Kaiser Deprived of Power To Make War or Peace, Says Note Reaching Washington Today

AUSTRIANS PRECIPITATE

AUSTRIANS ARE FLEEING FROM ALLIED ARMIES ALONG PIAVE

Retreat of Enemy Before the British, French and Italian Forces Is Assuming the Proportions of a Rout.

Italian Headquarters on the Piave, Tuesday, Oct. 29.—(By the Associated Press).-Austrian forces are retreating under everincreasing pressure, and it is felt that the attack against the enemy will become overwhelming as soon as the entire Allied force

With three successive days of fair weather, an extremely large body of troops, with supplies, has crossed the pontoons over the Piave, and it is expected that the Austrian munition supply will give out. There are indications that the enemy's heavy artillery is being withdrawn in an effort to save the big guns

The American Red Cross is preparing to assist the Italian population in towns evacuated by the Austrians. The majority of these people are old men and women and children. For ten miles back from the river the country has been desolated. Only one Powers of Resistance Weakhouse is left standing in Cimadolemo. The latest reports show the Austrians retreating steadily to save themselves in the Piave district, where 150 guns and a thousand additional prisoners were captured today. Monte Grappa has been attacked violently by the enemy, however, but the action resulted in his repulse.

Paris, Oct. 30.—The second note of Count Julius Andrassy. Austro-Hungarian foreign minster, to President Wilson, is interpreted as evidence that Austria is in a desperate plight, and has exhausted her powers of resistance.

"The Danublan monarchy seeks an issue all the more promptly because it knows of the anger aroused across the Rhine by its defection and the desire of vengeance which inspires the Berlin cabinet," says the Petit Parisien, and other newspapers. Other writers strike a note of caution. Paris, Oct. 30.—Gen. Debeney's first army has gained new successes in the encircling of Guise, according to the official statement from the war office today.

North of Guise they have taken the Beaufort Farm, north of the Oise. Along the Peron River, south of Guise, the French have progressed east of Monceau-le-Neuf and captured prisoners.

The official statement reads: North of Guise we have advanced on the north bank of the Oise and captured the Beaufort Farm, west of Lesquielles-St. Germain. On the right of the Peron we have made a new advance east of Monceau-le-Neuf, taking prisoners.

Work of Provisioning Houses Where Help Is Needed Continues.

few more orders for food are coming in daily at the Alexandra School diet kitchen, but the number of cancelled orders greatly exceeds this number, orders greatly exceeds this number, which would go to prove that the influenza epidemic is beginning to wane. However, yesterday about 100 baskets of food were sent out, and there will be need of supplies until the end of this week at least. Every possible care is being taken so that the food will be distributed where needed, and therefore it may be sent only to homes which have been investigated by either a doctor or the board of health. The request of one woman who sent in an order for a chicken dinner, a broom and a ton of coal, as well as that of another who asked for a custard, since it was her ironing day, were promptly ignored. However, very little advantage has been taken of food distribution, most people being more willing to help than take advantage.

Not Charity.

Perhaps the greatest difficulty of all has been the refusal on the part of some to take what they considered was charity, and oftentimes it took a great deal of persuasion on the part of the S. O. WOUNDED SOLDIER FOUND HELPLESS ON LONELY ROAD


Pte. Stackdale Subsisted on Roots For Days Following Accident.





Sir Thomas White in his speech at Winnipeg on October announced the terms of the Victory Loan, 1918, as follows Through the prospectus of the fifth Canadian war loan -the Victory Loan of 1918-the Dominion of Canada will ask for a minimum amount of \$300,000,000, with the right to accept all or any part of subscriptions in excess of that sum. to be used for war purposes only, and to be spent wholly in Canada. The rate of interest will be 51/2 per cent per annum, payable May 1 and November 1, and the denominations \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1,000. The loan will be offered in 2 maturities—five year bonds, due November 1, 1923, and 15-year oonds, due November 1, 1933.

The issue price will be 100 and accrued interest for both

naturities, making the income return 51/2 per cent per annum. Provision is made for payment in five instalments as follows: 10 per cent on application; 20 per cent December 6, 1918; 20 per cent January 6, 1919; 20 per cent February 6, 1919; 31.16 per cent March 6, 1919. The last payment of 31.16 per cent covers 30 per cent balance of principal and 1.16 pet cent representing accrued interest at 5½ per cent from November 1 to due dates of the respective instalments. 

