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FULL REPORT ON WHITE SLAVE TRADE

Hordes of Immoral Women
From all Countries Im-
ported to U. S.

VILE PRACTICES.

WASHINGTON, D. C. Dec. 11.—All but incredibly revolting are the disclosures as to an international system of traffic in, and the enforced and the voluntary degradation of men and women, contained in the report on the so-called "white slave trade" submitted to Congress yesterday by the United States Immigration Commission, showing as it is the amount of voluntary shame given in the report, immensely more so in the setting forth of well-attested facts as to the compulsory consignment of innocent immigrant girls to the life of the bawd.

The commission says that the effect of the importation of immoral women into this country is one of increased degradation and death for the women and of contamination and corruption by means of the spread of disease for those with whom they come in contact.

The commission says that the immoral traffic is not confined entirely to women, but it is clear that there is a beginning at any rate, of a traffic in men and boys for immoral purposes. The need of checking this importation is especially great, because the report, which is the first of its kind, shows that the vices brought here from continental Europe and beyond doubt, has come from imported women and their men the most heinous and depraved. The diseases generated and spread by these importations, says the commission's report, should be guarded against even more than tuberculosis, syphilis or any of the other infectious diseases.

The commission in describing the manner of its investigations, recounts the experiences of many of its agents. In some cases they were attacked and beaten and actual murder was narrowly averted.

MOTIVE FOR TRAFFIC.
No statistics were given in the report, though the extent of the "white slave traffic" is characterized as country-wide. Most of the women, it is said, come by way of New York, San Francisco and Seattle, although some are coming lately by way of Canada. Frequently they are brought into the United States distinguished as the wives and sisters of their producers and as pass the immigration officials.

The exploitation of these women after their arrival in the United States is characterized in the report as "most pitiful for the women and most brutal on the part of the men." Not only the innocent and betrayed young girls but the more experienced women are made the victims of virtual slavery.

EIGHT DAY BILL DISCUSSED

Matter Up in House But is
Shelved For Six
Months.

DREGING CHARGES

OTTAWA, Working-day and election day were discussed by the Canadian lawmakers last week. Mr. Verreille, of Montreal, offered a bill providing that on all public works and in all factories and industries doing work for the government the men should be employed only eight hours.

Claude MacDonald, a Toronto Conservative, presented a bill declaring election day a holiday and abolishing the \$200 deposit from candidates. This got the six months' hold.

EIGHT-HOUR DAY BILL.
Mr. Verreille, in moving the second reading of his bill to institute an eight-hour day in government works claimed that a reduction of hours would not effect production, that it would provide work for the unemployed and benefit the working class morally, physically and mentally.

The laboring man, he said, should be given a chance to breathe the pure air of heaven.

A. C. MacDonald pointed out that the bill would have a disastrous effect upon contracts let by the government to factories. It meant that the government would not be able to go into the open market and purchase anything that had not been produced under an eight-hour day. He suggested that a special committee be appointed.

Mr. Edwards (Montreal) opposed to the bill on the ground that a reduction of hours in other classes of employment would make it more difficult for the former to get a job.

Mr. Goodwin (Kingston) pointed out that an eight hour day had been established in the mines of British Columbia and had had eminently satisfactory results.

Mr. Rhodes (Cambridge) declared himself absolutely in favor of the bill because he believed that the shortening of hours would have no effect economically, but would benefit the working classes.

Dr. Spruille took the view that the bill was impracticable.

Hon. Mr. MacKenzie King assented from the view expressed by Mr. Edwards that the shortening of hours for labor reduced the capacity recognized that shortening of the hours of labor was an advantage not only to the working classes but to the community. While the question was one, primarily, for the consideration of provincial legislature, nothing but good could result from a discussion of the subject in the Dominion house.

SANTA CLAUS EXPECTED

Beautiful Cantata To Be
Rendered Here Friday
Night.

LARGE CHORUS.

Santa Claus Expected is the title of a beautiful Christmas Cantata, which will be presented at the Opera House, Friday evening, under the direction of Professor Singleton.

