### HOLD STYLISH GIRL FOR BOOTLEGGING

#### Taken Off Montreal Train With Thirty-Three Quarts of Whiskey.

SARASOTA, N. Y., Dec. 9.—While 30-year-old Dorothea Wardell of Boston slept peacefully aboard the Montreal-to-New York train. Customs Inspector Goodrow was unearthing thirty-three quarts of excellent Canadian whiskey from her baggage.

Miss Wardell, who had retired before the train left Canada, was awakened and taken off the train at Rouse's Point.

She was charged with bootlegging, and, extravagantly gowned and wearing jewels worth several thousand dollars, was arraigned before United States Commissioner Gilliland at Plattsburg. Miss Wardell made no denial of the charge.

The case was continued for a hearing and when she stated she had no one to go her bail she was turned over to Sheriff Coffey and lodged in the Plattsburg jail.

### LOSS IS ESTIMATED AT \$75,000 OR MORE

#### Plant of The Chestnut Canoe Co., Ltd., Destroyed By Fire.

FREDERICTON, Dec. 10.—The entire plant of the Chestnut Canoe Company, Ltd., said to be the largest canoe factory in the world, was destroyed by fire here early this morning, together with 300 completed canoes, and all the machinery of the plant, the models and rough materials. The loss is estimated at \$75,000 or more. The insurance, so far as known, was said to-day to be only \$20,000.

James Toner, a fireman, suffered painful bruises on the leg when he was struck by a piece of flying steam pipe following an explosion during the fire. Some large pieces of pipe were thrown 100 feet or more from the building and other firemen had narrow escapes.

While 300 completed canoes and a large number of materials were destroyed, two large storehouses used by the company and located near the factory, escaped unharmed and were said to contain between 300 and 400 more completed canoes.

It was said at noon to-day that the company's old factory building in the city was available and might be used for a resumption of operations until a new factory has been built.

### NEW CABINET BY NEW YEAR

#### W. L. Mackenzie King May Announce Cabinet By Jan. 1st.

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.—Members of the Meighen cabinet are returning to Ottawa for final meetings of the cabinet before the premier formally places his resignation in the hands of the governor general. His Excellency will then invite Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, as leader of the victorious Liberals to form the new administration.

Mr. King is reported to have cabinet negotiations already well under way and may be able to announce his ministry by the new year. In the East, if anything, he will find difficulty in the embarrassment of pieces of cabinet material.

Among Liberals elected in the east, are a number who, like Mr. King himself, served in the Laurier cabinet before it went down to defeat ten years ago. They are veterans in the service of the Liberal party. They are already experienced in the administration of public departments, but, coupled with them, are a number of younger Liberals, whose claims for recognition also will be strong.

West of the Great Lakes, Mr. King will be in a different position. In the prairie provinces, the Progressive sweep checked Liberal and Conservative alike. In Saskatchewan Mr. King had only one candidate elected; in Manitoba, two, and in Alberta, so far, no Liberals have been elected. Here, however, there is still a possibility that Frank Oliver, who served in the Laurier government, may be returned.

### YOUNG WOMAN FATALLY SHOT

#### Miss Molly Kingston was Handling Rifle and Bullet Lodged in Abdomen.

NEWCASTLE, Dec. 10.—A shocking fatality occurred at Weyerton Settlement, about twenty miles from here, yesterday morning, in which Miss Molly Kingston, daughter of Paul Kingston, lumberman, lost her life. She was in the habit of practicing rifle shooting and yesterday morning about nine o'clock took her rifle and went out into the yard. A few moments later the occupants of the house heard the sound of a shot and a groan and on going out into the yard found Miss Kingston lying on the ground shot through the abdomen. It is presumed that the shell became jammed and in her endeavor to dislodge it caused the rifle to discharge. She was unconscious when found. Dr. Bell was called from Newcastle and did everything possible for the young lady, but she passed away six hours later.

