by His Majesty the King to send you for immediate publication the following message which is addressed to all the peoples of the Empire:

"To All My People, Tuesday next, November 11, is the first anniversary of the Armistice which stayed the world-wide carnage of the four preceding years, and marked the victory of right and freedom. I believe that my people in every part of the Empire fervently wish to perpetuate the memory of that great deliverance and of those who laid down their lives to achieve it.

"To afford an opportunity for the universal expression of this feeling it is my desire and hope that the hour when the armistice came into force, the 11th hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month there may be for the brief space of two minutes a complete suspension of all our normal activities. During that time except in the rare cases when work suspended by the armistice is of such a nature as to be impracticable, all work and all sound and all locomotion should cease so that in perfect stillness the thoughts of every one may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious dead.

"No elaborate organization appears to be necessary. At a given signal which can easily be arranged to suit the circumstances of each locality, I believe that we shall all gladly interrupt our business and pleasure whatever it may be, and unite in this simple service of silence and remembrance.

"GEORGE R. I."

"This will be published in the press here tomorrow morning. Arrangements are being made for the general observance of the two minutes' silence at eleven o'clock on Tuesday. Trains will be stopped on the railways, traffic on the streets, ships as far as possible at sea and every effort will be made to get work suspended everywhere, in schools, shops, mines, and factories and to ensure complete silence.

"His Majesty hopes that your ministers may be willing to arrange for a similar observance, impracticable, owing to distance that the ceremony should synchronize throughout the Empire. It is therefore suggested that eleven A. M. local time, should be adopted everywhere.

"Similar messages are being sent to India, and to every Dominion and colony in the Empire.

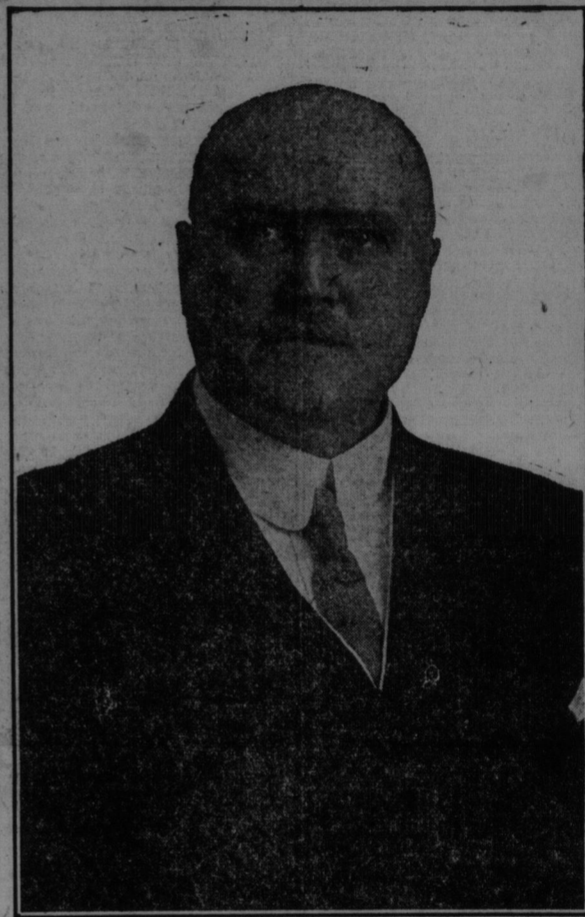
### FORTY-EIGHT HOUR WEEK ADOPTED BY CONFERENCE

#### Canadian Labor Representative and Gompers Only Two Voting Against Its Adoption.

Washington, Nov. 6.—The forty-eight hour week was finally adopted by the International Labor Conference here today after a five-hour fight for the passage of the resolution. The vote was 55 to 2. The two recorded votes against the motion for adoption were Mr. Draper, Canadian workers' delegate, and Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor. The working week, however, is to be governed by the exigencies of the different plants and industries, and agreements for longer working hours may be made where employees and operators find it necessary and employees willingly enter into such agreement.

