He made a long speech in which he said that the German school was a specific that the German school was a specific that the German school was a specific institute like a corps of efficers, and could not be easily imitated. The French system was an uncomfortable, neighborly influence of her schools which inculcated chauvinim, national vanity and ignorance of

the geography and history of other nations. Germany should profit by the lesson, and oppose her former propensity to special subjects which diverted national thoughts. "Already," he said, "the schools have the thankful task of strengthening that feeling. We are all Germans. We have now become a great united nation. We have formed institutions under which we live and become as a nation, enabling us to play a part not inferior to that of Great Britain, Russia or France, whose unity was founded earlier than ours. The unity of Germany is now so firm that it would be difficult to separate us, even if political errors were made. We shall go together wherever necessary, but we ought to be otherwise indulgent of peculiarities of the various States. The German dynasties can contribute essentially to maintain these peculiarities. Among them Bavaria has been a powerful pillar of the empire, wherefore I ask you to join me in cheers and hochs for Bavaria." The speech was received with great enthusiasm. MONTREAL, Aug. 14.—A great Liberal meeting was held here this atternoon. Between 7,000 and 8,000 people gathered on the exhibition grounds and listened to addresses from Hon. Wilfrid Laurier, the Liberal leader, Sir Richard Cartwright, Mr. Eigar, M.P., Mr. Sutherland, M.P., Mr. Tarte, M.P., Mr. Brodeur, M.P., and many ether speakers.

Mr. Laurier met with a most enthusiastic welcome. He outlined the policy of the Liberal party as declared in the platform adopted at the recent Ottawa convention. He denounced the protective policy of the Conservative party, and declared strongly in favor of tariff reform and freedom of trade with the United States.

Sir Richard Cartwright also vigorously attacked the protective system, which, he said, benefited the few at the expense of the great mass of people and must be done away with. He predicted an early triumph for the Liberal party.

Mr. Tarte, M.P., defended his stand on the Manitoba school question, and said he was prepared to explain his position in any part of Canada, despite the threats of the Conservative party.

An Average of 80,000 Persons Attend

CMICAGO, Aug. 14.—According to the report presented to the directors by President Seeberger, up to and including Aug. 10, the coat of creating and maintaining the World's Fair was \$23,101,821 16. This 10, the cost of creating and maintaining the World's Fair was \$23,101,821 16. This does not include the floating indebtedness, which amounts to several hundred thousand dollars. The treasurer now has on hand cash to the amount of \$527,254 91; gate receipts, \$2,356,939 81; from other sources, mainly concessions, \$2,326,930 has been collected. The gross daily receipts are now averaging \$80,000. The expenses are \$17,000. Since Aug. I an average of about \$40,000 per day has been paid on account of indebtedness. Mr. Seeberger incorporated in his report a statement concerning the souvenir silver dollars, showing that while they had a satisfactory sale since the opening of the fair the demand for them is increasing, with every prospect that the entire issue will be exhausted.

HUNTING SWORD-FISH.

What Was Idle Sport Has Beccme Prefitable Business.

Norwich, Conn., Aug. 14.—The rare and thrilling sport and lucrative business, too, along the coast just now is that of killing sword-fish. To chase and harpoon sword-fish was, until less than half a dozen years ago, the sport exclusively of summer idlers at the seashore watering places; but since the world has learned to like the flesh of these armed pirates of the ocean, many 'longshore tishermen have found it flesh of these armed pirates of the ocean, many longshore tishermen have found it profitable to hunt them for the New England markets. New York alone either has not tested this fish for food or else rejects it, and it is said that not a sword-fish finds its way to metropolitan tables. In New England, however, it is esteemed to be second in merit only to bluefish, and a thick, savory, white, juey sword-fish steek is rated far more highly than a halibut steak. The fish are hunted in deep waters, about 20 or 25 miles southeast of Block Island, along the inner edge of the Gulf Stream. To these westers a little fleet of sword-fisher-25 miles southeast of Block Island, along it he inner edge of the Gulf Stream. To these waters a little fleet of sword-fishermen, smacks and sailboats bound away from the gray old port of Stonington, in the southern part of this county, once or twice a week, and return a few days later, their decks piled with the long, rakish bodies of from 15 to 40 sword-fish, each weighing from 250 to 400 pounds. The biggest fellows taken off this coast sometimes weigh 600 pounds, and rarely one is taken that weighs 800. Most of the fish are shipped direct to Boston, and one day this week not less than sixty-four fish, weighing

that weighs 890. Most of the fish are shipped direct to Boston, and one day this week not less than sixty-fourfish, weighing from 250 to 400 pounds, were sent to that market from New London alone. Block Island also sends out a sword-fish fleet, which makes handsome catches, and Captain Frank Dodge, of the island, has successfully used a steam yacht in hunting them this week. He took twenty-seven big fellows on his first trip.