Coroner Desmond decided that an investigation was unnecessary. Miss Kingston was about thirty-one years old and leaves her parents, four brothers and five sisters.

### BROWNED IN THE MIRAMICHI RIVER

#### Chatham, N. B., Dec. 9.—John Brophy, 21, son of Terence Brophy, was drowned while skating on the Miramichi River, opposite Chatham.

Three of Chatham's young people have had narrow escapes while skating on the Miramichi. Miss Alma Irving, Richard Keough and Ernest McLaughlin narrowly escaped drowning while enjoying a whirl on the steel blades here to-day.

Just the other day an American manufacturer told me that they intended coming into Canada because of the preference within the British Empire. Is there any thing to stop an era of prosperity all over Ontario?"



The death occurred on Saturday evening at 9 o'clock of Mr. John Connell, one of Chatham's most highly respected residents and one of the best known guides in New Brunswick. Mr. Connell had been in good health until with a month when he was taken ill with diabetes.

**Wage Reduction Held.**

Ottawa, Nov. 28.—The operating ratio established by Canadian railways for August was 86.41 per cent, according to a statement from the transportation branch of the dominion bureau of statistics. This figure showed a decided improvement over August, 1920, when the operating ratio was 98.82 per cent. For the eight months ended August 31, 1921, the average operating ratio was 96.68 per cent and for the same period in 1920, 100.97 per cent. This improvement was effected by reductions of operating expenses. The total was reduced by \$6,229,688 or 15 per cent. More than 83 per cent of the reduction was accounted for by a reduction in pay roll of \$5,118,010. The general reduction in wages on July 16 last was responsible for approximately one-half of this decrease.

With these reductions in the expenses there was a decrease in the total train miles of 12 per cent in loaded freight car miles of 13 per cent in revenue freight ton miles of 24 per cent, in ton miles of revenue of 22 per cent, and in passenger miles of 13 per cent.

The Canadian government's savings reduced operating expenses from \$56,828,226 in July, 1921, and \$70,427 in August, 1920, to \$70,064 in August, 1921. The operating ratio of 102 per cent was the lowest this year.

The Canadian Northern Railway had a net operating revenue of \$217,266 for the first time this year. The operating ratio was 96.14 per cent as against 127.9 per cent for August, 1920, and 108.86 per cent for July, 1921. The Canadian Pacific Railway operating ratio was 82.89 per cent as

**CURIOUS FACTS ABOUT BODY**

Why Milk is of Such Food Value—Potassium and Other Metals

One reason why milk is so excellent a food is that it contains much calcium, which is the principal metal of the human body, contributing to the make-up of the bones and teeth. A grown person carries in his skeleton about four pounds of it.

Your body contains about three ounces of sodium, which is a white metal so highly combustible that a piece of it thrown into water will take fire instantly. In the human system it combines with chlorine to form common salt. Hence the saltiness of your perspiration and the salty taste of your tears.

In your skeleton there are also about two ounces of magnesium, which is a silvery-white metal. In a powdered state, it burns with a most brilliant flash—as seen in a photographer's flashlight.

Another highly inflammable metal contained in your body is potassium, about two and a half ounces of it. Like sodium, it is set on fire by contact with water, destroying the latter. That is to say, it enters into combination with the oxygen in the water, liberating the hydrogen, which burns with violence and a rosy flame, the phenomenon wending up with an explosion and a shower of sparks.

Your body contains about fifty-five ounces of phosphorus, originally derived mainly from milk, cheese, beans, fish and oysters. At all events, these are the foods which, above all others, yield this remarkable substance. In a pure state it takes fire of its own accord if exposed to air, and therefore, has to be kept sealed in water. Seven-eighths of the phosphorus that you carry about with you is in your bones (going to form the base of the teeth). Half an ounce is in your brain tissue; the balance is in the red corpuscles of your blood.

