## BENNETT'S WOULD BUY ENTIRE SMALL INTERESTS IN CANADA

### Company Approach Theatrical Magnate on Matter, But Negotiations Have Not Been Opened-Canadian Circuit Included.

It was stated today that the Bennett Theatrical Enterprises Company, of this city, has made an offer to A. J. Small, the Toronto theatrical magnate, to buy out his entire circuit in the Dominion of Canada.

The statement was further made that the Bennett people had offered Mr. Small the sum of \$1,000,000 for the circuit and its connections, and that the offer, having been refused, was later increased to the sum of \$1,250,000.

THE HOUSES INVOLVED. The theaters affected would be the Grand and Toronto Opera Houses in Toronto, the Grand in Hamilton, the Grand in Ottawa, the Grand in London and the Grand in Kingston.

All these houses are owned by Mr. Small.

In addition, Mr. Small controls the bookings of practically every theater between Windsor and Toronto, excepting, of course, the vaudeville theaters, which are controlled by the Bennett people in London and Ottawa, the Savoy In Hamilton, and the Shea house in Toronto.

There are also two dramatic houses in Toronto not controlled by Mr.



Buffalo Financier Declared Not Guilty of Murdering Partner.

Buffalo, April29. -"Not guilty" was the verdict returned tonight by the jury in the case of Aloysius S. Mc-Garry, who was charged with murdering Josiah Ross, the aged manufac-

The jury was out three hours and twelve minutes. Five ballots were taken. The first stood seven for acquittal, one blank, and four guilty. The second and third showed but little change, but on the fourth all but one

voted not guilty. The final ballot, acquitting McGarry, was taken about 9 o'clock. Josiah Ross was found dead in the

office of his Niagara street manufacturing establishment on March 18 with a bullet in his head, under circumstances pointing to suicide. The police and the medical examiner were at first of the opinion that Ross killed himself, Mrs. Ross and others placed information in the hands of the district attorney which resulted in McGarry's indictment on a charge of murdering the old man.

McGarry was a junior partner, but it was claimed that he had not paid for the stock which gave him an interest in the firm. The defense sought to prove that Ross committed suicide.



Dust, it has long been known, is a favored hiding-place for the bacteria




