pence a head is the argument of Sir Ronald Ross, the English scientist whose researches have lead to cures for malaria and sleeping sickness. Sir Ronald claims that a sixpence from the pocket of every Englishman spent in scientific research; would result in new medical knowledge that would keep germs and old age away for at Jeast 150 years.

The scientist thinks that the allotted span of three score years and ten should find man in the prime of life, instead of edging his pedal extremity toward the grave. We live curtailed lives, he says, because we are the prey of countless germs. Conquer the germs and man can easily reach the age of 150 and maybe longer.

"Eighty years ago," said Sir Ronald in a lecture, "the average life of a London man was about 34 years 7 months and of a woman about 38 years 4 months. Today it is 58 years 9 months and 59 years. Thus medical science in 80 years has given us 20 years more of life."

Advanced English scientists hope to see research laboratories in every large city in the world, financed by the state or municipality. In them the search will be carried on for unseen enemies of the human family until the last germ has disappeared. If the medical world could spend \$10,000,000 annually instead of 900,000 as now, Sir Ronald avers, our children's grandchildren would all be centenarians, and at that be only pikers to their posterity.

DAIRY CATTLE

Deductions to be drawn from a series of experiments conducted at the Fredericton, N. B. Dominion Station, to test the value of turnips, corn, and sunflower silage as succulent feed for dairy cows, are: (1) that mature corn silage has a greater value for milk production than sunflower silage, and that immature corn silage has a smaller value for milk production than sunflower silage; (2) that corn relished by cattle than sunflower silage, that there is less shrinkage in corn in the silo than in sunflowers, and it costs less per ton to put corn in the silo; (3) that turnips will keep up the flow of milk fairly well, but that they have less food value per pound than either corn or sunflower silage; (4) that cows fed corn silage or turnips; (5) that when cows eat sunflower silage readily they will make larger grains taan on turnips. How these deductions are reached is fully detailed in tables given in the annual report of the Superintendent at the Station for 1923, which will be forwarded free of cost on application to the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.



A quoit which is past the perpendicular (i. e., whose lower surface when quoit has lodged forms more than a right angle with the horizon) is to be considered dead and must be removed before the next quoit is pitched; if this is not done it can be claimed as counting. A quoit which may turn over, or be knocked over, after it has lodged is not to be considered dead.

FARM HANDS INNOCENT PRANK

Leads to Arrest and Suicide-Mirth of People Causes Trouble

Brooding over the disgrace that followed what he considered a mere prank, caused Floyd Rutan, fifty-eight, to hang himself in the barn of his employer, Edward Hockenberry, in Wantage Township, Sussex County, N. J., Friday.

A total of 1,008,672 barrels of apples have been shipped to the English market from Halifax since the beginning of the shipping season up to February 24. London took 354,715 barrels and Liverpool and Manches-ter came second and third with 267,-323 and 172,685 barrels respectively.