British Gossip

The American financial situation has at length been brought home to the people of England as a matter of the greatest per sonal concern. Every other European capital has been able to resist America's clamorous demand for gold. The drain is being made almost solely from London. The Bank of England had a large gold reserve when the American demands began. This is disappearing faster than ever before in the history of the institution Measures for meeting the emergency are likewise unprecedented. The bank never before made such rapid advances in the discount rate. It is quite probable that it will be necessary to make a further advance to 5 per cent. within a few days.

The whole world is locking up its gold. The premium on the metal is 9 per cent. in Rome and 17 per cent. in Madrid. London bankers are making preparations to compel some continental hoarders to disgorge a portion of their treasures. It would be easy to create a currency famine throughout Europe as acute as that of the past few days in America. It is already recognized that the embarrassment of the United States cannot long be localized. The effect of this knowledge is a rapid The effect of this knowledge is a rapid modification of the opinions of both men and governments in Europe. Never before was it clearly realized that the financial world is after all only a unit, and that a disturbance in America must have its effect

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in Russia and vice versa. in Russia and vice versa.

Another resort to a monetary conference is being discussed in a very different spirit from that with which the invitation of the President of the United States was greeted a year ago. It is quite possible that the countries which sent delegates to Brussels only as a matter of courtesy will take the initiative of calling another consultation, and will join earnestly in search of a practical solution of the monetary problem.

The announcement of a possible agreement between England and the United States has been widely discussed during the last two days. The Situation Critical.

European diplomacy has a great deal to think about just now. The attitude of Great Britain is generally regarded as having distinctly changed by reason of the France-Siamese incident. An invitation to-day from Germany to join a defensive alliance would not arouse the popular protest in England which compelled the Government to deny consideration of a similar suggestion from Prince Bismarck fifteen years ago. The belief is becoming general that the whole subject was discussed informally during the Emperor's visit to Cowes last week. An attempt has been made the last day or two to offset the effect of these rumors on the Continent by the report that Italy intends to draw from the Friple Alliance and to join her forces with denying while France continues in her present temper of spoiling for a fight. The wnoie European situation is, in a certain sense, critical. The prospect of closer bonds between Great Britain and Germany is therefore a welcome sign of peace. It would mean an indefinite postponement of France's dearest hopes of revenge. When the French people realize this, we may expect a more serious display of popular exasperation than in the recent Paris riots.

Here, also, the leaders, who desire to bring the session to a close, were balked by the savage temper of their followers, who oppose everything that savors of a truce with the Government.

Summoning Sir Charles, therefore, may have an im-portant significance.

Where Union Is Strength. Gladstone's decision to have an autumn session has given intense relief and satisfaction to his Radical and Irish supporters. The Irish members will be certain to attend an autumn session, in order to give Gladstone a majority without which he could no more pass a bill for the benefit of could no more pass a bill for the benefit of English workingmen than his measure for the better government of Ireland. THE FIRST OF THE INCIDENTAL QUESTIONS attaching to the subject of retention were whether the entire present number of 103 Irish members were to be retained; on what hasis, if that number was to be reduced, the reduction should rest; and whether the members who were to appear at Westminster should be selected by the Legislature in Dublin or by a separate popular election involving something of an electoral reconstruction for Ireland.

The House of Commons has decided on reducing the number of 103 to 80, in conformity with the relation of the present Irish population to that of Great Britain, and has also determined that these 80 members should be directly and separately chosen. Thus far the arrangements present no feature which calls at present for remark. But there was greater difficulty in disposing of the question whether the 80 representatives to be returned to Parliament were to come there with the full powers of their British colleagues, and to be entitled to vote not only upon questions i locally belonging to England, Scotland and Wales, or whether they were TO VOTE UFON IMPERIAL QUESTIONS ALONE. It was impossible to regard Ireland as hav-

tion, and nothing less than outrageous as a prophecy.

To sum up in a few words. In 1886 we proposed to proceed without retention. We were overruled from a practical point of view. Home rule and retention are before us. We could have both or neither. 

2. The Dominion Government will pay freight charges from the factories to these points and from these points to Chicago and return, as well as the cost of caring for the cheese during the exhibition and until they are disposed of afterwards.

3. The Government will make payments on account to the several exhibitors of dairy products to nearly the full market value.

value.

4. The cheese from every factory, which will merit the highest number of points when judged in October, no matter in what month they are made, are wanted; probably those from the make of the last half of August or the first ten days in September will be best.

5. They must reach Ingersoll or Montreal not later than Sept. 26.

6. Similar arrangements have been made for the exhibit of butter, but only one package from any creamery or dairy is needed.

7. A bulletin of detailed information, address labels and entry forms may be obtained free on application to the dairy commissioner, Ottawa.