It is not yet known whether the cantata had already done much to improve conditions of labor in public works. They had enacted a fair wage clause and taken steps to enforce it, officers having been appointed for the purpose. While the object aimed at in the present bill was to be approved it was gratifying that the house should know what it was voting for. If it passed in its present form it would give rise to many complications and might lead to serious misunderstandings, not in the interests of the working classes themselves.

Some trades unions had agreements with employers as to conditions of labor extending over a term of years, and the effect which this bill would have on these agreements was a matter which should receive consideration in the department he founded the hours of labor in the building trade in Canada differed in almost every province. It might be that these differences were climatic or were due to other conditions, but before enacting legislation that would arbitrarily determine working hours throughout the country, they should give the men of the various trades a chance to express their views.

Accordingly he suggested that the bill be referred to a special committee.

Mr. Borden was willing to support measures to benefit the laboring men but he agreed that the present bill should go to a committee and at once.

Mr. Verreille expressed his willingness to have the bill referred to a special committee on the government's assurance that the matter be brought to an issue before the end of the session.

The bill was read a second time and referred to a committee composed of Messrs. King, MacDonald, Ralph Smith, Staples, Prowse, Marshall and Verreille.

A. Claude MacDonald moved the second reading of his bill to amend the Dominion elections act by dispensing with the \$200 deposit by candidates and providing for a general holiday on election day.

Hon. Mr. Aylesworth thought the present law had worked very well and did not see the necessity of the changes proposed. The abolition of deposit might lead to frivolous candidatures while a public holiday on election day might be abused. He therefore moved the six months' hold.

Two opposition members, Major Beattie of London, and Mr. Thorburn, opposed the bill, and it was given the six months' hold without division.

E. N. Lewis wants a Canadian to represent the Dominion at Washington. He has given notice in a resolution asking the Canadian government to petition the British government to authorize a Canadian to be stationed at Washington to advise and consult with the British ambassador there on purely Canadian affairs.

QUEBEC BRIDGE CONTRACT.
G. E. Foster was told by Hon. G. P. Graham that the contract for the substructure of the new Quebec bridge had been awarded to M. P. Davis. The contract call for two abutments, two anchor piers, and one intermediate pier at a cost of \$2,448,476. The total cost to date to the government of the bridge is \$4,950,852, which includes subsidies to the amount of \$374,353.

Hon. Mr. Fielding told Mr. Foster that no temporary loans had been made by the government since the beginning of the present session.

Mr. Edwards of Frontenac, learned from the minister of militia that the battery soldiers at Kingston had been authorized by the officer commanding eastern Ontario to manœuvre for the purpose of having moving pictures taken, as he saw no objection to their doing so.

Mr. Armstrong was told by Hon. Mr. Fielding that the Franco-Canadian treaty had not been ratified. The question of treaties with other nations was under consideration.

Mr. Schaffner was told by Mr. Graham that this session there had been ten cars of wheat hauled to the great lakes over the National Transcontinental railway.

DIVORCE REFUSED IN CURREY CASE

St. John Home Was Unpleasant, But No Cruelty Was
Proved.

OTHER CASES.

FREDERICTON, Dec. 11.—His Honor Judge McKewen delivered judgment in several cases and the most important cases taken up were the case of Dr. L. A. Curry of St. John vs. Mary Eliza Curry and the case of Mary Eliza Curry vs. Dr. L. A. Curry. The judgment in these cases resulted in each case being dismissed with costs.

His Honor gave an exhaustive review of the evidence and occupied more than an hour in delivering his judgment. He did not think the evidence would justify him in granting Dr. Curry the relief he seeks and in regard to Mrs. Curry's case against Dr. Curry, His Honor said that from a study of the authorities he could not find that cruelty had been established by the evidence. Words of abuse he said did not constitute cruelty. There must be some bodily injury injurious to the health. Such scenes as had been described in the evidence would make life a hardship but would not justify the court in granting a divorce according to the law. He therefore dismissed the case with costs.

Mr. M. G. Teed, counsel for Mrs. Curry stated that alimony for the present month would be due on the fifteenth inst. and asked that it be paid this week.

Mr. Teed gave notice of appeal in this case.

