Lord Gordon's Kidnappers.

Much sympathy is felt in the States for the Minnesota parties who have been committed to jail to await trial for the attempt to kidnap Gordon in Minnesota. Since the ravings of the Governor of Minnesota and Consul Taylor were quietly smothered down by the Manitoba authorities the question has been persistently urged at Washington. The Washington authorities do not appear to have taken a lively interest in the matter, or have failed to see the way clear for interference, the report sometime since telegraphed to us that they had made a formal demand for the surrender of the prisoners, being incorrect. If the prisoners were captured on United States soil, we should suppose that they could not be held, and that the Washington authorities would lose no time in demanding their release. Washington officials are in a peculiar position, special to the Boston Post shows how the case now stands at the deserted capital.

Senator Ramsey and Gov. Austin had a consultation with Acting Secretary of State, Bancroft, yesterday. It is believed that he will have another interview for the purpose of endeavoring to induce the Department to grant a friendly influence in behalf of the release of the citizens of Minnesota who are attempting to kidnap Lord Gordon. There seems to be no doubt of the guilt of the prisoners, and in fact the Senator and Governor appear to have little hope of success in the effort now being made. About the only show of succeeding in the endeavor to have the Canadian authorities interfere is the one made by the late Hon. J. A. B. Jones, who committed the prisoners to jail without having secured the necessary dissolution of the present Canadian Ministry and the formation of a new Cabinet which, it is believed, will reverse the decision of the Manitoba authorities and remove Attorney General Clark and his so-called blackmailing associates.

The last sentence is given as a fair specimen of the Canadian political system. The best informed judges in the country are the Washington correspondents, and the writer of the above probably knows more about Canada than the editor-in-chief of the first-class journal for which he writes. Judging from the editorials on Canadian affairs in the great New York Tribune, it is not surprising that the leading editors, and yet these journals have been largely quoted by Canadian Opposition papers lately, their blundering judgments against the Government having been accepted as final. It is a considerably long time since the editor, the leader writers, particularly, know just enough about Canada to blunder egregiously whenever they attempt to discuss our affairs. They are either incapable of comprehending a system of Government on the other side of the water, or else they have never deemed the subject of sufficient importance to study.

These Petitions.

The Ottawa Press (Independent) says on Friday that the majority of the Ottawa City petition to the Governor General for a prolongation of the August session was only fifteen! A contribution to the Ottawa press the following morning and withal humorous brief biography of some of the fifteen:

If rumor be true, and scarcely one will deny that it is, one of the most prominent is a man suspected of embezzlement, and that suspicion was thought to be sufficiently well founded to require his resignation as an important office. Another girl who was very popular in connection with a certain circle and the gentle signs of now lawless, another is a broken down rhymer, a life failure, who was a bad soldier, has been a worse citizen, and is, therefore, a petitioner to the very Government he denounces so bitterly. Another is a man who lives to die in the spots he has collected in a supposed melancholy failure as a journalist, has been a still-necked pedagogue, crabbled in temper (his pupils had some reason to know) and a standing nuisance at the School Board. These are high toned gentlemen who refuse to sign them from who presume to speak for the Reformers of Ottawa. Next we shall hear a man who has been a member of the Ontario Reformer, and communicating honest Reformers who would be learning trades by which they could earn an honest living.

Westmoreland Concert Court.

DONCHESTER, Aug. 4.

The case of James R. Curry vs. the Bank of British North America and J. S. Locke was taken up on last Thursday afternoon, and has occupied the court uninterruptedly ever since. It is an action of trespass on the case brought by plaintiff to recover damages from the defendants for taking proceedings maliciously and without any reasonable or probable cause to force him into bankruptcy. McLeod & Weldon, Attorneys, Charles Duff, Q. C., and A. J. Hickman, Esq., counsel for plaintiff; and James J. Kaye, Q. C., Attorney, E. B. Thomson, Q. C., and C. W. Weldon, Q. C., counsel for the defence. This has proved a most interesting case on account of the interesting circumstances connected with it, the intelligence and logic of the plaintiff, and the ability of the counsel on either side. The circumstances of the case as detailed by the witnesses for the plaintiff are something like the following: The plaintiff, together with Mr. Berryman bought a tract of land in Queen's County, and entered into partnership for the purpose of carrying on a milling business, erected steam mills and did carry on a large business, for some six or eight months. That James

S. Locke, the defendant, on behalf of the Bank, made a claim against the plaintiff of some \$4000 or \$5000, of which the defendant knew nothing. Berryman it appears was also a partner of Robinson, the gentleman who ran Charlotte Co. against Brown, and was defeated. The evidence is that Berryman drew money from the Bank, expecting that Robinson would wind up and would be all right. The contrary was the case and the Bank accounts was transferred to the firm of Berryman & Curry. Upon the Bank through Locke demanding the firm should go into bankruptcy, Curry, who seemed to be doing all the business of the firm, successfully resisted the demand, but in consequence was eventually obliged to do so, which caused the damages for which he brings his suit. Today, before dinner, Mr. Duff closed the case for the plaintiff, and Mr. Thomson argued for a nonsuit. After dinner his Honor, in consequence of the death of H. Weldon, Esq., half brother of one of the Counsel for the defendant and partner of Mr. McLeod, attorney for the plaintiff, adjourned the court until Monday the 29th of September. What the defence stands for is not known, as it has not yet been opened.

Canadian, British and Foreign.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 4. A fleet of Italian war ships is ordered to Carthage to protect the interests of the Italians, and cooperate with other foreign vessels in whatever measures seem necessary in view of the situation.