### ADDITIONAL GRATUITIES FOR RETURNED MEN AGAIN BROUGHT TO ATTENTION OF PARLIAMENT

Clear Cut Intimation That Unionist Gov't Will Not "Carry on" Should the House Impose Upon it the Burden of Providing Additional Gratuities Came from Hon. J. A. Calder.

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—Another clear-cut intimation that the Unionist government will not carry on should the House impose upon it the burden of providing additional gratuities for returned men, came from Hon. J. A. Calder, chairman of the special soldiers' committee, in parliament tonight.

The minister, after remarking that it was only fair and proper that the government should state to the House its policy, and to take a definite stand on questions involving large expenditures, said that the members should vote as they saw fit. But, he added, the point was that if the members signified their disapproval of the government's stand by voting down its policy, "then another government would have to carry on."

The majority of the members heard from today appear to favor Major Andrews' amendment to the motion for the adoption of the report of the committee. This would substitute the G. W. V. A. plan for the committee's proposals. They did not all indicate how they would vote, however, the number of government members who have expressed themselves, combined with uncertainty as to what the attitude of the opposition members will be, was clearly causing anxiety around the corridors of parliament tonight.

Mr. Levi Thompson, Liberal-Democrat, who spoke during the afternoon, disagreed with Mr. Calder's view that the government should resign in the event of an adverse vote. He said if it did so it would be contrary to the wishes of its supporters. He thought there had been too many threats of this kind, including the one made in connection with the question of knight-hoods.

Members who criticized the report and thought the returned men should receive more favorable treatment, included J. H. Burnham, W. P. MacLean, W. K. Baldwin, W. F. Coakley, O. Turgeon, Major Power and Thomas Foster (East York).

Appeals to the Opposition to Organize for the Future Along Lines That Will Command Respect of the Province.

#### ADDRESS BRISTLED WITH EFFECTIVENESS

With Vigor and Eloquence He Assailed the Maladministration of the Gov't, and Carried the Convention by Storm.

Almost immediately after the opening of the second session of the local Opposition Convention yesterday afternoon, Hon. J. A. Murray was heard in one of the most effective addresses which he has yet made. It was a scathing criticism of the methods of the Foster-Veniot Government and an appeal to the members of the Opposition Party to organize for the future along lines of policy which will command the respect of the entire Province. His address, brief in point of time, fairly bristled with effective points against the present incompetent administration, and the vigor and eloquence with which he spoke literally carried the Convention off its feet. Mr. Murray was given a tremendous ovation. On the conclusion of his address the convention settled down to consideration of the Committee reports which were the next order of business.

Dr. O. B. Price moved, that in view of the fact that leadership of the party has been a matter of discussion for some time, the present leader be given opportunity to present to this convention and message to the assembly. This was seconded and heartily adopted.

Hon. Mr. Murray was given a very enthusiastic reception, and when the applause which greeted his appearance had subsided, broke at once into a telling review of the record of the Foster government and a summary of the situation as it exists today from the viewpoint of the Opposition. The question of leadership he would deal with before concluding his address. Mr. Murray pointed out first of all that the present government poses as the original pure, honest, promise-keeping administration, but the record of that party proves conclusively that pre-election pledges have been ignored and that honest methods have been relegated to the background. Last December this government gave to us an official authorized statement of provincial finances which showed a surplus of more than thirty thousand dollars on the year's operations. That document was false for when our party press challenged that statement, when a hurry call was sent for help, when auditors applied to the accounts methods similar to those applied to our accounts, that alleged surplus was turned into a deficit of one hundred and forty thousand. And then this alleged financial statement was amended in a manful manner, by the addition of a supplement, which in numerous instances, contradicted the statements originally made, and further confounded the issue. Had the methods adopted by this government been applied to our affairs, their criticism of our work would have fallen to the ground. But their hypocrisy, their dishonesty and their scheming to throw discredit on us would not permit fair play. Their accounts are doctored, to accounts receivable are added the values of stock on hand, but we were not given the benefit of any such treatment. We were accused of over-expenditure and extravagance. In the public works department the over-expenditure was more than four hundred thousand, charged to capital account. And we have nothing to show for it. The Foster party held up their hands in holy horror at the thought of direct taxation but under the guise of patriotism this same party has imposed direct taxation in its worst form. Instead of assessing the people of this province for four hundred thousand dollars for the Patriotic Fund, as requested, they added to this amount one hundred and eighteen thousand dollars for their own purposes. And they have collected this money unjustly and dishonestly, and expended it not for patriotic and war purposes, but in road material, in wages, and in other ways. Then this same crowd who so deprecated direct taxation passed an act whereby anyone who buys a ticket to a theatre or picture house must pay to the provincial treasury. This has been allowed to

