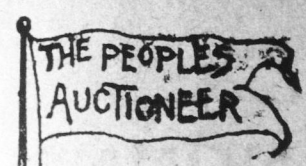

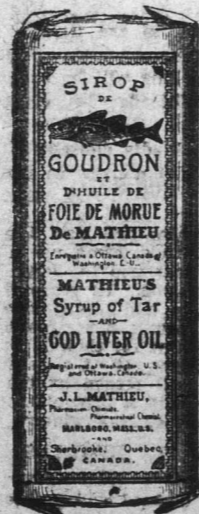

if anything; but we have yet to see  
our women go into saloons and take  
their liquor, as in Liverpool, &c.

Yes, gentlemen! "Charity begins at  
home," but I fear you are not pro-

### Give the People What They Want.

On Thursday last, the Daily News indulged in some flights of fancy about the financial side of the Branch Railway building, and we immediately asked the Government to supply some particulars as to costs, and also as to the state of the loan, in order that the people, whose name is taken in vain by the Picnic Party which misrepresents them in the House of Assembly and in the Government might know the facts.

Instead of indulging in generalities, we ask for an itemized financial statement, showing what had been spent in connection with the Bonavista Branch to-date, how much remained unpaid for work done, and we ask also an estimate of the cost of what remained to be done on this branch. We asked also for a statement of what had been paid to the contractor, and others in connection with the Trapessy Branch and the Heart's Content Branch. We ask also for an estimate of what will be left of it? How much of it is it estimated will be left by the end of the year?

There is an impression abroad that the completion of the Bonavista and Trapessy Branches will eat up the whole of the loan. Is that so? Furnish the people with particulars and let them judge for themselves.

The Daily News has already admitted that the Government is out 50 miles in its estimate of mileage and a million and a quarter of dollars in its estimate of the cost of the branches contemplated when the contract was made.

### Police Court News.

To-day a drunk was fined \$2 or 7 days. A manufacturer's agent was summoned by the police to-day for selling a brand of cider known as the "Land of Evangeline" which the police alleged to be overproof. Samples were analysed by Mr. Davidson of the Meth. College, and shown to go 21 per cent and 24. I. G. Sullivan prosecuted and Mr. W. J. Higgins defended. Accused was fined \$50 or 1 month. The case against a resident of Long's Hill for having a dangerous chimney was postponed till 3 p.m. Patrick Dunn summoned a boy named Harold Moore for cruelty to a pig owned by him. He alleges that the boy broke its leg and also otherwise cruelly treated it. Postponed until Monday.

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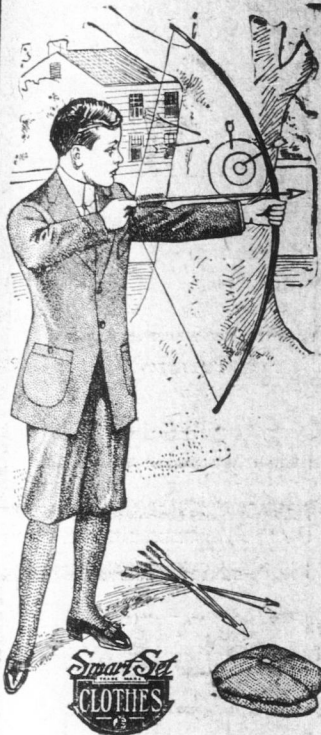

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir,—Kindly afford me space in your esteemed journal to give expression to the indignation which is felt here over the manner in which Messrs. Woodford and Murphy are allowing the Customs and Post Office to be handled. To say that this Government easily excels all former administrations in the matter of sacrificing political interests for what they deem political expediency is to put it mildly indeed.  
There never was a greater exhibition of it on this shore than that which has victimized the people of this place during the last six months. This subject has been voiced through the press on more than one occasion, but in order to be fair to the Government the situation was merely explained and a request was made for a remedy. The request has been ignored by Messrs. Woodford and Murphy, though their better conscience

