

An almost priceless series of painted An almost priceless series of painted wooden Egyptian models, discovered by Mr. John Garstang, B.Litt., F.S.A., at Beni-Hasan, are on view at the rooms of the Society of Arts in Burlington House. Mr. Garstang spent last winter in opening an extensive necropolis dating from the Middle Empire (2,300 B.C.), and has excavated remarkable evidences of the industrial and domestic life of that period.

The necropolis dates from the time of the highest civilization in Egypt, but, although entombed before mummification a high art, the bodies were in became a high art, the bodies were in a remarkable state of preservation, and on the coffins were models depicting the everyday life of 4,000 years ago.
