Our National Birthday.

Today marks the thirty-first milestone in the history of our Dominion. Canada's maidenhood is fast passing away, and years of maturity are in sight.

Never were Canada's prospects brighter than now. In the past her growth has never been particularly rapid. Immigrants have never crowded into our territory to the same extent as to the United States.

It is appropriate that on this the anniversary of our national birth we should pause in our hurried routine of business and spend the day in our country's honor.

The missionary address of the Rev. W. R. Foote, in St. Andrew's church on Wednesday evening was a very interesting and impressive one.

After the service an opportunity was offered to those present to meet with Mr and Mrs Foote and to personally bid them farewell.

Mr and Mrs Foote leave for their future sphere of labor early in August and will be accompanied by Mr McLeod and Dr. Grierison who will work in fellowship with them.

Yesterday Mr H. J. DeForest, the skilled New Brunswick artist, very kindly granted us an inspection of his work at Kent Lodge.

The Toronto Farming in its last issue calls attention to the fact that harness horses are in demand in Scotland and that that country is looking to America for their supply.

Manitoba has this year a round million and a half of acres in wheat, an increase of 200,000 acres over last year.

Halifax Notes.

There is much to remind us that the summer is here, although the weather for June, for the most part, has been everything else but what we should naturally expect at this season.

The first of the Saturday afternoon band concerts, at the Public Gardens, was held last Saturday.

About six o'clock last evening considerable stir was created in the city, but more particularly in Dartmouth, by the arrival in the harbor of the new ferry boat "Chebucto."

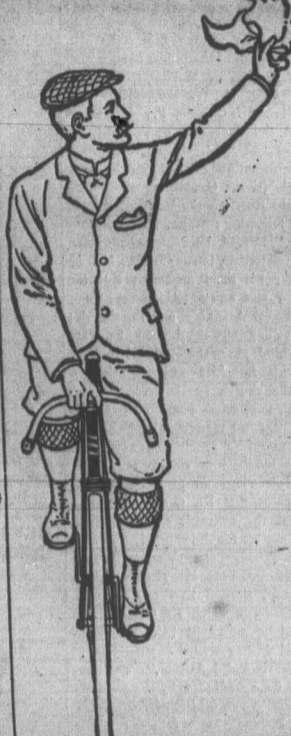