must surely tell them it's an injustice to compel people to wait outside a window in all kinds of weather for their turn to post mail or receive it.  
The writer on more than one occasion has stood among a group of shivering mortals waiting for the foreign mail to be handed out while a north-easter drove the rain in through the raised window, saturating everything that was not waterproof; and yet the Government pays a man from St. John's about \$500 a year to do the letter retelling through the window.  
This is the treatment which Messrs. Woodford and Murphy mete out to their supporters in Kelligrews' and surrounding settlements. Since we cannot make matters better, we are at least free to protest. As patience has ceased to be a virtue, we are obliged to talk straight, though the truth may be bitter. There is not a voter in this section but knows that his interest in connection with these public offices is being sacrificed on behalf of a couple of political heblers here, who have always had about as much

influence over the intelligent electors of this shore as they have in settling the Chinese Revolution.  
Briefly reviewing the intolerable situation here, we are reluctantly compelled to refer to the principals in the principal causes leading up to the present disgraceful conduct of public affairs.  
In the spring election of 1909 Mr. Woodford, apparently prompted by some incomprehensible idea that a certain resident of this place had some influence over the independent electors, forthwith gave this man and family all Government jobs and patronage, such as Customs, Road Board, unloading of Government wharf material, distributing of trout fry, driver of himself and Government officials, and supplier of two inch plank for bridge flooring, etc., to the exclusion of good three inch spruce which was offered for less money.  
The first reward began by the appointment of one of the family as Deputy Returning Officer at the booth here. We next find the same person patiently waiting during the long summer for Woodford to redeem his pledge to have Mr. Hibbs dismissed and to give him the Customs position. This act served a double purpose, viz., as political reward on the one hand and a gratifying revenge on the other, because Hibbs had done his duty and collected 40 per cent. upon a suit of harness. The Customs was given him in October, and it is for the public to judge how that important branch of the public service has been carried on.  
We are next treated to a transparent ruse, when father and son almost simultaneously resign Post Office and Customs positions, and Mr. Woodford promises to merge the two into one, as it were, and give the son \$400 as salary. However public opinion was too much aroused. Very popular and qualified persons have applied, offering their services for the salary which was formerly received, viz., \$100 for each job, and it was thought advisable to let the matter rest for a while, and two men from St. John's are doing the work at a cost of only about the rate of \$1,200 per annum, thus practising the right economy which the Government are already celebrated for.  
Now we again ask to have these things added right here, and we call upon the Premier to give this important matter his attention and have one of the popular applicants ap-

pointed postmaster, so that provision be made to have a neater roof than the sky to protect people, as well as mail matter from the elements which we have to encounter at this season, and also take the Customs into town, and when another local man is appointed we hope he won't have to harass the railway agent and others help do the little Customs work for him; and please don't keep us until Mr. Murphy's friend learns telegraphy to take a Postal Telegraph office.

In conclusion we say to the Government in all earnestness, if you want our respect and good-will, then for goodness sake don't disgrace our public service by turning them into political sops for selfish heblers.

Advantages of Gas.

But the advantages of gas over the old-fashioned way of conducting domestic affairs is by no means confined to cooking. If, instead of gently pulling that magic chain, which turns on the bright incandescent light, one had first to have ordered and taken in oil, polished the pedestal of the oil lamp, cleaned the glass chimney, trimmed the wicks, filled the bowl with oil, one might cry out about the difficulty of doing the day's work, and the dreadful dearth of really reliable domestic servants. Geysers in a bathroom avoid all the disappointment of finding that the water is only tepid instead of being boiling hot, because the kitchen fire has been allowed to burn low after the cooking for the day is over. With a geyser all the trouble of stoking and building up the fire, and keeping it at a certain height are unnecessary, the match is applied to the burners is absolutely all that is needed for the attainment of a hot bath, and the water heats with great rapidity. Where there are young children, it is often of untold importance to have ready to hand the means of giving a hot bath in case of sudden illness; so this is another point in favour of substituting gas for the old method of heating, cooking &c. During the winter months gas fires also play a prominent part in lessening the labours of the housewife. It is satisfactory, after having been out for some hours, to be able, on returning home, to get all the benefit of a cheerful fire in an incredibly short space of time, without waiting whilst the wood splutters, and the coal frequently refuses to kindle. When unexpected visitors arrive, it is so easy, whilst discussing the cheering cup, to set a match to the gas fire in the drawing room, and the temperature of the apartment having risen to a desirable height, the evening can be pleasantly passed in the enjoyment of music, for it is here that the piano usually finds a home.  
By using the gas ring at the top of the cooker, a plentiful supply of hot water can be obtained for washing dishes, cloths and cloths; further, by obtaining flexible piping, the ever-useful gas-heated iron is at your service. But, it may be urged, is not all this rather an expensive item? Properly used, most decidedly No! For, without its aid, assistance in the household would be a many cases, be absolutely indispensable.  
In conclusion, it must be said that to abstain from the use of what is such an important factor in the lightest of domestic drudgery is, to say the least of it, being a penny wise and a pound foolish.

