The Terror of Dynamite Fiends Again Invades London.

Hundreds of Detectives Guarding the Public Buildings.

Professional Beggars Have a Newspaper Organ.

Labouchere's Plan for Reducing Big Fortunes—A Royal Heart on the Auction Block — Startling Pranks of an Alligator.

London, Dec. 12.—Now it is London's tunt to be put under the terror of dynamite fiends. A gigantic plot is on the eve of execution, and the utmost energies of the Government are being exerted to ayert the catastrophe. The police know that the Anarchists have planned a frightful revenge for the extradition of their comrade Francois, but they do not know just where the blow is to iall. The result is that Westminster, Downing street, the law courts and other public buildings are guarded day and night by an army of detectives. The explosion was expected to take place Friday night. Three hundred men from Scotland Yard guarded the Parliament building alone. A detective stood in front of every door, every window and at every doorner and angle. The residences of the detectives who arrested Francois, the magistrates who heard his case, and the court and jail where he was confined were similarly protected. The fact that nothing happened does not prove the slarm to be baseless. The system of spying upon the enemies of society in England and France is very complete. The information which the agents of Scotland Yard gained a few days ago among the Anarchists is said to be very authentic. The plotters had then an ample supply of dynamite and nitro-glycerine. They lacked only a reliable detons tor or exploding apparatus. This their conferers in Paris agreedito supply. The strictest watch has been maintained ever since at Dover, Folkestone, and other Channel ports to detect the device in transit if possible. It has not been discovered, and the detectives are presumably ignorant whether it has yet been delivered. Several Anarchists in London are under suspicion, but as the location of the incriminating explosives is unknown no arrests have yet been made. As soon as the investigation has progressed a step further it is said to be the plan to throw out a drag net suddenly and arrest many suspected dynamiters in London. Meantime the policy of maintaining a special guard of Government buildings will be continued. It is learned that

A POINTER FOR PATENT MEDICINE MEN.
Patent medicine advertisers who offer to bank on the virtues of their remedies can be compelled to redeem their promises in the English courts. A test case decided this week by the Court of Appeals establishes an interesting precedent for America as well. A year ago, when the influenza was prevalent, the Carbolic Smoke Ball Company, in an advertisement, guaranteed immunity from the disease to everybody who used the remety three times daily for two weeks, £100 to be the forfeit. Mrs. Carlill used the emoke ball faithfully for three weeks and then the epidemic selzedher. She sent in her claim for £100, but the money wasn't paid. All sorts of oxcuses were offered. It was argued that the offer was a mere device to attract attention, a wager vague in its terms, that there was not a complete contract, because Mrs. Carlill did not notify the company of her acceptance of the offer. All these excuses have been brushed aside by the courts in which Mrs. Carlill brought suit. Lord Justice Bowen, in the decision, likens the case to the offer of a reward for a lost dog. People do not write letters to the advertiser accepting his offer, but they look for the dog. It is safe to say that the decision will work a sweeping modification of the claims made on behalf of the thousand and one cure-alls in the public prints.



THE IMPERIAL FEDERATION FAD. When we speak of the Imperial Federation fad, we mean no disrespect to those who honestly hold the view indicated But it will not make headway. The discussion may nevertheless be useful in directing attention to other possible futures for Canada. The Toronto Week sums up the subject as follows: "The two great wants of Canada to-day are the national status which will enable her to compete on even terms with her powerful neighbor for her share in the influx of men and money which have enabled that neigher to develop her resources with unexampled rapidity; and a free continental market for such of her pro-ducts as cannot be profitably sent abroad. Will Imperial Federation give her either of these things? Of what real, practical benefit to her in the first named respect would any such representation as could sonceivably be given her in the proposed Imperial Council really be? How much of either the consciousness or the prestige of cationality would result? Would not the position of her people be still re-garded everywhere as one of inferiority, of virtual colonial subordination? And in respect to the second great need—it is no respect to the second great need—it is no compliment to our republican neighbors to say it, but we are in search of truth—can it be doubted by anyone who knows the situation that our closer connection with Great parts of the river or inlets to it shall be used for cooling purposes only, until such time as fully described as our third great need."

THANKS, NOT ANY!