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**"RED" HAND IN URGING STRIKES  
SHOWN AS \$10,000 BAIL IS FIXED  
FOR 7 HELD IN EAST SIDE PLOT**

**Communists Arranged "Police Massacre" for Rutgers Square Meeting Next Saturday in Retaliation for Anti-Parade Order, Say Detectives of Bomb Squad.**

New York, Nov. 4.—Two Russians, arrested Saturday afternoon on the lower east side on charges of criminal anarchy in connection with what the police call a "red" plot for an outbreak next Saturday, were held in \$10,000 bail yesterday by Chief Magistrate McAdoo in Tombs Court. The two men, Maurice S. Nessim, of No. 170 Essex street, proprietor of a printing shop at No. 235 Eldridge street, where he had been arrested along with a ton of "red" literature, and Benjamin Topack, who keeps a printing shop at No. 102 First street, both want to be examined on their bail.

The circulars which led to the arrest of the men called for a mass meeting of the Communist Soviet Party in Rutgers square. "Friends" had been warned not to take children to the Saturday gathering "because there might be trouble."

Archibald B. Stevenson, counsel for the Lusk Legislative Committee investigating Bolsheviki propaganda, represented the Attorney General, and Irving E. Klein, of Frankers, acted for Nessim and Topack. Detective Sergeant James J. Gagan, in charge of the bomb squad, and his men also were present about the courtroom hoping that in connection with the affair next Saturday would appear.

Mr. Stevenson explained that the Communist party was the left wing of the Socialist party and that its manifesto is "the overthrow of the government by unlawful means." "These means are to consist of massed strikes for the purpose of seizing the power of the government," he said.

Detectives declared that among the mass of "red" literature taken to Police Headquarters on Saturday was a vast quantity of "strategic propaganda." Every strike started within the last six months down to the coal strike of only a few days ago is represented in the pamphlets.

One circular called for an election boycott, advising American citizens not to vote next Tuesday because the Board of Elections would not allow some Communist candidates to withdraw their names from the ballot.

**Aim to Destroy State.**

"The Communist Party does not propose to capture the bourgeois state, but to conquer and destroy it," Mr. Stevenson said. "As long as the bourgeois state prevails the capitalist class can baffle the will of the proletariat. Strikes of protest must develop into mass strikes to conquer the will of the state. Mass action becomes political, but extra-parliamentary in form. The bourgeois party organization is one of the agencies for the coercion of the proletariat. A parliamentary government is an expression of the bourgeois capitalist over the worker.

"Bourgeois supremacy permits the dictatorship of capital, assisted by the press, the pulpit, the army and the police. Therefore, it is necessary for the proletariat to organize its own state for the coercion and suppression of the bourgeoisie. It is a struggle of the workers against capitalism, and our aim is to direct the struggle for the conquest of political power, the overthrow of capitalism and the destruction of the bourgeois state."

Mr. Stevenson said that one of the doctrines enunciated in the manifesto was that if any candidate was elected on the Communist ticket to any legislative office he was not to introduce or support any movement for a reform of political laws, but was to advocate destructive methods.

