THE ARRESTED MEN RELEASED

Venezuelan Minister of War Reaches La Guaira With 2.000 Troops-More of :10 Vij.

La Guaira, Dec. 10 .- All the British and German subjects arrested yester-

day were released this afternoon. The news of the capture at Port of Spain, Trinidad, of the Venezuelan gunboat Bolivar, by the British cruiser Charybdis, was communicated to President Castro by a representative of the Associated Press. The event created

intense excitement. London, Dec. 11.-The foreign office at 1 o'clock this afternoon was still without official news from Venezuela. The officials were glad to hear of the release of the British subjects, but were unable to express any opinions on the press dispatches except to say, as Under Foreign Secretary Cranborne did, that it is presumed they are cor-

rect. CALL TO ARMS. Paris, Dec. 10. - A Venezuelan Government communication to its representative here protests that Great Britain and Germany in concert have committed an act of hostility in a cedented by the seizure of Venezuelan vessels lying at La Guaira. The communication says that indignation in Venezuela is at its highest pitch and the Government is resorting to justifiable reprisals. It has arrested the resident subjects of both hostile countries and has seiz-

ed the residences and other undertakings belonging to them At the same time, adds the communication. President Castro has appealed to the Venezuelan people to take up arms. He has decreed a general amnesty for all political offenses and has ordered the restitution of the confiscated propertly of Venezuelan citizens. WITHOUT PRECEDENT.

Washington, Dec. 10 .- It was said at the British and German embassies today that the action of President Castro in ordering the arrest of all subjects or the British and German Governments in Caracas was without precedent in the history of civilized countries supposedly at peace with each other, and that such action be regarded as sufficient ground for a declaration of war. PROMPT ACTION.

La Guaira, Dec. 10.-The Venezuelan fleet was captured yesterday by ten German and four British cutters. They went alongside the Venezuelan vessels and ordered them to surrender, and without a shot being fired the British and German forces seized the Venezuelan fleet in the name of the German Emperor and the King of England. Two of the vessels which were undergoing repairs were broken up. German cruiser Panther steamed into the harbor during these proceedings with her decks cleared for action. STOVES. MOVEMENTS OF TROOPS

La Guaira, Venezuela, Dec. 11. -General Ferrer, the minister of war, has arrived with 2,000 troops. Eight hundred men under President Castro's brother are expected here at 10 o'clock. Only the British cruiser Indefatigable is now here. Se is at anchor in the middle of the harbor. All the other warships have left La Guaira. Minister Haggard and Herr Von Pilgrim-Baltazzi, it was learned today, left here last night. The former was on board the Retribution and the latter on the Vineta, which sailed for Trini-

dad. RESEIZURE OF CUSTOMS. London, Dec. 11 .- In connection with Northwest Legislative Assembly, customs, the foreign officials say arrangements for that step have not been completed. Before any general from. seizure could occur Germany, Britain and other nations would have to come to an agreement for a prorata division and adjustment of their respective claims, similar to that arrived at by the allies in China, except that the La Guaira custom house pos sibly may have been seized as a purely military measure. Although the seizure of the custom houses will take place eventually, it is pointed out that while hostilities are in progress the customs, as a fiscal institution, are practically

PUTTING ON A BOLD FRONT. The Government has sent 2,000 men and eighteen guns from Caracas to the garrison at La Guaira. These troops are camping tonight at Cuacoa, distant one hour from La Guaira. All day and all night ammunition has been carried to Fort Lavigia, which crowns the harbor, and preparations are being made to resist the foreign forces. Volunteers to the number of 926 men in La Guaira have been armed today, and more are requesting arms. It is asserted that the Government can find sufficient men to resist the foreign forces, as the movement is popular, manner as arbitrary as it is unpre- Everywhere one meets men of all classes and conditions carrying

Mauser rifles. THE FEELING AT BERLIN. Berlin, Dec. 11.-The German foreign officials are much pleased at Minister Bowen's energetic action at Caracas, resulting in the release of most of the Germans imprisoned there, and by his efforts to obtain the liberation of the others. Full advices on the subject have been received from Washington.

