EDITORIAL NOTES.

The revenue of Canada for the four months ended November 1st amounted to \$13,125,000, being \$1,125,000 in excess of the same period last year. The expenditure for the same period was \$9,125,000, a decrease of \$100,000 as compared with the same period last year. This shows a surplus of \$3,750,000.

In referring to the article by Gen. Butler in the North American Review the Empire says:—

"This, then, is the idea: That a large body of the Canadian people are already ripe for rebellion, and the presence of a United States army would be the signal for a general uprising, in which the bulk of the people would side with the invaders and Canada would be lost to the British Empire! While such a general Butler's article reads like a broad burlesque, there is a serious side to it. That a leading magazine in the States should admit to the columns an article advocating the armed invasion of a peaceful neighboring country, and that writer by an ex-candidate for the Presidency, betokens a state of feeling there that may yet lead to serious consequences; and the evident fact that this feeling is encouraged by traitors within our own borders misrepresenting the sentiment of Canada, should open our eyes to the mischief these copperheads are doing. But for the belief that a large number of Canadians would hail with pleasure an attempt to attack our country to the United States, a belief engendered by the tenacious of traitors here, and of journals which protest that 'this is not a British country'—we would not be treated to such insulting articles as are now common in United States papers. We have too much faith in the sober sense of the people of both countries to be alarmed by such a prospective campaign as Ben Butler has sketched; but if the time ever comes that invaders set foot on Canadian soil, we would soon undeceive them as to how our population would receive them. A short shrift and a strong cord would soon rid us of a few traitors who are now tolerated because they are believed to be comparatively harmless, and Canadians as they are man would see and show that one man would not be the same staff as Southern invaders had a taste of before at Queenston Heights and other battle fields."

The retaliation policy promulgated not long ago by President Cleveland appears to cut both ways, and the question arises whether the citizens of the United States will or will not be the most serious sufferers. It is argued on good ground that Canada as a whole would be benefited, and that its prominent leading men look quite calmly on the prospect knowing that such a policy would be the means of bounding trade in all Canadian ports and thereby, largely increasing the traffic over our railways. Canada can and will prove herself quite independent of the railways over the border if such a policy should be carried out.

And now China is showing that retaliation is a policy that two can play at. The Chinese Times contains a letter signed by the Pekin official, and written just after the news reached China that the United States had passed the Chinese exclusion bill, from which the following extract is taken:—

"If the obnoxious American bill should be carried into effect, there will be no other country for the Chinese to turn to with their dignity as a nation, than to adopt retaliatory measures by prohibiting the citizens of the United States from coming to China. This will be by no means proportionate to the harm done to the Chinese interest in America, but it will have to be done in order to show that the Chinese can do the same thing, and if this will have no effect in bringing the United States Congress and the United States Government to reason and fairness, then it will be a question for her to consider whether it is not time for her to cancel her treaties made with that country, to recall her subjects from there, to expel all Chinese from her territory, and to cease all relations and intercourse, diplomatic and commercial, with that country."

A Republican tidal wave set in on Thursday of last week and the result was that the party came in on the flood and totally swamped their opponents. Six months ago Cleveland's return was considered sure but that time various causes have tended to turn away from him many thousands of votes which have been cast in favor of the Republican candidates. The vote in the electoral college, it is said, will show a majority of 77 in favor of the Republican candidates.

Important Invention.

Mr. Joseph Eastworth, Superintendent of the Prince Edward Island Railway, is not only a most efficient and courteous official, but is a thorough railroad man, who, in addition to long experience and a thorough knowledge of the practical working of everything in connection with a railroad, is possessed of inventive genius of a high order. We are inclined to make these remarks from having seen an ingenious contrivance which he has invented. This invention is intended to be a preventive of accidents and collisions on railroad tracks. By means of it two trains which might happen to be moving towards each other on the same track could be stopped, and called back to the starting point by the operator at either end. Again, should a train break down on any part of the track the conductor could immediately inform the nearest station of his position, and also warn all approaching trains of their danger. We feel sure that this will prove to be a most important invention, and that, when put in operation, it will be the means of preventing many accidents and prove a source of safety to the travelling public. —Charlottetown Herald.