**Refuses to Reduce Bail.**

When Mr. Stevenson asked that bail be fixed at \$10,000 in both cases the prisoners' counsel protested that such bail was "prohibitive" and that he wanted at least two weeks in which to prepare a defence.

"The hall stands," retorted Magistrate McAdoo. "Not a penny less."

"But, Your Honor," said Klein, in speaking for Nessim, "the charge against my clients is very serious."

"You are right," replied the Magistrate, "in saying that the charge is serious one. This man is accused of plotting to overthrow the government. He represents a class that are making a fight against the government which means the life or death of the government. I will not reduce the bail a penny, nor will I give you two weeks. You must be ready for examination, as Mr. Stevenson says, by Friday at ten o'clock, and I will adjourn this hearing until then."

Members of the bomb squad said that they had information that the mass meeting of the Communist Party was going to be a "police massacre." They said the "reds" aimed at retaliation because the police broke up the meeting.

**GOV'T AGENCIES PUTTING FORTH RENEWED EFFORTS TO PROTECT PUBLIC AGAINST DISTRESS**

**U. S. Orders the Supplying of Coal to Foreign Owned Ships in American Ports be Stopped Immediately — Train Services Being Eliminated Where Necessary to Conserve Coal Supply—No Change in Policy of the Gov't Towards the Strike.**

Washington, D. C., Nov. 6.—Still hopeful that court developments at Indianapolis Saturday might point the way to an early ending of the coal strike, Government agencies nevertheless put forth renewed and more determined efforts today to protect the public against distress almost certain to result from a protracted suspension of mining operations. Realizing that the country is burning three times as much coal as the mines are turning out, the railroad administration, the great coal distributing agencies, through its recently created Central Coal Committee, took drastic action in ordering that the supplying of coal to foreign owned ships in American ports be stopped immediately. With calls for assistance from communities suffering from a coal shortage growing more numerous, the Railroad Administration turned those every available car to meet the apogee made for fuel.

Orders went to regional directors of the nation's railroads from Director General Hines to eliminate train services where absolutely necessary in the public interest, but it was officially announced that no general curtailment of service was contemplated. The discontinuance of foreign tonnage bunkering was the first general step taken by the government since the coal strike began last Saturday toward curtailment of transportation. The Central Committee made it plain that American owned ships and tonnage under the American flag would continue to receive coal supplies, but all other vessels, as the situation now exists, will be compelled to await the end of the strike.

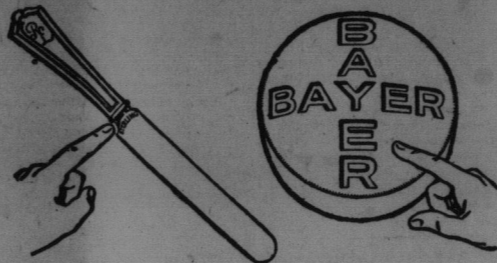

compromise the strike, which it held illegal, was accepted as the last word on the subject. 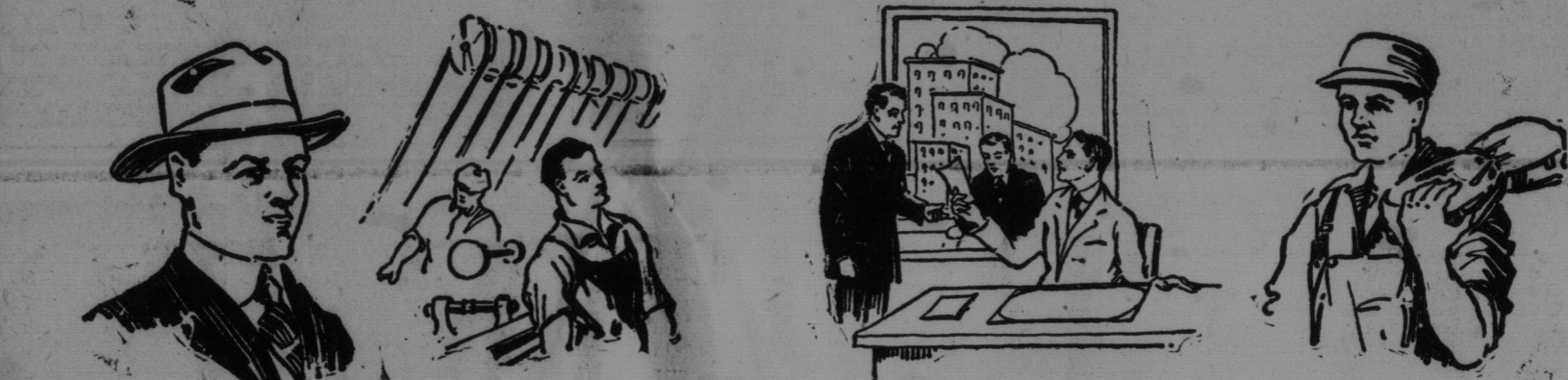