Venezuela by the foreign office says Venezuela's naval vessels have not vet been seized, that only her revenue cutters were captured, but that the seizure of the former is expected immediate-All the newspapers here, with the exception of the socialist Vorwaerts are in sympathy with the Government's action towards Venezuela.

STATEMENT IN THE COMMONS. London, Dec. 11 .- In the House of Commons today Under Foreign Secretary Cranborne confirmed the reports of the capture of three Venezi vessels at La Guaira and the disablement of a fourth vessel without resistance, and also confirmed the capture of the Venezuelan gunboat Bolivar at Port of Spain, Trinidad. Two driving to town when their horse beof the prizes, he added, were sunk. The under secretary also said that the release of the British subjects arrested at Caracas had been demanded, but that up to that time the Government had not been informed that the demand had been complied with. The Government had no official information of the reported arrest of the British consul at Caracas. The latest information received was that he left La Guaira last evening. The British sub-jects arrested had not been harmed.

GERMAN COMMENT The Berlin morning papers contain

many humorous references to what they term President Castro's "magniloquent manifesto" cabled to the resentatives of Venezuela in Paris and made public last night.

The Vorwaerts, which never loses an opportunity to assail what it considers be "political sham," says it thinks the formidable ultimatums of the two powers and the naval demonstration are "governmental bluster, a fine piece of pretense and international nonsense, suggested, however, for the promotion of certain financial aims." The paper adds: "So far as Germany is concerned the action taken is likely to do more harm than good, since \$150,-000,000 of German capital is invested in Venezuela. The United States must feel secret satisfaction at seeing Germany ruin its dominating position in Venezuelan commerce and finance and must hope to supplant German by American financial influences."

"DEATH TO THE GERMANS." Willemstad, Island of Curacao, Dec. 10.-There was a great patriotic demonstrations in Caracas, last night. when the news arrived that the British and German warships had seized the Venezuelan war vessels at La Guaira. Crowds paraded the streets, singing patriotic songs. Violent speeches were delivered at various points. The populace marched to the palace of President Castro, who made an address, The mob then moved on to the German legation, shouting "Death to the Germans." The windows were shattered with stones and attempts were made to force the doors, but the latter resisted these efforts, and Mme. Von Pilgrim-Baltazzi, the wife of the German Charge d'Affaires, who has been ill in bed for the past two months and therefore could not leave Caracas with her husband, was saved from the vio-

The crowd then marched to the German consulate and to the residence of Dr. Koehler, again stoning the windows and attempting to force an entrance. The police made no effort to disperse the demonstrators. The ex-English residents. One hour later 205 persons, prominent in social and compersons, prominent in social and compercial life, were crowded together in mile. One house about 150 feet from the police station.

POLITICAL POINTS

Two Mountains Seat Vacant-Sir Charles Tupper's Suggestion.

Ottawa, Dec. 10.-In the supreme court today the Two Mountains election appeal of Mr. Ethier, M. P. (Lib.), was dismissed. The seat is therefore vacant.

The Laval appeal on preliminary obections was also thrown out, and the case goes to trial on its merit. Charles Tupper suggests that Hon. George E. Foster may be Conservative candidate in North Ontario. The late Mr. McLeod carried the riding by 500 majority. Sir Charles left Ottawa today for his home in Winnipeg.

In Shelburne (N. S.) local election Moses Nickerson (Independent Liberal) defeated Andrew C. Robertson (straight Liberal party candidate) by 293 majority. The local bye-elections in the third district of King's and the second division of Queen's, P. E. I., were held yesterday. W. A. FOUR DEATHS DUE TO ASPHYXIATION

One of the Victims a Young A Defeat for the Government Woman From Ontario—Other Casualties.

New York, Dec. 11.-Mrs. William Eddes, of 203 West Twenty-fourth street, the wife of a wealthy contractor who is now in Europe, has been found dead in her bedroom. The disconnected tubing of a gas stove betraved the accident that had caused her death. Mrs. Eddes was an author, writing under the name of Sarah Jeanette Burke.