Of bromine (otherwise called sulphur) there are about four ounces in your bones and teeth. It is originally a volcanic product, but one should remember that all the mineral elements were at one time contained in the rocks of the earth's crust.

Your body contains three-fifths water and one-fifth carbon. If all the hydrogen it contains, or an equivalent quantity, were separated out, it would fill a balloon big enough to lift you above the clouds.

Since the opening session of the disarmament conference at Washington many and varied have been the criticisms voiced, not only by the skeptical public, but also through numerous sections of the press. As far as the public is concerned, their pessimism is founded largely on delusion. Someone made the mistake of referring to this great meeting of international statesmen with international interests at heart, as the "Washington Arms Parley" and this appellation seems to have been responsible for the public's misconception of the real nature of this momentous discussion of world problems.

To many the Washington conference is merely a friendly chat about war and its various attachments without any particular objective in view, just as one would discuss with a friend at the club, the opening of a new play or the possible price of his Christmas turkey. Others, on giving the conference a momentary thought, seem to visualize something similar to a "smoker" of their local O. P. Q. society and are content to let it go at that.

On the other hand many who regard the conference as a political discussion of serious import, have a lengthy list of problems drawn up which they claim should be given immediate attention, not realizing that, were their plan adopted, we would simply be putting a clean collar on the world without first washing his neck. But the leaders of the conference have wisely chosen to face the bigger issues of the day first and by their judicious settlement insure, in a large measure, the eventual successful disposal of all minor problems.

Up to the 13th instant one might be excused for skepticism, but with the signing of the great "four-power peace pact" pessimism becomes an unworthy and unfounded sentiment. With this great quadruple peace agreement an accomplished fact the conference has achieved, in its very beginning, what seemed almost an impossibility. ### THE INTER-COLONIAL RAILWAYS

That portion of the present Canadian National Railway System which was long and familiarly known as the Inter-colonial is essentially a Maritime Province road, and although of the utmost value and importance to the entire Dominion in giving the central Canadian provinces a necessary connection with the provinces by the sea, it must be remembered that just as Montreal and Toronto have jealously continued to lay claim to the head offices of the C. P. R. and the Canadian Northern and other roads respectively, so have the people of the Maritime Provinces always regarded the Inter-colonial as having its chief activities in the far East, which they very naturally consider as a Maritime Province road, to be managed in the future, as for so many years in the past, in one of its own large centres of activity, and preferably at Montreal. There is no doubt that practical men everywhere will hold that railways are more readily operated from their own neighborhood than from some other point hundreds of miles away from them. It is for this reason that the Telegraph believes that the administration and management of the Inter-colonial Railway should be left with the Maritime Provinces and with mechanical and other headquarters at Moncton, and this is the course which it is consequently suggested should be followed under the forthcoming administration of the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie King, in the matter of the management of the national railways.—Quebec Telegraph.

SHIPS IN TROUBLE OFF SHIPPEGAN

The Bethlehem, from Sydney, Lower Harbor—in Danger if Southeast Storm Comes.

Moncton, N. B., Dec. 8.—A dispatch from Bathurst to the Transcript says:
The steamer Bethlehem, with a cargo of coal from Sydney for Campbellton, but her radio while off Shippegan, and was compelled to anchor and wait for assistance.

Without any doubt the Maple Green Farm owned by R. L. Hicks, Dalhousie, is the most modern dairy in New Brunswick, and one of the best equipped in the Province for the production of sanitary milk.

It has always been Mr. Hicks' ambition, since he bought the Maple Green Farm some eighteen years ago, to equip it with machinery that not only would save labor, but that would enable him to put on the market a product that he could back up with a guarantee.

To-day his hopes have materialized, and he is sure is deserving of a lot of credit for he has not only bettered his own situation but has paved the way for others in the same business.

When visiting the Maple Green Dairy Barn, the first thing that takes one's attention is its roominess. A cement floor, large alley ways and plenty day-light are other features.