An absolute divorce was granted in the Queens County case of Benj. Panjoly vs. Mary Agnes Panjoly on the grounds of adultery. The plaintiff charged that the defendant, his wife, had left his home, and went through a form of marriage with one Walter H. McNamee, the defendant's maid name was Mary Ann McNamee.

BUDGET SHOWS HANDSOME SURPLUS

Mon. Mr. Fielding Announces \$20,000,000 Surplus During Year.

A FINE SURPLUS

Ottawa, Dec. 12.—It is understood that there will be a record surplus and no tariff changes announced in the budget, which Hon. William S. Fielding will present to parliament on Tuesday.

The government had several reasons for abstaining from tariff changes this year. The last Canadian tariff is too recent to make changes advisable, and it has been the policy of the government to keep the tariff as stable as possible for the general benefit of Canadian trade.

The present situation of Canada and the United States in regard to the tariff makes it inadvisable to make radical changes in the tariff this year. In this connection, it is felt in government circles that the sentiment in the United States and in Canada will prevent a dislocation of trade by the United States putting Canada on the maximum list under the provision of the latest tariff of that country.

In this connection it is interesting to note that in the first two months of the new American tariff there has been, according to Canadian figures, an increase of some \$11,000,000 in Canada's imports from the United States and an increase of \$2,750,000 in the exports of Canada to the United States, compared with the months of August and September last year.

These increases are in proportion to the recovery of trade with other countries from the depression of last year. The net result is that the new American tariff has made no difference so far in the trade relations of the two countries, though there is no telling what the result would be if Canada were placed on the maximum list by the American authorities.

In his last budget speech, the best that Mr. Fielding would predict for the current year was a revenue of \$92,000,000. The indications are that the revenue will be close to \$100,000,000.

During the year there was a large decrease in expenditure, amounting to some \$9,000,000 in consolidated account and \$15,000,000 on capital account.

The betterment of this year over last should be close to \$20,000,000.

The surplus of revenue over ordinary expenditures which the finance minister will be able to offset is of the order of twenty million dollars.

CANADA'S DESTINY 'A Nation Within the Empire' (Mr. Lemieux's Mission).

There must be few men under the British flag in whom the imperial idea is more happily incarnated than it is in the Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux.

Postmaster General of Canada, who is at present in London conferring with Mr. Sydney Buxton on matters connected with the improvement of the postal and telegraphic communications between the Dominion and the Mother-country.

By a descent from a French family which left Rouen 300 years ago to settle in Canada, Mr. Lemieux stands as a reminder of the fact—too often forgotten—that the British Empire owes its greatness not to the expansive instincts of the home nation alone, but to the same power that raised Rome from a city-State to the dominance of the world—the power of incorporating and welding into its own structure all that is best and hardest in the peoples that have come within its widening boundaries.

Man of Grand Conception.

By position Mr. Lemieux indicates the method in which the Empire will be rendered stronger yet in years to come. A statesman of the young Canadian nation, he has come here to discuss with the Government of the Mother-country the best means of multiplying and strengthening the bonds of affection that bind the two nations together, as a prudent son might come to a wise father for friendly advice and counsel.

And, lastly, in his personality Mr. Lemieux stands as a type of the man who has made the Empire great. Forceful, alert, a man in whom grand conceptions and a rapid organization are allied to a cool even judgement, and the gift of a charming personality, Mr. Lemieux is worthy to fulfill the high duty of helping to guide the early days of a nation that stands yet only upon the threshold of its destiny.

Among the matters that have brought me over here," he said, "is the project of establishing an all-red service of fast steamers between this country and Canada and Australia. It would be an institution of great value in strengthening the ties that bind the Colonies to the Mother-country. We in Canada are enthusiastic for the scheme.

"You ask me whether the sentiment that was once frequently advanced that the ultimate destiny of Canada was incorporation with the United States, has any hold upon public opinion in Canada. No sane man in Canada—Mr. Lemieux spoke emphatically—thinks today and few besides the most irresponsible of jingoes in the United States. We Canadians are, and it is our duty to remain, a nation within the Empire—London Mail.