Boston, Dec. 11.-Two Russian immigrants, after being rescued from freezing in the streets, blew out the gas in a room provided by their benefactor. and were found dead yesterday. The men had just arrived from Russia. Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 11.—Elizabeth Haddock Wright, 20 years of age, who had been cashier in a Main street restaurant for two months, was suffocated in her room on Norwood avenue Tues-Gas escaped from a day evening. Dispatches received directly from small heater in the room while the girl slept. Miss Wright was a decidedly attractive girl. She came two months ago from North End, Ont.

KILLED IN FREIGHT WRECK. Groveland, N. Y., Dec. 10.-Dan Cronin, conductor, and Joseph Minister, flagman, of Elmira, were killed in a freight wreck near here early today on the Lackawanna road. Two engines and a dozen cars were demolished.

140 LIVES LOST

That's Record of the Lakes for the

Detroit, Dec. 11. - The figures for the navigation season now drawing to close show that 140 lives have been lost on the lakes, an increase of eight over last year. The figures for the last seven years

are as follows: 1896, 66; 1897, 88; 1898, 95; 1899, 100; 1900, 110; 1901, 132; 1902,

This year 59 lives were lost in Lake Erie, 40 in Lake Superior, 14 in Lake Ontario, and 10 in the Detroit River and Lake St. Clair. In spite of the long list of lives los

more men went down with their ship in 1901 than in 1902, the figures being 59 and 53 respectively. On the other hand more men fell overboard and were drowned this year than during the preceding one, the total being 47. The loss of life from collisions in 1901 was 5 and in 1902 15. BOY WAS A MURDERER

His Confession Clears Up the Mystery of a Man's Death.

The boy has made a confession in which he acknowledges that he had stolen the dead man's pocketbook containing \$27 08. He said that the old man was drunk on the morning of his death, and that he, wishing to sober him up, gave him a drink of bromo seltzer. He said he dumped some of the drug in the old man's beer glass while Leyh was down celtar getting a bottle of beer.

The old man poured the beer into the glass containing the bromo seltzer and drank the decoction, according to the boy, and soon after became sick and died. He declared he had no intention of killing the old man when he fixed up the drink.

After Leyh's death he said he saw the old man's pocketbook lying on the floor and picked it up and kept it. He spent \$27 that night for a bicycle and then threw the pocketbook away.

Canada has now a direct steamship line to South Africa; so has New Zealand. It is suggested that these two lines come to an agreement for through

traffic which can be transshipped in South Africa. The New Zealand Bostmaster-Generai has accepted the suggestion with alacrity, and Sir William Mulock states that he is looking into the question of establishing a direct line to New Zea land and obtaining information as to rates from New York and the amount of Canadian goods shipped through

that port for New Zealand. Naturally through bills of lading would have to be issued from either end, and the rates must be the same as running from New York. In this manner another "all-red" line could be called into existence without any more outlay, and it would give the Zealand line a certain amount of re-

The shipping via Vancouver to the two countries is so brisk, it is pointed out, that the Canadian-Australian line has to put on an extra steamer now and then to cope with the amount of cargo offering. A direct Atlantic line would place

the Canadian manufacturer in the same position as the United States manufacturer. New Zealand produce, too, like flax, tallow, wool, casings, gum, etc., could go direct and form a return cargo for the steamers from the Cape, doing away with the very undesirable interference of New York.

Mr. Clergue and Steel Rails.