Eat Fish Tomorrow and Keep National Fish Day

Food Board Asks That Fish M eals Be Served on October 31 to Honor Fisherman Who Will Soon Be Facing Win ter Gales.

The last day of October stands out in the calendar for two reasons this year. According to time-worn custom it will see the celebration of Halloween. Its war time significance in the calendar, however, lies in the fact that it is Canada's National Fish Day.

It may come as a surprise to many to learn that Canada has a national fish day, formerly inaugurated by the Candan Fisheries Association in 1915, and precurser of the American Salmon Day, which is now a national institution.

dlan Fisheries Association in 1915, and precurser of the American Salmon Day, which is now a national institution.

The Canada Food Board asks that tomorrow, the 31st, be made an absolutely meatless day, and that fish be used in every home. If this is done conscientiously by all and sundry, the saving in meat will amount to three million pounds in round numbers—sufficient to provide hair a pound of meat per man to six million of the allied soldiers on the western front.

In addition to what it enables us to send overseas, the National Fish Day is intended to do honor to the brave fisherman who, with the coming of November, begins his stiff fight with storms, gales, cold and all the hardships to which his class falls heir. Year in, year out, they

class falls heir. Year in, year out, they toil at great personal hazard, to satisfy our demands, and special remembrance our demands, and special remembrance is surely due them for their valiant efforts during the past three or four years, when the perils of war and ruthless submarine campaigning have been added to the danger that attends the seafaring life at all times. fe at all times.
The annual value of Canada's fisher-

The annual value of Canada's fisher-les at the present time is approximately \$52,000,000, but the bulk of the fish caught is exported for lack of a domes-tic market. It would be easy to treble the fishery resources of Canada without any visible diminution in the supply. Within three years the value of our fisheries has increased 40 per cent. The consumption is still somewhat meagre. consumption is still somewhat meagre, although it has been stimulated to such an extent through the efforts of the Canada Food Board that it has increascanada rood Board that it has increased 100 per cent on an average during the last year, and 700 per cent in certain localities. Even when this has been taken into account, however, it is low in comparison with the pre-war per capital of Great Britain and other European rations. At least one round of the





With the discovery and use of antiseptics, asepsis, isinfection, preventive and protective measures against the germs usually pre-sent, erysipelas has become about as fare as those other two preventable germ scourges, hydrophobla and small-Very recently at Camp Cody, New Mexico, further researches by Major R. T. Woodyatt and Lieut. A. A. Avata upon 104 victims of crysipelas has added more knowledge to the treatment of a sailment.

After high winds and dust storms, particularly, an influx of crysipelas patients to the base hospital was noticeable.

Prevalent methods of treatment are the application of ichthyol, iodine, among the application of ichthyol, iodine, ammoniated mercury or other mercury applications, and the use of vaccine and Amely and the use of vaccine and anti-streptococcus serum.

In 1888 an American physician, Dr.

Charles Stein of Baltimore treated crystolas with collodion, after called "liquid skin."

A.—Bathe your foot three times a day in boracic acid water, and sprinkle powdered boracic acid on it.

Lieut. Avata used this remedy in camp and the happy results he secured are even more to be remarked. Hitherto when erysipelas cases were treated by when erysipelas cases were treated by other methods they showed an average of 8.7 days of fever and 30.4 days in the hospital and the patients were always descharged after redness, swelling and desquamation were gone. Since the treatment with collodion has been intitated the average days of fever are only 3½ days and only 15 days in the hospital. Certainly a 50 per cent reduction in the severity, duration and discomfort of this debilitating and dangerous disease is, to be colloquial, "going some."

Method of Application.

Method of Application.

The method is to paint liquid collodion with a camel's hair brush an inch in advance of the margin of the erysipelas infection. The border of the affected area is usually visible as a thick, hardened edge. The collodion strip an inch wide is painted over repeatedly until it shrinks and tightens the skin under it is a deeply wrinkled, unbroken furrow. Dally the cracks and breaks are to be repaired by additional applications of collodion.





"Indefinite leave" has no time limit attached thereto, and may extend for tached thereto, and may extend months or an indefinite period. The military authorities reserve the right to cancel either of the above it circumstances warrant them in doing so. Indefinite leave is granted by the authorities at Ottawa, and is also canceled by military headquarters at Ottawo. Provisional leave is granted locally by district headquarters.


