THE HOMESTEAD RIOTS.

It is a scathing commentary upon the state of law and civilization in the Dominion, that within a few weeks of one of our largest cities, scenes of lawlessness and wanton cruelty and murder should be enacted as were at Herculano, in the state of Pennsylvania on the 6th instant. On that day a mob of striking workmen, incensed through ignorance of the true position of affairs, held at bay a body of men who had been sent to protect private property from destruction; and upon their surrender under promise of protection subjected them to treatment which for cowardice and cruelty surpasses the greatest atrocities ever chronicled in the annals of civilized warfare.

In June last the Carnegie Steel Works decided upon a scale of prices for the work which they then refused to sign and the works were in consequence closed. Upon the attempt being made to place non-union men who were willing to work at the company's rates in the foundries, the strikers kept the non-union men out of the works and at the same time intimidated the men who had better mind to his own business and not interfere in the strike. As serious injury and possibly total destruction to the company's property was apparent, a force of some 300 men of Pinkerton's Detective Agency of Chicago was organized to protect the works and sent to the scene of the strike in two barges. When news of the approach of the dreaded and hated Pinkertons reached the strikers their fury knew no bounds and steps were taken at once to prevent their landing. Fully a thousand maddened men received the millions of the bay with a volley from the rifles, revolvers and two small cannons which were found in the town, and every device which could suggest itself to the mind of a blood-thirsty mob was brought into play to destroy the detectives. Oil was pumped on the water and set fire in the hope that the barges and their human freight would be destroyed. The cannons were trained on the barges and a perpetual hail of scrap iron showered upon the men. At last a white flag was shown by the Pinkertons with an offer of the work which they would be afforded protection. This was solemnly promised, but as soon as their arms had been taken upon the treacherous mob broke loose upon their victims, and then followed a tale of cruelty which it is painful to read. The men were taken down and jumped on, their eyes deliberately scooped out of their sockets by sticks in the hands of infuriated women, and not one of those who left the barges under promise of protection reached the shore without having suffered injury.

It is the majesty of the law in the Dominion. The sheriff elected by the people did not discharge his duty. Governor Patterson clerical by the working vote was too full of partisanship to call out the militia, when asked to do so, and part of the public press of the country in its fear of loss of support, openly apologizes for this outrage upon human rights upon the Dominion, and upon the rights and property of individual citizens, by a weak attempt to claim it was but the powerful voice of laboring out against the oppression of capital. The Republican form of government may have many desirable and admirable features, but a democracy having within its borders men who so openly outrage all laws of human government is doomed to social and civic eruption of a grave character, until it shows its citizens that the same force which made the laws is still potent to secure their respect.

The St. John's Fire.

Elsewhere is given a report of the movement of the Dominion citizens towards relieving the sufferers by the recent great fire St. John's Newfoundland. This is a case which appeals for sympathy of the most practical kind. In the short space of four hours from six to ten o'clock on Friday 8th inst. four thousand of the city of St. John's were left homeless. Many lost all they possessed of the necessities of life, food, clothing, and shelter and without the means with which to obtain them again great suffering must ensue. The notice from other columns which asks for donations is self explanatory. We have fortunately been spared from a like visitation in Sackville, nevertheless there is a spirit of fellow feeling existing here which will show itself, we trust, in the form of aid to those who are suffering. The list has already been very favorably received and the collectors here in the near future to be able to forward some assistance to the afflicted citizens.

Creditable Enterprise.

AD FOR ST. JOHN'S.

In response to notices read from the different pulpits on Sunday a meeting of the citizens was held in Stipendiary Cahill's office on Monday evening to decide upon steps to be taken towards relieving the sufferers of the late fire St. John's Newfoundland. Those present were Josiah Wood, M. P., Rev. Dr. Stewart, Revs. C. F. Wiggins, William Harrison, Drs. Allison and Smith, Principal Borden, Dr. Trueman, Dr. Sangster, Messrs. Walter Cahill, J. L. Black, W. T. Carly (Boston), J. W. Paul, M. Fulton, Amasa Dixon, Geo. E. Ford, J. E. Allison, W. C. Milner, B. E. Patterson. Upon motion Stipendiary Cahill was appointed chairman and drafted the object of the meeting. Dr. Allison moved:

In order to express the practical sympathy of the citizens of Sackville, with the sufferers by the St. John's Newfoundland fire, that a subscription list be opened at once for the purpose of raising the goods as may be considered necessary for their relief.

