

ASK TWO-YEAR TERM

Increases Over Present Rate Will Vary From Six to Nine Per Cent.

The public utilities board last night approved the wage schedule for electric al workers submitted by General Manager Glanbitz. The advance over the present scale is from six to nine per cent, and, although the new figures are considerably lower than those approved by the Toronto commission, Mr. Glanbitz said the men were prepared to accept the schedule. He explained that onditions under which the mer worked were much more dangerous in Toronto than here.

New Garbage Collection Idea of Toronto's May Be Tried Here.

NO CURB COLLECTION

Three Gangs of Men Required But It Eliminates Ob-

London's critics of the garbage system are watching with some interest and experiment that is to be tried out in Toronto. It is known as the "roller" system of collection, and will eliminate the objections of the curb collection system that have been raised here.

This roller system is operated by the stem. The fumes are sucked are brought from the house to the curb three gangs of men. The garbage cans up into the mouthpiece by the smoker. by men in advance of the collection Where the police expect to find the wagons, and, after the material has been placed in the carts, the empty cans follow up the collectors.

Just what the cost will be is an unknown quantity. Naturally it will be an advance over the curb collection, where the householders have to place the cans nemselves, but it is claimed that it will be materially less than if the collectors had to bring out the cans, as is done under the present London system.

Board of Health's Disapproval. Excessive cost of garbage disposal in London has raised the question of curb coffection. It has been declared that a saving of \$18,000 can be saved if the curb collection was adorted, but the board of health has declared that it would never tolerate having the cans left beside the streets.

In Toronto and other cities, where the curb collection of garbage is in vogue, great objection has been raised to the nsanitary and unsightly nuisance that It creates. If It Decides To Oppose Austria, Germany Will Help Latter.

ERVIA HAS ULTIMATUM

he Does Not Agree to Ausria's Demands, War Is Probable.

[Canadian Press.] Serlin, July 24.—The grave possibility mected with the strong Austrian note Servia, which took virtually the form an ultimatum, demanding the supession of the Pan-Servian movement hd the punishment of those concerned the assassination on June 28 in Bosnia of the late Archduke Francis Ferdinand, is recognized in official circles here. It is realized in these quarters that further serious developments in Austro-Servian relations are inevitable unless Servia complies with the Austrian demands. It is believed in some quarters that the Servians will yield, unless assured of support from outside, and for this reason official eyes here are turned to day less to Belgrade than to St. Peters. burg, where the decision of the counci of ministers is expected to settle the question of peace or war.

Germany Ready. It was stated today that Germany had not been consulted regarding the Austrian note to Servia before its delivery, but that she thoroughly approved the step taken, and was prepared for all the consequences that might ensue from

It was pointed out that should Russia take part against Austria, Germany was fully prepared to draw the sword on behalf of her ally, in accordance with the terms of the Triple Alliance between Germany, Austria and Italy. Supports Austria.

Comment in the German press today strongly supports Austria. Radical organs, such as the Tageblatt and the Frankfort Gazette, which are in close touch with the financial world, and are usually strongly pacific, find the terms of the Austrian note amply justified. Newspapers such as the Zeltung Ammittag and the Vossische Zeitung, which are quickly responsive to the popular sentiment, also are pro-Austrian, and evidently still feel the influence of the assassination of the archduke.

Stocks Are Weak. The stock market broke badly under the fear of a general European compli-Solid bank stocks, like those of the Deutsche Bank, broke over two points, and other leading stocks fron: three to four points, until the banks intervened to check further demoralization of the market.

Securities in large amounts, however, had been unloaded at the decline, and the breaks in Austrian and Russian specialties assumed a most panicky form. The Orient Railway and Turkish Tobacco registered stocks fell ten points, Russian Petroleums sixteen points, and Russian banks from seven to eleven points. The weakness in Russian and Austrian bonds also indicated the seriousness of the situation. Reservists Recalled.

CIVIC FINANCES.

HE city auditor has prepared some figures relating to our debenture indebtedness which supply rather interesting reading. It appears that the total new amounts to \$6,269,286.60. Deducting sinking fund on hand to meet this to the extent of \$427,081.85, we have a net debenture debt of \$5,842,204.75. Under the act there is a limit to the borrowing per cent of its total assessment. In our we have actually exceeded what is considered the safe limit by more than a million and a quarter.

Actually, but not legally. By special legislation two large sums \$700,000 for the electrification scheme, and about \$550,000 for the waterworks are not included in the city's indebtedness, being charged against the railway and the waterworks. But as the city owns these two enterprises, and is financially responsible for them, it does not alter the situation. The city owes the money all the same. The only deduction that can be properly made is the propertyholders' share of the local improvement debentures, amounting to \$335,439.35. And the only difference in this case is that the sum will have to be collected in taxes from a part of the citizens, instead of being a charge against all of them. In brief, London's indebtedness amounts to something over \$100 for every man, woman and child comprising

That this heavy debt involves increasing taxation is something unavoidable. The city clerk's little manual of information for 1914 shows us that the tax rate for this year is greater than ever. now the city council will have to borrow some \$300,000 from the bank. And it is charge it to the contingency fund. safe to assume that it will have to pay a higher rate of interest than if the dehentures had been sold. Next year we Stanley unprotected by competent will have to commence paying for the entire \$700,000. And there will be no decrease in other expenditures to offset this. In some items we may expect a decided increase.



BY MADAME CAILLAUX. (In an interview with Mary Boyle O'Reilly for The Advertiser.) Paris, France, July 23 .- "You are

aware of the campaign which Monsieur Gaston Calmette was waging against my husband. A letter was published. I knew that other letters would be published, too. I went to Monsieur Monier, president of the civil courts, for advice how to put an end to this campaign. He told me that it could not be stopped. Driving home with my husband from the ministry of finance, I told him of his friend's decision. He said: 'Then will go and smash Calmette's face. I asked him if he meant to do it that day. The two women arrived at the entrance to the palace this morning carrying a large scroll prettily draped with purple ribbon streamers. They stated that they had a petition to pre-sent to his majesty. The attendants, however, persuaded them to leave, but they returned later and announced their determination to remain until they were given an audience with the King. 


