



### Shower of Shot.

British Fruit Steamer Chased by Spanish Gunboats.

They Believed the Famous Filibuster Capt. John D. Hart, Was Aboard the Steamer.

Philadelphia, May 25.-The British fruit steamer, Ethelred, just arrived, reports an exciting experience with Spanish gunboats. Capt. John D. Hart intended to go on the trip, but was arrested as he was about to go aboard. It is thought the Spaniards believed he was aboard, and attempted to capture

The first encounter with the Spanish cruisers occurred off Cape Maisi, on the trip down. Just after dusk on Sunday evening, May 16, a gunboat without any lights shot out from under the Maisi capes, and crowding on all steam steered directly for the fruit vessel. After steaming for an hour without gaining an inch, the gunboat turned a searchlight on the other vessel and steam was crowded on the Ethelred. A ond later a solid shot cut the wate a half a mile ahead of her bows. Then came a second and third shot, much nearer than the others. Capt. Israe kept on his course, and after another hour's hot chase the Spaniard dropped

The second chase happened last Thursday afternoon, in almost the exact spot in which the first attempt to hold the vessel up occurred. Just as the Ethelred rounded Cape Maisi a big Spanish gunboat of the newest type started out from under the cape and gave chase, every now and then firing solid shot at the fruiter. After two hours' fruitless chase, another steam-ship was sighted, and the gunboat sheered off and gave vigorous chase to the newly discovered steamer. The Ethelred flew the British flag.





> During the Day-The Service perfect-Opening of the New Park Theater.

Springbank Park was invaded by a throng of visitors yesterday numbering thousands. There were more people there than were ever at the park at one time before. The popularity of the electric railway exceeded Manager Carr's most sanguine expectations. On all the lines of the city, including the park railway, it is estimated, in round numbers, 30,000 fares were collected. Of course, passengers on the park line paid four fares, so that the total number of patrons of the railway for the day would be about 10,000.

It was the biggest day in the history of the railway, and the manner in which the crowds were furnished transportation gave every satisfaction. by the company a year ago and yesterday shows the wonderful changes effected in the possibilities of the rail-way by the double tracking.
