





One of the editors of the work, Julius Elias, tells a story which illustrates Ibsen's attitude on this ques-A young dramatist came to him and begged him to read his play. "Show me first the plan," said Ibsen.

"There is no plan," answered the author proudly. "I wrote it from scene to scene, following my inspiration. Ibsen thereupon refused to read the play, declaring that a writer who did not make an orderly plan of his drama did not know what drama was, and could not possibly write it.

The preliminary sketch of "Nora, put on paper in Rome on Oct. 19, 1878, shows how clearly the figure of Nora

and her history stood out before Ibsen before he had written a line of the play, of the moral of which he says: "There are two kinds of spiritual laws, two kinds of conscience, one for men, and quite a different one for women. They do not agree; but in practical life the woman is judged according to the law of the man, as if she were not a woman, but a man. A woman cannot be true to herself in our modern society, which is an exclusively male society, with laws written by men and with accusers and judges who regard women's action from man's point of view."

The various junior clubs throughout the province have, no doubt, been figuring on the material for their teams for the coming winter, and have been counting on all available players up to the maximum age limit, so that a change in the rule, as suggested, would alter all their plans, besides keeping a number of players out of the game. 

THE MONO-RAIL CAR SHOWS OFF WELL

Demonstration of Gyroscopic Principle.

London, Nov. 11.-The new mono-rail railway which works on the principle of shillings a day, and Mr. Graham said here in model form some eighteen months ago, before the Royal Society by its inventor, Louis Rrennan, C. B., received its first public demonstration on a full tionary from the standpoint of transportation as that which aeroplanes have furnished in the last two years They saw a car 40 feet long, 10 feet wide and 13 feet high, weighing 22 tons, mounted on a single rail, running freely about curves of all sorts and angles and carrying forty passengers with safety as complete and vibration far less than the rdinary passenger car.

The vehicle runs in a circle an eighth of a mile in circumference at a speed of 25 miles an hour, with 80-horsepower, without the slightest tendency to leave the rail. Two gyroscopes, weighing three-quarters of a ton each, automatiearly supply perfect stability. The rail closely resembles the ordinary one exot that the top is somewhat curved and the rims of the wheels correspond to this curve. The gyroscopes make 3,000 revolutions a minute. The motive power is entirely self contained in a petrol engine which is used to drive the engine dynam**o**