The eloquent Mr. Parkin is giving the death blow to Imperial Federation by his frank avowal that Canada would be expected to contribute to Britain's naval and military armaments. The little object lesson of present European armaments does not stir up the enthusiasm of imitation in the breasts of Canadians. The New York Sun gives some interesting figures. This year the French army has risen to 2,500,-000; the Russian to 2,451,000; the German to 2,417,000; the Italian, which now occupies the fourth place, to 1,514,000; the Austrian to 1,050,000; the Swiss to 212,-000, and the Belgian to 128,000. In most these countries the expenditure military purposes has more than doubled since 1869, and in Switzerland the increase has been much greater. Viewed collectively, Europe now spends more than a thousand millions of dollars annually on her fighting force, which already amounts to 12,500,000. Such figures, however, give but an imperfect idea of the state of things which will presently exist as soon as the new military laws shall have come into full effect. Then the German army will comprise 5,000,000 men; the French, 4,350,000; the Russian, 4.000.000: the Italian, 2.236,000; the Aus trian, 1,900,000; the Swiss, 489,000, and the Belgian, 258,000. Altogether Europe will be able to dispose of not less than 22,000,000 soldiers, or 15,000,000 more

than she had in 1869. Thanks; not any ! Canada is not thirsting for either military gore or military glory. We have our Col. Denison. Quantum sufficit.

WOMEN TO BE ADMITTED AS ON-TARIO SOLICITORS.
Miss Clara Brett Martin, of Toronto,

studied law, then presented her diploma to the Benchers, a board of representative lawyers who sit at Toronto and manage the affairs of the profession. The Benchers refused her permission to practice. The matter came up at the last session of the Ontario Legislature, when a majority vote favored allowing women who were properly qualified and who desired to do so to enter upon the practice of the legal profession. The Benchers were "empowered" to admit women. Not exactly a mandate, but coming from a Parliament, a pretty broad hint.

Yesterday the Benchers sat in state on

THE first public exhibition of the tele noto was given the other night at Buffalo by the inventor. The inventor is C. V. Beughton. nent consists of a series of wires and electrical appratus, operated by kenboard similar to that of a typewriter. There are 106 electric lights operated by a keyboard and contained in a it 27 feet long, which may be taken apart and reduced to compact form. The large number of lamps is required to regulate the spaces between the letters in relative proportions. The lights flash the characters of the Morse alphabet. The dots are represented by two lamps and the dashes by tweive lamps. The experiments were successful. The lights could be seen ten miles out on the lake. A complete machine will be built and packed at the disposal of the Government, to be exhibited on the model of the warship Chicago at the World's Fair.

As for the necessity for ice water in London at any season of the year, it simply does not exist. We obtain our water supply ist. from ever-flowing springs. It comes to our homes and to places of public resort the year. There may be those who prefer ice water, with all its risks, to the unadulterated article, but we cannot admire their taste. The drinking of ice-cold water when the thermometers reach the eighties is

The payment of "Wroth silver," which The payment of "Wroth silver," which was made to the Duke of Buccleuch as lord of the Hundred of Knightlow at sunrise on Friday week at Knightlow Hill, Warwickshire, England, is one of the most curious and ancient customs still surviving in the midland counties. The payment is believed to have been made since the days of Edward III. but even the origin of the custom is abrouded in the mists of the fardistant past. Dugdale attributes the payment to the more general one of ward money paid by tonants for military care of their crops and herds; other historians have confused it with "wrath money," a tribute laid upon districts as compensation for the murder of some notable persont and a third explanation is that the payment was intended as an acknowledgment of the claim of the lord of the hundred to unenclosed slips of land used for grazing purposes within the lordship of the hundred. The "Wroth silver" is paid by the representatives of 28 parishes, though a number are now regular defaulters, to the agent of the Duke of Buccleuch at sunrise on Martimms Day. The representatives assemble at the stone where the duke's agent reads

the charter of "Wroth silver," after which they drop the coins in a hollow which time has worn in the stone. The company then adjourn to a neighboring inn, where the health of the Duke of Buccleuch is drunk in glasses of rum and milk. The "Wroth silver" only amounts in the aggregate to about 9 shillings, and as default is made by several of the parishes upon which larger dues are exacted, merely a nominal sum is received; but the custom is honored for its historic associations.