Mr. Clergue has closed down his steel rail mill at Sault Ste. Marie, on the pretext that he cannot compete with German makers, because there is no Canadian duty on steel rails. Is it possible that shrewd gentleman is putting up a bluff so as to force some contracts to go to him at his own price? We may expect a racket from the protectionist press, and loud calls for a duty on steel rails. Unless the Dominion Government complies it will be denounced as an enemy of Canadian industry. As a matter of fact, Mr. Clergue is enjoying a very large slice of protection, though he emits to mention it. He gets a bonus of \$3 per ten for pig iron and \$3 per ton for steel. "What better could a man desire?" asked the Hon. John Haggart when this matter was before the House of Commons last year. The Dominion Democratic minority, but a strong will They call him rich; he does not know Government has dealt most generously with the industry at the Soo, having given it a heavy contract for steel rails for the Intercolonial at \$32 50 per ton, whereas the Canadian Northern has just bought German rails at \$27 per ton laid down at Port Arthur. We doubt whether the Government's arrangement was good business policy, but it was intended to give the Canadian enterprise a start. The contract was challenged by members of the Opposition, who showed very little consistency in opposing the payment of a higher price to encourage home manufacture, the policy which they are always preaching to the country. It must be remembered that higher-priced rails add to the cost of railway construction, and the people have to bear the burden in increased freight rates. But there is such a wide margin between the capitalization of our great railroads and the actual cost of building them that this argument is not so strong as it would be if railroads were required to pay dividends, like other business concerns, only upon the amount of money invested. It is for Parliament to consider whether the cost of making steel rails in Canada is necessarily higher than in other countries, and if so, whether the industry is worth protecting to a still greater extent than at present, at the expense of railroad development in this coun-

The Reciprocity Convention. The reciprocity convention at De-

troit has given Hon. John Charlton an opening of which he fully availed himyesterday. Mr. Charlton has constituted himself a traveling missionary in the cause of reciprocity, and has done a great deal with pen and voice to stir up interest on the question in the United States. In his speech yesterday Mr. Charlton made the statement that if the treaty of 1854 had been continued in 1866 with some amplifications, or if the Brown draft treaty of 1874 had been established and continued, Canada would have been "practically, if not actually, a part of the United States at this moment." This is a very sweeping inference, and is not supported by the history of trade relations between the two countries. The reciprocity treaty of 1854 was negotiated by Lord Elgin with the object of quieting the annexation feeling in Canada, which was then running high. A large number of prominent Canadians had actually signed an annexation manifesto, among them being the late Sir John Abbott, who succeeded Sir John Thompson as Premier of Canada. The opening up of the American market to the natural products of Canada, and the great increase of prosperity that resulted, banished discontent in this country, and annexation sentiment disappeared. The Brown draft treaty of 1874 did not provide for so liberal a measure of free exchange as the Elgin treaty, and there is no reason to suppose it would have tended toward political union. It would have promoted good feeling between the two countries and would have been a great boon to Canada, but a prosperous and contented people have no desire to change their allegiance. Mr. Charlton is on sure ground, however, when he says that the repressive tariff policy by all citizens of Western Ontario." of the United States has driven the Canadian producer upon the British ing indifference on his part toward American reciprocity. He retired two or three years ago to resume the practice of law, and almost immediately took a leading place at the New York bar. Reed had a fine intellect; he was an incisive speaker and debater, with a caustic wit and a gift of epigram which did not always spare his political friends. He made enemies, like every man of strong individuality, and he disdained to curry favor by the small arts of the politician. He suffered also from the distrust of the brilliant man, who is not credited as a rule with being the safest man, President Roosevelt, who resembles Reed in his independence and force of character, has also excited antagonisms in his own party, because he retuses to bend to the will of those who control its machinery.

GREAT WORKS ON RIVER NILE

Their Completion Proclaimed by the King's Brother-Utility Proven.

London, Dec. 11.-What is spoken of Dress. as the opening of the Nile works at Assouan and Assiout by the Duke of Connaught is in reality the formal function of inspecting them when closed. The flood of the Nile ended in November, and the 180 sluices in the wall of masonry, a mile and a quarter long, were closed at the beginning of this month for the storage of water until the end of March. The completion of this remarkable work was proclaimed by the King's brother yesterday, and the remaining weir at Assiout, 200 miles distant, was reserved for final inspection on Saturday. The utility of the Assiout barrage has already been proved, since it raised the level of the water in the chief irrigating canal very materially during the exceptionally low Nile. The combined effect of the two dams will be an abundance of water for irrigation between March and August, without interruption, and the subsequent flow of the fertilizing current of the Nile flood. 
