VESUVIUS' AWFUL WORK


PRESENT ACTIVITY OF THE VOL-CANO CAUSES RETROSPECTION.

No Record of An Eruption But a Guess Before the Days of Pompeii In A. D. 79-When Ashes Covered Europe-In 1631 Came the Deadliest Eruption of All, When 18,000 People

That the present activity of Vesuvius is of a most serious character is proved conclusively by the destruction of the observatory. This lighthouse of of the observatory. This lighthouse of science has been perched near the vol-cano for more than half a century, and in that time has given warning of many an eruption, besides collecting an enormous mass of information conan enormous mass or information con-cerning Vesuvius. In itself the panic of the inhabitants would not be evidence of a destructive flow of lava, nor would the indifference of the residents be proof of safety. That the outburst has found new channels is indicated by the destruction of the observatory, for it was erected at a snot that scientists destruction of the observatory, for its was erected at a spot that scientists considered absolutely safe, and has lived through many terrifying eruptions. In the Days of Pompell. In the Days of Pompell.

Scientists declare that in prehistoric ages Vesuvius was an active volcano, but there is no record of an eruption till A.D. 79, when Pompell, Herculanum, and Stabiae were destroyed. Research has revealed a guess by a writer before this date to the effect that Vesuvius was volcanic, but there was

no positive proof of the mountain's danger until the eruption mentioned. The inhabitants of the doomed cities had warnings of their danger, if only they could have read the signs in 63-4, when a terrific earthquake threw down most of the buildings in Pompeli, and caused destruction in Naples.

Ashes Covered Europe.

After the terrible devastation of 79 there was a long period of calm, which was not broken until 203, when there was a second eruption. In 472 fite third outbreak occurred, and several yillages were wiped out of existence. In this eruption it is said that the ashes were carried for thousands of miles. "All Europe was covered with them," says one historian, and the people in Constantinople were terrified. Other outbreaks were recorded in 512, 685, and preass were recorded in 512, 563, and 993. In 1036 lava was observed for the first time, the destruction previously having been caused by the ashes and the poisonous gases that belched from the crater. In 1138-8 there was an eruption, and then there was no sign of activity until 1306.

The Deadliest Eruption of All. In 1500 there was a minor eruption, and then in 1631, without warning, came the deadliest eruption of all. In this year 18,000 people were destroyed by lava and water, or by the earthquake which accompanied the outburst. quake which accompanied the outburst. So terrific was the earthquake that a tidal wave was caused, and great loss of life entailed among those who had sought refuge on the water. A devastating series of waterfalls marked the eruption of 1631. The deluge was caused, partly, by the bodily upheaval of a large lake that had formed within the crater and partly by the enormous quantities of steam being precipitated on the earth as rain. A peculiar feated on the carth as rain. ted on the earth as rain. A peculiar fea-ture of the eruption was the stream of lava that it directed toward buried Herculaneum, covering part of the ruins and giving rise to the fallacious theory that lava had originally destroyed the three cities.

Millions of Tons of Lava.
The eruption of 1676 was remarkable for the perpendicular stream of lava that it shot into the air, to an incredible distance. A stream of lava four miles long and a hundred yards wide spouted forth in 1694, and in 1703 the discharge of ashes turned day to night When the Australian aborigine is pushed and can find no other game, he catches snakes for food. With his wondiscnarge of asnes turned day to hight in Naples. Again, in 1737 there was an immense discharge of lava, estimated at 300,000,000 cubic feet. On this occa-sion the vapors following the eruption proved unusually deadly. In 1760 there derful brown eyes he can see the faintest trail where a snake has zigzagged through the dry moss and leaves. At nighttime his broad nostrils take up was an eruption that overwhelmed Torre del Greco, and completed the work of the eruption of 1631. In 1766-70 there were serious eruptions, all observed by Sir William Hamilton, the British Ambassador at Naples. the chase, and, stooping down among the bushes, with a tough forked stick in his hand to support him, he follows the track as unerringly as a blood-

Deadly Eruption of 1872. More eruptions occurred in 1793-4, lasting for almost 18 months, and terrifrying the inhabitants of the plain be-low. A wall of lava a mile wide swept down the mountain in 1822, and twelve years later the Village of Caposecco was destroyed and the heat of the lava years later the vinage of caposectowas destroyed and the heat of the lava felt ten miles away. The lava almost reached Naples in 1855, and the inhabitants were again terror-stricken. In 1867 there were more eruptions, and in 1872 a fatal overflow, several fourists and students upon the mountain losing their lives in the storm of ashes. Since then there have been eruptions at intervals of a few years, none of them, fortunately, being very serious. As has been said, the observatory staff at Yesuvius, toward the maintenance of which much British money has gone, was able to collect valuable information on the supject of volcances and earthquakes. Perhaps the most important generalization from a practical point of view which can be based on the data thus collected is that eruptions are more likely to occur and are more serious. more likely to occur and are more serious when the moon is at the full, or new, and that the mild eruptions occur when the moon is in its quarters.

Men's Clothes Made of Wood.

"It will probably not be very long before we can go into one of the dry goods stores and say to a clerk, 'Let me see what you have in the line of wooden suits, says Technical World Magazine. "He may reply, 'Hard or soft?" whereupon it will be our part to specify that we want a suit of 'good' by the carding room foremen in some of the woollen mills. The material resembles a stiff, thick cloth and is apparently as durable as leather. It is not improbable that in the future cheap suits, costing about 50 cents and cheap sults, costing about 50 cents and guaranteed blast for years, will be made of spruce or pine. Napkins, shirts, collars of the finest quality, have leng been made from the fiber of hemp, and in using wood for heavier cloth the process is equally simple. The wood is first ground into a soft pulp, and this pulp is pressed through holes in iron plates. It comes out in long ropes about one-half inch in diameter. Their Work of Danger High Up In

Throughout the whole chain of the Alps there are men who make it their business to search for and root up the gentian, arnica, puffballs and other Alpine flowers.

High up in the mountains the root grubber, generally an old man, builds a little hut. He clambers precipices to the edges, where the blue flowers grow; or, if he cannot ascend, he lets himself down to their place of refuge by a rope fastened to a pine above.

He wanders to a long distance from

his hut and does not always trouble to return to it at night, finding shelter under a rock. Next morning he spreads all the roots he has collected on a rock, where they may dry.

He collects herbs as well as roots, and the resin from the pine besides.

When the summer is over and there are signs of snow, the root grubber collects all together in his little hut and finally transports the whole of his six months' collection to the valley. The arnica and some other roots used

in medicine are readily disposed of. The Trader's Insurance Co. of this city, one of the largest fire insurance companies in the west, was placed in the hands of a receiver. Byron L. Smith, president of the Northern Trust Co., was appointed receiver by Judge Julian W. Mack of the Circuit Court on petition of several directions, controlling a majority of the company's stock.
