Dainty Dishes.

Apple Compote With Rice,—Two cups rice, six apples, four, slices lemon, three and one-half cups sugar, two and one-half cups water. Cook sugar and water together ten minutes. Pare, core and cut apples in thick, round slices. Add lemon slices to syrup and slices. Add lemon slices to syrup and cook apples, a few at a time. Arrange rice in bottom of serving dish. On top of rice arrange slices of apple, overlapping each other. Boil syrup until thick and pour over apples. Cool

and serve. Pears, peaches or oranges do well with this dish. Cheese Cake.—One cup sweet milk, one cup well-soured milk, one cup sugar, four egg yolks, one-fourth cup blanched almonds, juice and rind of one lemon, one-fourth teaspoon salt and pastry. Scald sweet and sour milk together and strain through and strain through other ingredients, into curd and pour the latest phase of Jersey cloth.

Peanut Soup.—One cup peanut but-ter, one cup chopped celery, three cups rich milk, one tablespoon chopen onion, one tablespoon each utter and flour, three tablespo each of chopped red or green sweet peppers, one teaspoon salt, one-eighth teaspoon pepper, one and one-half cups boiling water. ### Cakes That Keen

There is always demand for cake that keep—that can be kept in the cake box for a week or two, ready to furnish savory slices for after: tea or the glass of lemonade offered to a guest on a warm day or to add to the luncheon dessert if need be. Here are the recipes for some very good cakes that can be relied on for freshness for a good many days. Pork Cake.—This is an old recipe

for a very good cake and it is rather odd that it is not made often nowa-days, for it is not very difficult to prepare. It will keep for a year, and there are stories of old-time house-keepers who used to make next year's pork cakes on the day when they be-gan to eat those made last year. The recipe for this cake calls for a pound of salt pork chopped fine. Pour a pint of boiling water over this and add two cupfuls of molasses and two of sugar, sifted with a teaspoonful of cinnamon and half a teaspoonful each cinnamon and half a teaspoonful each of cloves and nutmeg. Then add eight cupfuls of pastry flour and a pound of seeded raisins, threequarters of a pound of currants and a quarter of a pound of citron, shredded, all the fruit dredged with some of the flour. At the last add a heaping teaspoonful of sodz diss-aved in boiling water.

### FORESTRY AND LIVE STOCK INDUSTRY

WHAT WE MAY LOOK FOR IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

Stockmen Are Taking Advantage of Protection Offered by Forestry Branch

The area of the Dominion Forest Reserves at the present time is 35,776 sq. miles; add to this 7,920 sq. miles contained in the National Parks, and the immense territory north of the North Saskstchewan River and the North Saskatchewan River and east of the Mackenzie River, we can form some idea of the immense area that will have its best use in forestry and the animal industry, writes Mr. L. Stevenson in Canadian Farm.

The grass and forage of the forest

reserve areas in Canada will be utilized largely by domestic cattle, sheep and horses until such time as the wild animal industry is thoroughly founded. At the present time stockmen, both rancher and farmer, are taking advantage of the protection offered by the Forestry Branch to those who care to secure grazing permits. In Saskatchewan and Alberta last year, forest officers directed the grazing on all forest reserve lands, being careful that overgrazing was not practiced, and that scrub male animals were kept off the forest reserves. Live stock associations have been, and are being, formed by ranchmen and farm-ers, that a union of efforts may lead to greater results, and that all may enjoy the protection given by a stock or co-operative association to work hand in hand with the forest reserve

The lord of the harem flapped his way to a stump in a corner of the low fence and posed there, the spring sun of Prince Edward Island waking his iridescent feathers to a jewellike blaze. "Angus," she called, "there's a black fox in the fowl yard. Hurry!"
Little need for the last word of advice. "Black fox" on Prince Edward Island means wealth. McTavish and his wife joined in an earnest attempt to capture the marauder. A gun was barred, for that would have meant injury to the glossy pelt. Maybe Reynard knew it, for he waited until his pursuers were close by and then with a defiant fiir of his brush skipped into the underbrush. And with him went a vision of thousands of dollars. Thousands! you may say with an incredulous lift of the eyebrows. That's absolutely right, for the royal black fox has brought a vast income to this smallest of the Canadian provinces. Canny Scotch farmers didn't need a second hint with such a chance for gathering in good dollars, and the result is what might have been expected. The black fox has been commercialized. It was a speculation at first, but to-day fox ranching has assumed the proportions of a communal industry. The mere hunting down of a black fox for his pelt has been relegated to the dark ages. Now the fur farmers have kennels and a pair of live foxes for breeding purposes that have been capitalized at \$30,000.

Properly are these Prince Edward Island foxes known as "royal" silvers or "royal" blacks! Their pelts are catalogued at prices ranging from \$500 to \$4,000 each at winter fur auctions in London. Twenty skins from one island ranch three years ago averaged nearly \$1,400 each. Since that time the fine bred foxes have been saved for reproductive purposes, but a test pelt put on the market in 1914 brought approximately \$2,000, and in the Paris shops the current quotations (before the war) ranged around \$3,000.

When one vixen, or female fox, bears from twenty-five to thirty-five fox pups in the course of her ten years of "motherhood" it is little wonder that she is worth literally from two to four times her weight in gold. 




