OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—Before the Public Accounts Committee this morning Mr.

HUGE LAND GRANTS.

Big Gifts to Railway Corporations in the Northwest.

Election Act.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—The House went into committee on Hon. Mr. Dewdney's resolution respecting the granting of land to certain railways.

Hon. Mr. Dewdney explained that the resolution provided to grant land to 62 miles of the Manitoba and Southwestern Railway, the remainder of the line having been subsidized in 1884. In connection with this resolution he laid on the table a return showing the amount of land granted to each company in the Northwest. Including the C. P. R. grant 42,000,000 acres had been granted.

BYLAWS QUASHED.

POPE LEO XIII.



Leo XIII. is 81 years old. He was born in Carpinets, Central Italy, March 12, 1810. He belonged to an old patrician family. His name is Gioacchino Pecci. He studied at Viterbo, and at the Collegic Romano at Viterbo, and at the Collegio Romano was graduated in law and theology. He was a great student and admirer of the works of St. Thomas Aquinas. Pope Gregory XVI. in 1837 made young Pecci his chaplain. He was elected bishop of Damietta in 1843, and appointed nuncio to Belgium in the same year, where he remained until 1846. Then he became archibishop and bishop of Perugia. Plus IX. raised him to the dignity of a cardinal, and he was elected Pope Feb. 21, 1878. Although a strong advocate of the temporal dominion of the Popes, Leo XIII. is opposed to radical measures and extreme views. He has literary tastes, and practically edited a great part of the records of the Papal Court. Naturally there is always a certain amount of friction existing between the Quirinal, representing the temporal and secular power in Italy, and the Vatican. This is why there are such frequent reports of the Pope's being about to leave Rome. Of late years Leo XII. has been in great request as an arbitrator in integrational disputats. 

In concluding their report your committee would observe that the manner in which the several contracts were obtained by Larkin, Connolly & Co., from the Public Works Department and the Quebec Harbor Commisstasioners, the modifications subsequently made in these centracts in the interests of the firm, the enormous sums of money paid and allowed to them out of the public funds for extras and for damages, indicate without any reasonable doubt that this firm had grained a controlling influence over the Minister and Department of Public Works.

That influence we believe to have been largely exercised through Mr. Thomas Mc. Greevy.

It was suggested that the frauds might have been perpetrated upon the department through influences used upon Perley and Boyd, the engineers, but the closest examination of the books and the witnesses failed to disclose evidence of any improper payments having been made to Boyd, while the only one made to Perley was that in 1887 of the jewelry and diamonds—a time long after many of the contracts had been improperly awarded and moneys improperly paid.


