





## Fires at Badger Brook.

## Holiday Notes for 1910.

I. C. MORRIS. CHAPTER XIII (concluded) — Bristol's Part in the Guy Celebration.

All that Bristol did was well done and her contribution to the movement is in keeping with her traditions and her history. The tablet sent out by the old city will be the attraction of many a visitor, and will be a link uniting the two extremes, and will be as lasting as the granite column upon which it is to be inserted. But Bristol did not stop half-way in its good work, nor did it allow anything like smallness to defeat its intentions—sometimes we do allow a little smallness to defeat our better selves. To be sure sure of its position, and to be directly represented, it delegated one of its citizens to attend the celebration and there and then on the spot to present its memorial. This honour fell to the lot of the Rev. William Stacy, of the Congregational Church, and right worthily did he deliver his charge to the surrounding thousands who greeted him. By a strange coincidence the reverend delegate was himself a native of Newfoundland, but for many years had resided abroad, and is now a resident of Bristol. He spoke in terms the most patriotic, and was warmly applauded by his fellow-countrymen who listened to him. He gave into the care of the President of the Newfoundland Historical Society the tablet which Bristol had sent, and as charged him, that it be looked upon as a memento of the city from which John Guy had set sail and to which he belonged. Bristol had been true to the memory of its merchant adventurer, and the trust was now being handed over by him to those who were authorised to further protect it. By a still stronger coincidence the venerable president into whose care Bristol's representative was entrusting the tablet was himself a native of Bristol. There, almost four score years ago, he had been born, there he had been trained and educated, and from there he had come to Newfoundland half a century ago. During that long period of time he had laboured incessantly as a minister of the Church of England, and as Superintendent of Education, and has been long known as the Rev. Canon Philo, D. D. Into no more fitting hands could Mr. Stacy have given the charge, and

LONDON, March 1.

The debate on the Veto Bill in the Commons continued last night. Waldorf Astor, M. P. for Plymouth, made an attractive maiden speech. Great interest was taken in the adjourned meeting of the Unionist members to discuss the reform of the Lords. The meeting was private. The Chief Whip indicated the lines of Lansdowne's Reform Bill, which the Unionists endorsed. It is understood Lansdowne's bill embodies Curzon's proposals, retaining hereditary principles to the extent of one hundred members, another hundred being elected and the remaining hundred nominated. The new House thus constituted will be of an essential conservative character, according to the Liberal ideas, and be subject to the objections against the existing House of Lords. The Cabinet, according to the Times, have commenced deliberations on the Home Rule scheme and had agreed to the retention of Irish members in the Imperial Parliament, but in reduced numbers. The Times states the Unionist meeting was very inconclusive and the Unionist leaders appear destitute of any coherent scheme for the reform of the House of Lords.

**Death of Venerable Mother Patrick Maher at Placentia.**

On Thursday, the 23rd inst., the remains of the late Venerable Mother Patrick Maher were laid to rest in the Placentia Cemetery, her death having occurred on the previous Monday after a few hours illness.

The deceased Religious had been afflicted for the past twenty-six years, with patience in suffering, her resignation to God's Holy Will during all these years were most edifying both to the Sisters of the Community and to all who had the happiness of being associated with her.

Mother Patrick had attained the old age of eighty-two years, fifty-eight of which she spent in this country, and was one of three sisters who had spent their lives in the cause of religious education in our Island. Sisters M. Joseph and Aloysius, both professed Religious in the Convent Harbor Main having predeceased her.

Mother Patrick was born in Waterford, Ireland, on the 14th of September, 1829, and came to Newfoundland in the year 1852. On her arrival at St. John's she entered the Mother House of the Presentation Order as a Postulant, Rev. Mother O'Shaughnessy being the Superior, and was professed a few years later (1855) by Right Rev. Dr. Mullock, then Bishop of St. John's. She was one of the few Religious living to-day who were present at the consecration of the Cathedral, and her recollection of the Bishops and Priests and other eminent personages who took part in that important function, and who are all passed away, was most vivid.

Her great zeal for religion and her energy in the schools at Cathedral Square commended her to Dr. Mullock as most fitting for the establishment, and in completion, of a Religious House at St. Mary's. Accordingly she was sent there, and on August 11th, 1856, opened the Convent—being its foundress. To this day her name is held in veneration by the good people of St. Mary's Parish among whom she laboured for fourteen years, assisting the venerable pastor, Rev. John Ryan (uncle of the late Dean Ryan, both now also gone to their reward) in the spread of religion and education.

Well might it be said of Venerable Mother Patrick that she was one of the pioneers of female education in this country. When our beloved, esteemed and hard-worked Archbishop sent into print his new History of the Ecclesiastical History of Newfoundland we feel sure that this fact will get a fitting recognition.

In 1874 she was transferred to Placentia as Superior of the Convent in succession to Rev. Mother Anthony Parahan. Here the best part of her religious life was spent and for twenty-four years she held office, resigning in 1897 in consequence of her failing health.

About six years ago Mother Patrick celebrated her Golden Jubilee as a Professed Sister, and was the recipient on the joyful occasion of many valuable gifts from her numerous friends, clerical and lay, as well as from the ex-pupils, many of whom children are to-day receiving instruction both religious and secular, at the same font and source, in the Convent School, where in years gone by their parents learned from the lips of the saintly Mother Patrick, those lessons of piety and Christian education which have so well fitted them for the cares and responsibilities which they are assuming to-day with such credit and honour to themselves.