There is but one row of cows, and these are tied in stanchions. They are always well provided with straw bedding, and are cleaned three times each day. These last features are essential for the production of clean milk.

The herd consists of choice Holstein cows, some of them producing milk over 40 quarts per day, equivalent to eight gallons testing 4 degrees Butter Fat.

Mr. Hicks puts his cows on official tests every year to determine their ability as producers, and he is thereby able to practice selection and cull out the poor individuals.

It is by following this system for the past twelve years that the Maple Green Herd has been able to win the Grand Championship in the dairy test at Amherst in 1920 and make official records which puts the herd up amongst the outstanding ones of Canada.

The last official records were made during the week of Nov. 28th. The results for four cows were as follows:
Lady Belle Mercedes—580.4 lbs. milk for 7 days; 22.18 lbs. butter fat 27.72 lbs. butter.

Abbeker Queen Hooker—552.6 lbs. milk; 21.36 lbs. butter fat; 26.69 lbs. butter for 7 days.

Mercedes Homestead Lass—471 lbs. milk; 19.79 lbs. butter fat; 24.74 lbs. butter; in 7 days.

Milly Pontiac Sadie—519.5 lbs. milk; 17.50 lbs. butter fat; 21.88 lbs. butter in 7 days.

The above gives an average per cow of about fifty-three gallons of milk containing twenty-five and a quarter lbs. of butter in seven days.

This is certainly an achievement worthy of note as the average production of cows in Canada is about five times less.

Production however is not the only business at Maple Green Farm. The marketing of milk is another, and it was for this purpose that Mr. Hicks built a dairy adjoining the barn, which, though simple in construction, is a model in itself for the efficient and sanitary handling of milk.

It contains a steam boiler outfit, which supplies steam for sterilizing all milk utensils and operates a rotary brush bottle cleaner. With this apparatus all milk containers are kept absolutely clean.

The milk itself is handled with utmost care, only sterilized pails are used for milking, and immediately after it is drawn it is strained, then cooled in a tank of running water which in a few minutes reduces its temperature to about 45 degrees, thus preventing the development of bacteria, which may happen to infect the milk.

With this system the Maple Green Farm is able to deliver to its customers real milk, milk that one is not afraid to drink, milk that will help to eliminate sickness or disease in the family.

It is a business that is growing rapidly, and it is only a matter of time before it will be one of the leading industries of the Province.

It requires a man of Shackleton's nerve and daring to plan and lead so hazardous a venture. But all through his career, Sir Ernest has gone for the big thing.

He served his maritime apprenticeship twenty years ago with Captain Scott, and was with him and Dr. Wilson on the arduous journey of 1902, which paved the way to the conquest of the South Pole. That glittering prize all but fell to him seven years later, when he scaled the Beardmore Glacier to the lofty plateau that holds the Pole, and was compelled by sheer exhaustion to retreat when only a hundred miles from success.

More daring still was the plan of his third expedition, for he had succeeded, he would have marched across the southern continent from shore to shore, and settled once and for all many of the problems of the still mysterious south.

His fortune did not turn out again, but the splendid failure of the Endurance expedition is illumined by the unconquerable spirit he displayed in the drift down the ice-floes of Weddell Sea, and his heroic voyage of eight hundred miles in a small boat through the wildest seas in the world in search of relief for the party left behind on Elephant Island.

A man capable of deeds like these takes rank with the greatest of British sailors and pioneers. And with all the wealth of experience behind him, who will say that his latest and perhaps his last Antarctic venture—or he is approaching fifty—may not be crowned by a glorious triumph?

And what of the men who are with him? Of the ship's company of sailors and scientists five at least are men who know the Antarctic of old.

There is the second-in-command, the bold Frank Wild, with his unequalled record in the Far South, who was with Captain Scott in the Discovery, with Shackleton when he just failed to reach the Pole, with Mawson in the great Australian expedition, and again with Shackleton in the Endurance.

