Sixteen Lives Probably Lost.

LONDON, May 16 .- The British bark Earl of Aberdeen, Capt. Patrick, from Barry Dock for Montevideo, got out of her course and ran on the rocks on the coast of the county of Pembroke. A heavy sea was running and all hands were compelled to abandon the vessel. Much difficulty was abandon the vessel. Much difficulty was experienced in clearing away the small boats, and it is supposed sixteen of the crew were drowned by the capsizing of their boat after they had gotten away from the wreck. Thirteen men from the wreck have landed at Milford Haven.

Seven more survivors from the wrecked bark have arrived at Cardiff, making 22 in all that are known to have been saved.

There had been an indisposition on the part of members, he said, to face the question of prohibition equarely. Various Parliamentary expedients had been devised for shunting it so that they would not have to vote fairly so that they would not have to vote fairly upon it. Petitions had flowed in from the upon it. Petitions had flowed in from the people asking for prohibition last session, and it was thought the House would face the question, but it had appointed a second commission and they were now waiting for its report. The money spent for intoxicants is not only wasted, but in many cases crime follows, and additional trouble and expense is heaped upon the individual and upon the State. Daily observation is borne out by the facts of science and by statistics that have been prepared. Of 40,000 prisoners whose cases Dr. Baer, a Swiss expert, investigated, 42 per cent. were occasional or habitual drunkards. The occasionals were more numerous than the habituals, for the former frequently commit crimes in noments of sudden passion, and this is seldom or never true of degraded habitual drunkards. The graphic statistical particulars which the expert presented showed that 32 per cent. of all cases of theft, 77 per cent. of all cases of offense against decency, and a larger per-centage of cases of offense against the person are occasioned by the deeds of drinkers. Of cases of injury to property and to the body, and cases of domestic disturbance, an absolute majority are chargeable to drunkards. The influence of alcohol is shown frequently in other directions. Crimes are much more numer ous on those days when the most alcohol is consumed -on Saturday (pay-day) and such like days. These facts, as Dr. Baer says, speak in plain terms, and seriously appeal to us to put a stop to one of the chief ources of crime.

The first great step necessary to effective action is to find where the people stand. That, as we have shown, has been accom-plished locally in this city without the slightest trouble. Why should there be delay in carrying the principle out in a plebiscite for the entire country?

Espinosa made as good a defense as he could, but after a light brush with Gen. Gil he surrendered as did 200 troopers under him. The men immediately enrolled themselves under the insurgent banner. A few were killed or wounded on both sides. Gen. Gil now occupies Bolivar with nearly 2,500 well-armed men.

For beef she is worthless because she cannot be fattened to pay for what she eats. In other words a dairy cow can never be converted into beef without loss. If she is a real dairy cow she will be worth more in the dairy than in beef, so long as she is is in dairy condition. When she passes that period it is too late to fatten her at a profit.

—The Shropshire, Hampshire and Southdown may perhaps be justly said to be the best kinds of farm sheep, in the order named. The first is a medium-size animal, having a good flerge of clothing -A cow that has ceased to be profitable

This is due to the fact that the Southdown is the finest mutton sheep in the world, and all the black-faced kinds have been bred from it. The Shrop-shire is a larger Southdown, the Hampshire larger still, while the little Southdown is best fitted for the farmer who can afford to rear a small sheep for its fine quality, with-out rezard to profit. out regard to profit.

—Nitrate of soda not only doubles or trebles the yield of strawberries but the berries are handsomer, and consequently command a much higher price in market. Nitrate of soda is, at least, equally as good for raspberries as for strawberries. On currants with clean cultivation, large crops of fine fruit have been raised with a top-dressing of nitrate of soda slone, applied on each side of the rows in the spring.

—The Wellhouse orchard of Kansas is becoming known the world over. After the trees have come into bearing the ground is sown to clover. This is cut every year when the seed is ripe and allowed to remain on the ground. The trees are low-headed, trained in pyramidal form, with limbs starting out about one foot from the ground. Most of the insect enemies are destroyed by spraying with london purple. Almost five-sixths of all the fruit thus grown can be reached by the pickers while standing on the ground. In the packing-house the apples are carefully assorted by hand. Three and even four grades are made. All unfit for use are left in the field or fed to hogs. The yield on the 225 acres in 1890, was 79,170 bushels.
