## Deferred Matter.

(Overdue last week.)

The expiration of a number of sewing machine patents on Tuesday has caused considerable excitement in the sewing machine circles, and had the effect of bringing down prices on certain classes of machines fifty per cent. The manufacture of sewing machines is now free to every one, although a large number of patents on non-essential details and attachments will continue in force. The prices of three of the first-class machines on the market have already been reduced to \$30 each; that is, a \$60 machine will be sold for \$30, a \$70 machine for \$40, and so on. Instalment rates will be about \$10 higher.

John W. Brayley, Esq., and family have left for Montreal, to take up their abode there. Mr. Brayley has been largely engaged in the manufacture of medicines in this city, and has been a resident here a number of years. We always regret to lose any of our citizens, particularly those who have been largely identified with our commercial interests. Mr. Brayley and family will take with them the best wishes of the public, and we trust that he may have a long life of business prosperity, and his family of domestic happiness in their new sphere.

Mustard is largely adulterated in Montreal, thus one-third wheat flour, one-eighth to one-half coffee, the rest, chickpeas and beans. Ginger ditto—from ten to twenty-five per cent. of pea meal, mustard, hawks, wheat starch, wheat flour, ground rice and Chili peppers, cinnamon made of cayenne, mustard, buckwheat husks, pea meal, etc.—no cinnamon at all. Intending purchasers in the lower provinces will find it more probable how to treat the Montreal travelling agents always who offer to sell these articles.

To make English Ginger-Ale in small quantities—One spoonful ground ginger (not the Montreal adulterated trash), spoonful cream of tartar, pint yeast, pint molasses, six quarts water. Mix, let stand a day, then add ginger to ferment; then bottle; set it in cool place—in eight hours it will be good, and healthier, better and much cheaper than the manufactured trash you have to pay 7 cents a half tumbler for.

A slight difficulty has arisen between France and England relative to Newfoundland fishery. The action of the Governor in forbidding the French to fish for herring has been a subject of complaint by the Minister of Foreign Affairs, but the English Government supports the Governor, hence the interchange of unsatisfactory diplomatic notes.

AQUATIC.—A testimonial of about \$4,500 from the residents of Australia to Edward Trickett, in recognition of his skill in winning the rowing championship of the world on the Thames, was presented to that oarsman by the Premier of New South Wales, on the anniversary day, on board the flagship at Sydney.

We are informed that propositions are likely to be made by the Roman Catholic of this city to the Board of School Trustees at their next meeting, with the view of taking advantage of the fact that the Common Schools Act, and of placing their schools under the supervision of the Board of School Trustees.

The Hon. Mr. Lafontaine's Christian name is Toussaint Antoine Radolphe. The hero of the Lacine Canal land job and the partner of Louis Riel, Selkirk, Huntington could not have more appropriate initials. And Mr. Mackenzie expects to handle it without being defied.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE.—Rev. D. Macrae, pastor of St. Stephen's Church, has obtained leave of absence, and intends paying a visit to Scotland. The Rev. Huntington has not been enjoying the best of health lately, and we hope his trip may be the means of recruiting his health.

The oldest reigning sovereign of Europe is William, German Emperor and King of Prussia, who completed his eightieth year on the 22nd of March in the present year. The youngest is Alfonso XII of Spain, who was 19 years birthday, 28th of November, 1876.

In Wallingford, Conn., on the 10th, Mrs. Samuel S. Burd died, and was buried less than an hour after, her husband and son riding to the grave on the coffin.

The Pope on Friday, received the pilgrims from Canada and the pilgrims from Rhode Island, headed by the Bishop of Sherbrooke and Vicar General Bonzue.

Somebody advertises in one of the Westfield papers for a servant girl "who would not be above placing herself on an equality with the rest of the family."

The railway station at Windsor, N. S., was robbed of between \$450 and \$500 on Monday morning last, when the station master was at breakfast. There is no clue to the robber.

The English agents for the steamer City of Brussels have sent the powerful tug Challenge in search for her.