### THE LEADER.

In declining to accept the resignation of Mr. J. A. Murray, and re-electing him to the Leadership amid scenes of wild enthusiasm, the delegates to the Opposition Convention yesterday demonstrated in an unmistakable manner their belief in the personal integrity of Mr. Murray, and their strong faith in his ability to lead the party to victory. Their action in face of the bitter campaign of slanders which has been directed against him by his political opponents cannot be described as a mere manifestation of party loyalty. The delegates came from every part of the Province, and they must know the feeling which exists in the constituencies in respect to the partisan efforts to discredit Mr. Murray, and through him the party he has led. If they were not satisfied, if they were not absolutely convinced, that public opinion throughout the Province had weighed as its true worth the campaign of slanders based on the report of a notoriously partisan commissioner, Mr. Murray's resignation would certainly have been accepted and another leader chosen. The action of the Convention will be a sore disappointment to the Government leaders, who have not scrupled to resort to the meanest type of tactics in an effort to drive one of their ablest opponents out of public life. It is an eloquent testimony to the fact that the delegates from every section of the Province have the best of reason for believing that the party under its tried and trusted leader has the brightest prospects of success at the next elections.

Mr. Murray in his address during the afternoon admitted frankly enough that he may have made errors, but added that he had committed no crimes or done anything that could trouble his conscience. He now has abundant evidence that in spite of all that has been said against him by his opponents he retains the confidence of his party; and he will be given renewed courage to carry the war into the enemy's camp, and lead the party to victory whenever his traducers see fit to submit their own record of incompetence and extravagance to the judgment of the electors.

### MR. MURRAY'S SPEECH.

Mr. J. A. Murray's telling arraignment of the maladministration of the Veniot-Foster government before the Opposition Convention yesterday afternoon evoked many evidences of the strong feeling of dissatisfaction with the existing state of affairs which prevail throughout the Province. His scathing indictments of the incompetence and extravagance of the present government were received in a manner that showed that the delegates were possessed with an earnest determination to overthrow the present regime, and give the Province a government capable of administering its affairs in an efficient and honest fashion, and setting it on the highway of progress. His condemnation of the ways in which the present administration have neglected the opportunities that lay ready to their hands, their failure to carry on policies which had already accomplished much for the development of the Province and promised greater results in the future, while they frittered away the public revenues on experimental enterprises which in most cases have turned out to be futile adventures, aroused strong feelings, because they touched on matters which have affected the delegates personally, and of which they have an all too intimate knowledge. When he turned his batteries upon Mr. Veniot's road policy, which so far has only produced an orgy of expenditure and roads that are a disgrace to a modern country, the reporter accorded his remarks was eloquent of the resentment which is becoming increasingly manifest all over the Province. Many of the delegates and their neighbors have suffered such inconceivable losses on account of the bungling policies of an incompetent minister, and are eager for and determined on a change.