The deceased Religious was greatly loved and deservedly beloved by the people of Placentia. Her bright, genial manner, even under long suffering, combined with a truly kind and sympathetic nature made her a general favourite. The Sisters of the Community to whom she was so deeply attached and who in turn loved her so devotedly, will miss her cheering presence and her wise and prudent counsel. To them she was as a devoted mother, and during the long

period of her infirmities, unable as she was to help in the work of the Community, her interest in all that pertained to their happiness and success never for a moment flagged. Never was she herself more happy than when at the evening recreation, she heard from the Sisters an account of the work of the day in the schools and the success of the children in the various classes. She was particularly interested in the "lots" of the day school; often would she have them around her in the Community room having them recite lessons, hearing them sing some little song, or going through some exercises, and the little ones left her feeling happy at the thought that they had done some thing to amuse "dear old Mother Patrick" as they fondly called her.

The deceased Religious was attended in her last moments by her old and devoted friend Monsignor Reardon, who imparted to her the consolations of Holy Religion. Her death, like her life, was calm and beautiful, the look of peace and resignation on her features was commented on by the band who who came to pay their last tribute of love and respect as she lay throughout the day and night of Wednesday in the beautiful Oratory of the Convent which was tastefully draped with mourning for the occasion.

On Thursday morning her remains were carried to the Parish Chapel where Office and High Mass were offered for the repose of her soul. The celebrant on this sad occasion was the Right Rev. Monsignor Reardon, Fr. Ashley, of Argentea, and Dr. Greene of the Cathedral, St. John's, Deacon and Sub-Deacon, respectively. After the High Mass the remains were borne to Convent Cemetery followed by the bereaved Sisters of the Convent and the whole congregation.

The funeral prayers at the grave were recited by the Monsignor and the assisting clergyman, and all that was mortal of the Venerable and beloved Mother Patrick Maher was consigned sorrowfully by loving hands to mother earth to await the Resurrection Morn.

Her name and memory will live in benediction not only in the hearts of the people of Placentia, but also in those of St. Mary's where in both places her religious life was spent.

Owing to the severity of the weather during the week others of the clergy (who otherwise would have been present) were unable to attend the obsequies of the Venerable Religious. Expressions of deep regard and sympathy with the Community had been wired to the Superiors from all parts of the Island, proving the esteem and veneration in which her name and the remembrance of her long suffering and saintly life were held.

The writer of this imperfect sketch whose privilege it has been to have known and esteemed the late Venerable Mother Patrick during the past thirty years, unites in the many heartfelt expressions of sympathy tendered the bereaved Community for the loss of this true type of Christian womanhood, their saintly Sister, the Venerable Mother Patrick. May God have mercy on her soul.—Com.



Special Evening Telegram. PORTSMOUTH, March 1.

Admiral Hon. Sir Assheton Gore Curzon-Howe, Commander in Chief, Portsmouth, since last year, died this evening at the age of 60. He was Commodore in charge of the Newfoundland Fisheries from 1893 to 1896; Commander of the Atlantic Fleet, 1905-1907, and Commander in Chief of the Mediterranean Fleet from 1908 till his appointment to Portsmouth.

Special Evening Telegram. SYDNEY, March 1.

A fire this afternoon destroyed the I. C. R. station building. The loss is \$150,000. The Dominion Steel Company, which occupied temporary quarters at the station, was again the heaviest loser, amongst the losses being valuable papers. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, March 1.

The appointment of William Lewis, a negro, resident in Boston, as Assistant Attorney General for the United States, is causing a storm of criticism to fall on the head of President Taft from the members of Congress, hailing from the Southern States, and from social and official sets in the capital.

Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, March 1.

It is reported that the German Government has enquired at Ottawa and Washington whether this country will be entitled to the benefit of the Canadian and American Reciprocity Agreement. Commercial treaty associations demand that the States grant the new minimum tariff to Germany. Washington is reminded of the provisions of the German tariff law, under which concessions to the States will be withdrawn if the existing conditions are changed to the disadvantage of Germany.

Special Evening Telegram. PESHAWAR, British India, March 1.

The notorious outlaw, Kakin Khan, who for years has been a thorn in the side of the North West frontier forces, was surprised to-day with 20 of his followers in a cave by the British forces. He refused to surrender. Machine guns thereupon halted lead into the den and the whole party, with the exception of five, were killed.

Special Evening Telegram. BRUSSELS, March 1.

Parliament to-day appointed a committee to study the feasibility of introducing an aeroplane service for the Congo.

**That Important Bill.**

Editor Evening Telegram: Dear Sir,—I should like to suggest to whoever is responsible that the spelling of the word "Esquimaux" in the Esquimaux Deportation Bill is somewhat archaic. I notice also that the word is spelt the same in the Bill for the singular and plural, which is confusing.

The word, as is well known, is derived from an Algonquin word or words, meaning "eaters of raw fish." According to an Ethnological Dictionary, which I consulted, the word was first used in Father Briand's narrative in the "Jesuit Relations" about the year 1617. I found myself, however, that our good old Hakluyt in his discourse on "Western Planting," written about 1584, uses the word and spells it "Esquimawes." His "Discourse" however, was not printed until the middle of the last century.

The word having become known from a French source, the French method of spelling was very generally adopted. But for some time past scientific writers have spelt the word "Esquimo" singular, and "Esquimos" plural, as being less clumsy and more correctly interpreting the original Indian words. I think that we should adopt the same spelling.

I should also suggest that while adding the name of the Montaignais Indians it would have been as well to have included the Nascopepe Indians, who are I think more particularly residents of our Labrador. Not that I have heard that any of these Indians have been deported since the days of Corté Real, but it is no doubt well that they should be protected.
