VICTORIA.

The general situation continues to show signs of gradual improvement. The late advances in prices of staple products has had a tendency to promote business, which is also favorably affecting other lines. The success of the British Columbia Loan on the London market will, it is believed, in a measure assist in interesting capital in the natural resources of the province. The coast catches of the sealors have been disappointing to those engaged in that industry.

The great developments now going on in both Kootenay and Carrboo mining districts are creating an increased demand for merchandise of all kinds.

Washington naval oranges are about over and prices are 50c higher. Mediterranean sweets are now on the market. California lemons have advanced. SAN FRANCISCO COAU TRADE.

J. W. Harrison's San Francisco coal report dated May 2, says: During the departure of the steamer "Arawa" we have had but one arrival from the Colon ies, viz :- "Drumcraig" 2,832 tons. The total arrivals from Australia since the beginning of the year (four months) only foot up 54,640 tons, it can be readily ascertained why our yards are positively bare of this grade. This scarcity has served to make values firm for cargoes en route, particularly those nearly due, as these are some untilted contracts calling for Wallsend coal. This scarcity will be only temporary, as there are listed vessels en route and to load whose carrying capacity will amount to 84,000 tons.