Mr. Murray's forceful address gave the keynote to the convention. It was a challenge to the assembled delegates to redouble their efforts to deliver the Province from a government convicted by its own officials of juggling with the public accounts, and attempting to deceive the people regarding their financial position; a government which has shown a cynical contempt for its pre-election pledges, and has blantly defended its waste and extravagance on the ground that it was unreasonable to expect anything better from an administration of untrustworthy. At the same time the address was a summons to the convention to amplify the policies of the party, and enlarge the programme with a view to promoting the progress of the Province, and realize the opportunities for development in agriculture and industry which are now being ignored. That this summons to the convention to give the Province a comprehensive policy

which will put it in the forefront of progressive communities did not fall on deaf ears, was shown by the earnest consideration given to the resolutions brought before the delegates, and the adoption of many important new planks in a platform, which is broad enough to build upon a new era of progress and prosperity for the Province.

### GERMAN FEARS.

Some rumors from Germany foreboding the possibility of a counter-revolution to restore the monarchy on the anniversary of the establishment of the Republic will occur in a few days. Many evidences have been forthcoming that there are large numbers of people in Germany, and especially in Prussia, who are dissatisfied with the Republic, which so far has had a lurid and stormy history. There are many who still cherish a veneration for the ex-Kaiser in spite of all the revelations which have been made as to his responsibility for the war, and the ruin of the once prosperous Empire. There are many more who are merely discontented with the existing conditions in which they find themselves, and would welcome almost any sort of a change in the hope that something might come out of it which would improve their condition.

But the wiser among those of the Junker class and the Army officers who wish to seize power again will probably think several times before they go so far as to attempt to restore the Hohenzollerns to the Throne. The Allies have made a solemn declaration of their intention to bring the ex-Kaiser to trial for his crimes against humanity, and though they may be slow in giving effect to this declaration they can be relied on to take measures to prevent the restoration of Wilhelm. Conditions in Germany appear to be ripe for almost anything, but predictions as to the turn affairs may take would be foolish. If the Monarchist attempt to exploit the prevailing discontent, the Bolsheviks may decide that it is their turn for a revolution.

### THE LIBERALS' FAITH?

The St. John Telegraph and the Moncton Transcript, which claimed that the election of Mr. Caldwell in Carleton-Victoria was a victory for the Liberal party, will have to offer some new explanations of this pretension in view of the following letter.

Sir,—Having noticed quotation from the Moncton Transcript in the St. John Telegraph of October 29, saying that the victory of the United Farmers' candidate in Carleton-Victoria was due to the fact that the United Farmers and Liberals combined to support him, we wish to emphatically deny this insinuation, as the United Farmers' organization and also their candidates would not consider any alliance with either of the old parties under any circumstances; in fact our candidate has repeatedly said that he would rather be defeated as the United Farmers' candidate than to be elected by the support of either of the old parties as a party, but that he would appreciate the support of any man regardless of what his politics had been in the past.

THE UNITED FARMERS OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

Mr. Caldwell was an ardent Liberal in the past, and it is probable that this fact helped him in the election, but it looks as if he will have to forget his love of Liberalism in the future or he will have trouble with his constituents. Apparently neither the Telegraph nor the Transcript are really convinced that the farmers of Carleton County at any rate have been converted to the Liberal faith in any large numbers or they would urge Premier Foster to hold a provincial by-election there, and remove the injustice of keeping the people of that constituency without a representative in the Legislature.

**Government House Must Go.** (Farmers' Sun.)  
 The days of an official palace which none but a millionaire can occupy, and which tends to the development of robbery and bunkery in a dependent community, are numbered and the U. F. O. will do the numbering.

**Quebec's Sugar.** (Hamilton Spectator.)  
 Quebec's production of maple sugar this year reached the substantial total of about 30,000,000 pounds valued roughly at \$7,500,000. A great deal of this was exported to the United States, where the better quality of it is used in the manufacture of chocolate, according to the Christian Science Monitor, a considerable quantity of which is then returned to Canada. This is a fair sample of American enterprise, but it would be much

more to Canada's profit and patriotism if this disposition of the sugar were made within its own borders. It would be that degree less than the huge balance of trade that already prevails against us across the border.