Smelt Fishing.

A petition to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries has been forwarded to Ottawa from persons on the Miramichi interested in this fishery, asking that the license fee be reduced to \$1.00, that a license shall be good on the whole river, and that the fishing season open on Nov. 20th instead of Dec. 1st.

We trust the prayer of the petition will be complied with, as the fishermen have good reason for complaining of existing regulations. Last season, without any notice of the change having been previously given the license fee for smelt fishing was raised from one dollar to three dollars. While in some instances a license fee may not seem an exorbitant one yet in others it is more than the fishermen can afford to pay. Of course some make good hauls and three dollars in such cases is a very small percentage of their catch, yet there are many men who fish throughout the season, and scarcely pay their expenses, and it is to them a hardship that three dollars should be exacted in an endeavor to raise a revenue on an industry which provides employment for a large number of industrious people who otherwise might be idle all through the winter. It has frequently been stated that license fees on nets were more for the purpose of registry than revenue, if such is the true state of the case the fee should at once be put down to one dollar.

Then when a license is granted for fishing on the Miramichi it should be good for the season no matter in what part of the Miramichi river or bay the owner should fish, as when fish fall in one place it is customary to try elsewhere, sometimes with little or no success and to make a man pay a license on a smelt net every time he wishes to change to another place in the same district is certainly an imposition, and if such is the law should be amended forthwith.

In reference to the time for commencing the smelt fishery every bag depends on the season. Last year the regulation that fishing should not commence until the first of December did not interfere with this industry, simply because ice had not made at that date or for several days after so that nets could be set through the ice. The fact that smelt start on their way down river as soon as the ice makes at the head and at New Brunswick or three days down fishing is all that is expected if the tide suits, and hence the date when fishing should be allowed to commence should depend on the season, and be left to the local overseers. Let them be instructed to allow fishing to commence immediately the ice forms and if it is thought it makes the season too long then take off a week or two at the end thereof so that the season shall be of only so long duration, but not to arbitrarily regulate that the fishing shall commence at a date when in the vicinity of Newcastle, or between Newcastle and Chatham there are no fish to catch, they having proceeded down river.

There are other questions of paramount importance to be regarded by the interests of our fishermen. By the time fishing is allowed by law to commence on the Miramichi, it is early by late, the prices have been cut down to so low a figure by illegal and unfair competition from other places where poaching is winked at or allowed that there is but little profit in the business after the first of December. We do not refer to the smelt fishing by line as carried on in Bathurst harbor, we know that regulations allowing such fishing are in force and so they should be, as that fishery gives employment to large numbers of poor people and the quantity caught is not sufficient to stock the American markets and lower prices. But we do think that fishery officers should be appointed who would endeavor to prevent such fishing as that referred to by a correspondent in another column, and his suggestion that officers should be placed at Gloucester Junction, Fredericton, St. John, and we would add Bathurst, and thereby prevent the shipment of immature fish. If they caught small fish from the first of October until the legal date for such fishing to commence. What our correspondent says of the fishing at Pokemouche is equally true of other places in Gloucester County, where bag nets are placed across the channel openings left in bridges and fishing carried on in broad daylight apparently without fear of molestation. If laws regulating such fisheries are to be enforced, they should be enforced, not in one district only but all over the country. It is such illegal fishing, winked at by fishery officers in certain districts, for which no license is paid, that causes our fishermen to complain against what they consider unjust and tyrannical regulations for the Miramichi, while in the adjoining county of Gloucester illegal fishing a month or two before the proper time injures their prospects for fish prices by the markets being glutted with fish illegally caught. We hope the Minister of Marine and Fisheries will have this matter looked into and that he will grant the prayer of the petition forwarded to him.

Already, upwards of twenty of our leading ladies have adopted the 'white symbol' and assumed duties in several departments of the work of this organization. Relief committees have been appointed, and methinks, as the happy Christmas time again comes round Campbellton's poor at least, will testify of the good work which has been effected by the oversight and generous sympathies of the members of the W. C. T. U.