To know Frank Wild is to love him. Small but sturdy, he is a man of iron nerve and infinite resources, an endless stock of cheerfulness, indomitable, tireless, brave as a lion—the man to have beside one in a tight corner.

Frank is the life and soul of any company in which he finds himself. A robust vocalist, he can sing sea-chants by the yard, and spin yarns when everyone else has told his best, and last.

It seems only a few months since the writer bade him good-bye on the eve of his departure to begin a new chapter as a coffee planter in Portuguese East Africa. But coffee-planting is no job for a restless spirit like Wild, and no sooner did he hear that his old "boss," Shackleton was going south again than he came back pell-mell to join him.

Shackleton has with him others who have been his companions on earlier ventures. THE CRUISE OF THE "QUEST"

The other day a trim little steamship, half-schooner, half-yacht, with a white crew's nest above the foremast spars, sailed proudly down the Thames and out to sea.

She looked not much bigger than a tugboat, but her bows were sheathed with steel, and her sides had a thick overcoating of the toughest timber. NOTABLE TRIBUTE TO CANADIANS

In No Small Degree Due to Canadians That Germans Held Back in 1915.

Montreal, Dec. 11.—"If I succeeded on many occasions in holding back the enemy those successes were in no small degree due to the bravery and activity of the Canadian corps which was always ready. When at times of critical import it seemed that the troops were almost ready to die with fatigue and it still became necessary for me to call for troops to a dangerous point to repel the enemy, the Canadians were always first to volunteer for the service and in some way they always managed to be on the spot when they were needed. This was not merely owing to the fact that they had such commanders as General Currie, but to their own indomitable spirit and courage." This was the remarkable tribute to the Canadian Corps paid by Marshal Foch in an address given at His Majesty's Theatre here this afternoon when he was a guest of honor of the Montreal Canadian Club. Many coats and hats suffered but no one was injured in the tremendous rush that followed the opening of the doors of the theatre for the reception of the distinguished visitor. Overseas officers blazoning with decorations filled the stage and Marshal Foch was almost inconspicuous among them. He was accompanied by General Sir Arthur Currie and Lieutenant Colonel A. A. Magee, president of the Canadian Club, and several minutes were taken up in cheering when he arrived. That it was in no small degree due to the Canadians that the Germans had not hacked their way through to Paris in 1915, was another point made by the speaker. The final appeal was met with a cry of "En Avant" from their commander, General Currie. The Marshal was subsequently entertained at the Windsor Hotel by the Alliance Francaise, following which he was entrained for Quebec City.

ANOTHER FAMINE MENACES CHINA

Stricken Country Now Suffers From Too Much Rain—Worst Flood on Record. Many Lose Lives in Flood. Dikes guarding lines of the Tientsin-Pukow Railway have been swept away, carrying with them about ten miles of railway track, and resulting in tremendous loss of life. Thousands of houses have been swept away and autumn crops destroyed. Typhoons and the swollen river have put the district of Yangchow and Chekiang, in the Province of Kiangsu, in a precarious condition. These cities are stations of the China Inland Mission, and are stationed by several North American workers. From all of these provinces come reports of continuous heavy rainfalls. The dead cannot be buried, and according to reports, it is likely that pestilence will add to the horrors of the situation. The district most seriously affected seems to be that a little north of Peking, in Anhwei. There the water stands at about sixty-five feet above sea level. The region is like a shallow basin filled with flood water, covering all except the highest points of land.

Huge Artificial Lake

Writing from Peking, a missionary of the China Inland Mission states: "This inland lake how measures some sixteen miles by 160, and is dotted with islands of high ground, all of which are covered with men and animals, clinging desperately to their cramped resting places. Famine will undoubtedly aggravate the sufferings of the survivors." At Pochow, in the Province of Anhwei, it is stated that holes would have to be made in the city walls in order to let out the water which had accumulated within the city, which in some places was covered with water almost six feet deep.