**Old Parties Will Live.** (Kingston Standard.)  
 Classes and groups have come and gone in other countries, time out of mind, but the great political parties seem to go on forever. To suppose that either the Conservatives or the Liberals in Canada will in the end be submerged by the new groups of today is unreasonable.

**Abolish Firearms.** (Brookville Recorder.)  
 There is legislation before Parliament designed for the purpose of preventing people carrying firearms. The object is to make it unlawful for any person having concealed weapons upon their person unless permitted to do so by law. It is a prudent piece of legislation. ### BRITISH TROOPS IN SYRIA

### BRITISH SWEEP UP 23,000 MINES

#### Dangerous Task Completed by Navy and Mine Clearance Service is Being Dispersed.

Daily Express Naval Correspondent.

The British navy's mine clearance service is being dispersed, having practically completed the work of cleaning up the areas of sea allotted to it by the Allied Council.

Since November last the service has swept 59,965 square miles of sea. This is equal to 48,471,840 acres, or an area nearly equal to the size of England and Wales. It has removed 23,000 moored mines. About one-fourth of that number were moored at less depth than the draught of the sweeping vessels, but so much careful attention was paid by the heads of the service to tidal and weather conditions that only two ships were actually blown up in the course of mine sweeping operations. The loss of life in the service by the operations has only been 0.6 per cent. of the personnel employed.

The Black Sea has still to be swept more thoroughly, and there is more work to be done in the Baltic. The force in the Black Sea, however, will return at the end of November. The disposal of the mine sweepers will reduce the strength of our mine sweeping flotillas from 600 officers and 15,000 men all told, with nine twin-screw sweeping vessels and two flotillas of trawlers.

There still remain areas other than those allotted to the British navy for clearance that are dangerous, notably in the Arctic, Baltic, Heligoland Bight and the coasts of Italy.

### INSPECTION OF THE SUSSEX MILK SUPPLY

#### The Town Council of Sussex has forwarded a request to the Kings County Board of Health that they have a thorough up-to-date inspection of the milk supply, including the tuberculosis test in cows. Dr. J. F. L. Brown says that he had taken up the matter with the Minister of Health, Hon. W. P. Roberts, M. P., and he expresses himself as being very much in favor of such action.

Before the Municipal Council of Kings County the Board placed their estimates this year at \$2,700, and the Council cut it down to \$2,600, so in order for Sussex to have this special action taken cost will be incurred over which the Board have no control and which they have no money to pay, and in that case the town will have to bear a certain amount of expense connected with the matter. The owners of cattle will have to bear the expense of the tuberculosis test or else be struck off the milk dealers' list.

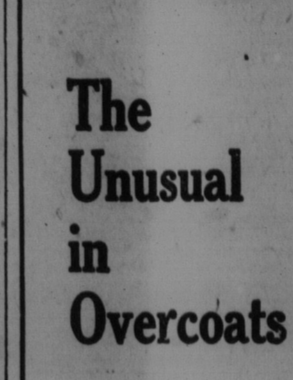
Each sample as a rule will probably cost \$5, but the minister may be able to arrange a special rate for this work.

Plans are now under way for a detailed inspection and examination of the milk and it is possible that a special meeting of the Board will be called before the regular meeting in December. It is understood that one veterinary surgeon has been recommended for this work.

### Column Ambushed

#### British Officers Killed on the Indian Frontier.

Simla, Nov. 6.—A column of Wau-wauais, about 300 strong, attacked a reconnoitering party between Manghi and Lani on the 5th inst. The casualties are reported to be twenty-nine killed and missing, including one British officer. The enemy, however, lost heavily.

On October 4 a column from Kaur bridge engaged the same party, then estimated to be 600 strong, near Manghi. At first it drove them back towards the hills, but later it apparently fell into an ambush, and only succeeded in reaching Kaurbridge after heavy fighting.

Full details are unavailable, but our casualties are believed to be approximately eighty, including two British officers and one Indian medical officer killed.