The following were appointed a committee to collect and forward the subscriptions and donations. Dr. Allison, Dr. Sangster, Messrs. W. C. Milner, G. E. Fawcett and F. B. Black.

A Moncton Bigamy Case. On Thursday Constable Sprout went to Hampton and arrested a man named John B. Bailey, charged with bigamy at the instance of his first wife, Eliza Bailey, nee Eliza Stevens, of Moncton. His second wife was Kate Pickles, a resident of Moncton. Eliza claims that she was married to Bailey two years ago on the 18th of October next by the Rev. Mr. Talbot, and that she and the prisoner lived together for some time afterwards as man and wife. She further states that on July 7th Bailey married his second wife and moved to Hampton and resided with his newly wedded wife's father. He was brought to Moncton last evening and lodged in the lockup. At 9 o'clock this morning the case was brought before the court, but owing to some error in the drawing out of the warrant for arrest, it was adjourned until 1 o'clock to have matters corrected. At 1 o'clock the case was again brought before the court, R. Barry Smith for defendant, Geo. P. Thomas for complainant. A number of witnesses were sworn. The accused will be tried at Dorchester during the court now in session.

Canada Holding Her Own.

While a United States Senate Commissioner reports that Canadian exports to the United States slightly increased in the first year of the McKinley tariff the British Board of Trade returns shows that, for five months British exports to Canada increased 30 per cent. It is true that in May the increase was only 5 per cent, but if May was one of the five months, as presumably it was, the average increase of the five months was at the rate of thirty per cent. It is regarded as specially due to any thing we have done. But we have done something to meet a demand in Great Britain which may be expected to increase our trade in future. Monetary Times.

The examination of D. M. Willbar, charged with criminal assault upon the girl Mary Thompson, was concluded on Monday morning. The Thompson girl is 16 years of age and it appears from the evidence that a young man known as Frank Brown, started in a double seated wagon on Monday morning July 1st, in company with a girl named Sophia Bell, Mary Thompson and her brother. On reaching town the Thompson girl's brother let her out of the wagon and shortly after the accused got in. The party then drove on the Salisbury road for eight or nine miles. Brown wanted to drive on to Salisbury, but the girls objected. Brown and the Bell girl were afterwards taken into the wagon again and all came to Moncton. Sitting in the wagon, Brown refused to accept bail, saying he would go to jail and believed a trial would be held. The Bell girl's brother got out of the wagon and went to a hotel and it is said that some published reports of the evidence are highly inaccurate. Times.

The Ship Railway.

Says the Amherst correspondent of the Star: Active preparations are now being made by the Chignecto marine railway so as to facilitate the resumption of work at as short a notice as possible. The fifty dock and running basin at the Port Lawrence end of the line is now clear of water, and the work done at the other end, as well as the dock at the time work was suspended, no damage having been caused by the water to the masonry in the dock or to the side of the basin. The dock at the other end is three-fourths finished, and an excellent opportunity is now afforded, the many failures to the works to obtain a good idea of the manner in which the transhipping will be done. Mr. Ketchum assumes that the work will be completed in a matter of a few weeks before the undertaking will again be in full swing, and when once begun a very few months, probably by next spring, will see the line ready to end to end completed and in working order. The negotiating of a new contract to complete the undertaking by Easton & Anderson of London, Eng., with Lawson, Symmes & Usher has failed, the parties failing to agree as to terms. The new contractors have, however, been secured. H. S. Holt, partner of James Ross of Montreal, also W. J. Hogan of the same place, have taken the line. Connolly & Co., of Kingston, dry dock fans, Mr. Brookfield of Halifax, and Rhodes, Curry & Co. here, are spoken of as probable to take part in the completion of the road. The reports circulated that the sub-contract had been given to a certain firm are not true; as yet it has not been given to any particular contractor. It is likely that Easton & Anderson, who have the contract for the completion of the line, will take the place of Messrs. McGees & Sons as chief contractors and finish the road. Prominent Canadian contractors of known ability, will probably be combined with Easton & Anderson to form a construction company. Funding operations were this week completed at the Tidnish dock and it is expected that the dock will be cleared of water in the course of two or three weeks.