The Firemen Meet.

Last night the Firemen's Union held a special meeting, when Delegate Woods reported that Job's, Harvey's and Bowring's had agreed to the men's request for \$8 per week while on their ships, and this will be paid them immediately. The donkeymen's pay will be increased to \$85 to come into effect next month. This declaration of the liberality of the steamer owners was received with great satisfaction by the Union, and votes of thanks were accorded them as also to Supt. Engineer McGuffigan, of Bowring's, Supt. Harvey, and Capt. Delaney, ships husband with the Reid Nid. Co., who had used their good offices in the firemen's behalf. The question of non-Union men working on the Stephano was also discussed, and it was stated that the engineers preferred the local men if they would be attentive and on board promptly when ships are sailing. Men going in ships to the far North or away South will get: firemen, \$35 per month, and donkeymen, \$40.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 10. Andrew Bonar Law was appointed leader of the Unionist party to-day.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 10. The British steamer Fairport, with a crew of 30, is believed to have foundered in a gale on Dogger Bank.

Special to Evening Telegram. TRIPOLI, Nov. 10. Turkish artillery and Arab horsemen made several attacks on the Italian lines yesterday. The Italians met with some casualties, but the Arabs and Turks lost heavily.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 10. King George will start on his trip to-morrow. At a meeting of the Privy Council, held in Buckingham Palace to-day, a committee was appointed, and empowered to summon and hold councils and to despatch State business during the absence of the King.

Special to Evening Telegram. LIVERPOOL, Nov. 10. The C.P.R. liner Empress of Britain arrived here this afternoon, having been in collision with a local steamer in the Irish Sea. The Empress was little damaged, but the other vessel, which put into a harbor in the Isle of Man, is in a water-logged condition.

Special Evening Telegram. NANKING, Nov. 10. Historic Nanking is this evening the shambles of the Manchou butchers. The sun has set upon a scene of fire, rapine, desolation and butchery unrecorded in modern history. To-night 12,000 Manchou Imperial old-style soldiers hold Purple Hill, where they are entrenched, while from beneath their stronghold they are driving before them hordes of Chinese out of the city.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 10. In the lobby of the House of Commons this afternoon it was regarded as certain that Bonar Law would be unanimously elected to a caucus on Monday as Unionist leader of the Commons. The campaign in the respective camps of Chamberlain and Long developed such bitterness of feeling that it was soon evident that the election of one of them at the expense of the other would leave behind too many raw places. Both, it is understood, declared their readiness to serve under Bonar Law's leadership. Law comes from New Brunswick. He entered Parliament in 1900, and vacated a safe seat in the Dutch division of Camberwell last General Election to fight North West Manchester on the Tariff Reform platform, but was defeated. In March last he found a safe seat in Lancaster, South West division.

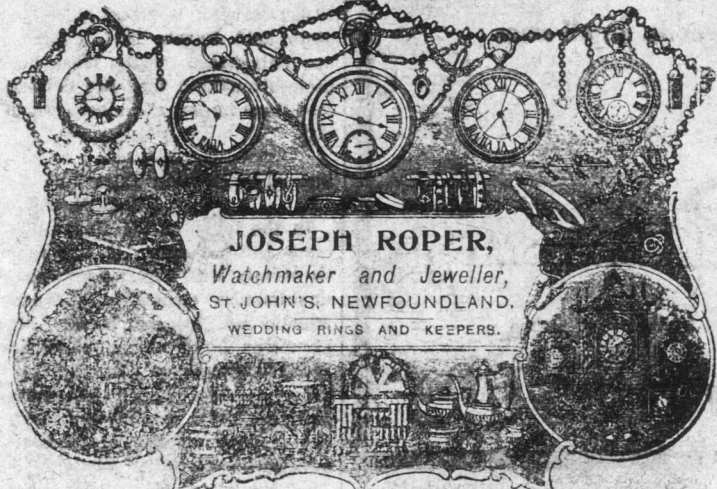