NEW YORK, Aug. 4. Gold dull—115 1/2; exchange 108 1/2. A prize fight took place on Sunday on Long Island, where Chambers defeated Sedgwick in 47 rounds, and another to-day between Peter Croker and Jack Boylan. Croker winning in 38 rounds.

Special to the Tribune. The Conspectors Preparing to Share the Investigation—Confidence in the Government—The Printers' Strike.

OTTAWA, Aug. 5. The Toronto Globe says the Board of Commissioners will be treated with nothing but indignation favored with contempt, and declares that the Commission is not worth so much waste paper. It is evident that the Brits will not accept a method for a trial of the Government, and will carry out their conspiracy to the verge of revolution.

Besty's letters, published in the Herald, were written previous to the session of 1872. They were professional letters. The investigation will show that the Government are in no way implicated.

The printers' strike continues. The Tribune office assists them, and offers the use of its office and type to publish a paper in the interests of the strikers. The other offices have determined to hold out, as the tyranny of the Union was unbearable.

SE JOHN A. MACDONALD REPORTED DEAD! A dispatch to the News Room says that Sir John A. Macdonald attempted to commit suicide by drowning, but was rescued and has since died.

LONDON, Aug. 4. A TURKISH LOAN. Turkey is to raise a loan of \$75,000,000.

THE FRENCH MONARCHISTS. Much excitement has been caused in the French Assembly over the reconciliation of the Bourbon and Orleans branches, which now seems to be confirmed, as the Count de Paris has gone to visit the Count de Chambord. He arrived at Vienna to-day, and was received by the Emperor Francis Joseph.

THE CIVIL WAR IS SPAIN. At Valencia the Government troops are making their way, and the bombardment continues.

THE UNITED STATES FRIGATE SAN JUAN has the Spanish frigate Ville de Madrid under her guns in Cadiz harbor, and has ordered her to abstain from hostilities.

IN FLIGHT near Valencia between Government troops and insurgents 150 men were killed.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5. THREE MEN BURNED TO DEATH in an oil-well in Butler, Pa. A FIREBOMB EXPLOSION, yesterday in the Wilkesbarre Coal Mine, Pennsylvania, caused two men to lose their lives; two others were injured.

INFLUENZA have attacked a settlement in Washington Territory and killed two women.

THE ASSOCIATED BANK of Havana was arrested with two supposed accomplices on the steamer City of Mexico at New York, and nearly all the money which he had stolen, \$87,000, found.

IT IS REPORTED in Montreal that Sir John A. Macdonald attempted suicide, but the Government organs deny the story.

A SHODDY MILL in Ayer, Mass., was burned yesterday—loss \$125,000.

FROM THE BOSTON PRESS. NEW YORK, Aug. 5. SUICIDE. John Kissel, aged thirty, a German saloon keeper, committed suicide yesterday at 56 Forsyth street, while he was suffering from temporary insanity, superinduced by intemperance and business misfortune.

THE LITTLE GIRL asked for some bread which was on the top shelf of a closet. The father got upon a chair with a large knife, apparently to cut the bread, when he turned around and facing his wife and child drew the knife across his throat from his body. He was taken to Bellevue Hospital, where he died a few hours afterwards.

A PRIZE FIGHT between Sedgwick and Chambers took place this morning at the Prospect Park Fair Grounds, Brooklyn, and resulted, after 14 rounds, which occupied nearly an hour, in the defeat of Sedgwick. It was said, was not in good fighting condition. He was punished severely by Chambers, who displayed much more skill throughout the fight. Finally Sedgwick was knocked out of time and his seconds threw up the sponge. The affair was kept very quiet and was witnessed by a few New York and Brooklyn sports. The police were deceived by the report that the men were to meet at Coeyman Island.

HORRIBLE CRUELTY. Concerning the arrest of Mrs. Catherine Smith, for starting a child in Brook-

lyn, N. Y., which was fumed out to her, a physician testified that he found it suffering from starvation, and lying on a bundle of rags in the corner of the room gnawing a crust of bread which a woman had thrown through a window, the door being locked. It would not have lived twenty-four hours longer without food. Two neighbors testified that Mrs. Smith had been accustomed to leave the child shut up for a day at a time, and was absent for two days at one time. They had thrown crusts of bread to it through the window.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5. The following statement shows the number and value of postage stamps, stamped envelopes, newspaper wrappers and postal cards issued from the stamp department of the Third Assistant Postmaster General's office during the month ending July 31. From these sources the revenues of the Post Office Department are mainly derived. As this presents the business of the franking privilege, it is regarded with considerable interest.

A large increase over the business of any previous month in the history of the Department is believed to be the legitimate result of the wiping out of the dead-end postal system. Ordinary postage stamps were issued to Postmasters upon their regulations 7,419,796, the value of which is \$2,067,874; stamped envelopes, plain, 6,821,800, value \$18,076 58; stamped envelopes with special return requests printed thereon, 420,500, value \$158,922; newspaper wrappers, 1,743,730, value \$19,689 50; postal cards, 14,881,000, value \$149,281; making the total value of all the articles issued to the public \$2,294,822 18. In addition to the above there were issued the official stamps to the War Department 6000, value \$840; to the Treasury, 1,255,000, value \$207,000; to the Interior, \$500, value \$400; to the Agriculture, 30,000, value \$600; to the Post Office, 100,000, value \$28,800; Justice, 10,000, value \$150; to Postmasters on account of the Post Office Department, 9,044,000, value \$180,810; and of official stamped envelopes, 538,500, value \$988; making the total number of official postage stamps and stamped envelopes issued during the month of July 5,158,400, the aggregate value of which is \$1,049,810. The total value of the month's work in this one division of the Bureau of the Third Assistant Postmaster General is \$1,049,810, derived from 107,565,410, the value of which foots up \$8,868,471 18.
