

"Oh, uncle," said Toney, rising too, and guessing his thoughts, "where did you leave that cigar? Is it smouldering in the grave, as John Brown is







The Folk We Dread to Tell.

In almost every family there is some person whom all the others dread to tell when anything goes amiss. Once in a while it is the mother; sometimes it is a domineering son or daughter; far more often it is the head of the house.

My friend of mine fell and broke her arm. She was a middle-aged woman and was quite ill with pain and shock. Her husband was absent at the time, and she decided not to let him know about the accident until his return. The day before he was to arrive she became so frightened at the thought of telling him that her fever went up to a dangerous pitch she actually became delirious, and the nurse heard her murmur over and over again. "What will Harry say?"

Of course, the fall was entirely an accident—no one does not break one's arm on purpose. And yet the thought of telling "himself" actually frightened the poor lady into a delirium. This case is extreme but it illustrates the queerest feature of the whole matter—that it is not only the things for which they are to blame but even the most palpable accidents which the other members of the family dread to tell to the fault-finding one. The expression, in spite of all warnings, gouges a piece out of the hall paper; a neighbor's puppy digs up the newly planted flower-bed; the butcher sends up a bad piece of meat—surely for

none of these things is the mistress of the house culpable, and yet her dread of telling him about the unfortunate accident clouds over her whole day. Once upon a time there was a man who, although at heart a very kindly person, had gradually drifted into this attitude. One morning the housemaid broke an expensive vase, and as usual, his wife began to dread the terrible moment when she should have to tell HIM. She was not feeling very well and the dread wore on her nerves more than usual so that by night she was almost sick. As it happened, her husband was in a particular good humor that evening, and when she finally summoned up courage to tell him, he said very pleasantly, "Well dear, that's too bad. You always liked that vase. Do you suppose I could find another one for you?" Thereupon, his wife, who had expected an entirely different answer, actually burst into tears from sheer relief. Explanations followed, during which the husband, being a man of unusual perception, realized the attitude he had been taking, and solemnly resolved to be more reasonable in the future.

I doubt if any of these dreaded folks realize how much happiness they spoil. Oftentimes they are led into this attitude by their women folk's readiness to apologize and cringe in regard to any unfortunate happening. Tyrants of any sort, as I have often said, are partly other folks' fault.

Syndicalism and Socialism.

Mr. Keir Hardie, M. P., makes this contrast between Syndicalism and Socialism:—

Digging Up a Greek City.

(The "Christian Herald.")

Fortunately in visiting Corinth today, we can come a little nearer to the city as St. Paul saw it than if the squalid Greek village which now occupies its site were all that we could see. This indeed was almost all that could be seen a few years ago, when the American School of Archaeology undertook to lay bare some of Corinth's ancient glories. In 1896 their excavations were begun, and have been richly rewarded. It has been no easy task to dig down through layer after layer of superimposed ruins. Romans, Sicilians, Venetians, Turks, in their successive occupations had done their best to obliterate all traces of the old Corinth. They had carried off the marbles and the noble statues, and had built these stones, defaced and dishonoured, into the walls of their fortresses on their piazzas.

Going through a wicket gate which admits to the ruins, we come first to a marble-paved street which led from the market place toward the western harbor of Corinth on the Gulf. This was once flanked by colonnades and behind these on one side are the ruins of sixteen shops. It is known for a certainty that this marble-paved street and these shops belong to the first century of our era. If the water were still running we might even drink to the fountain which has also been discovered.

To the right as we face the fountain, on a low hill is the most interesting ruin of Corinth—the great temple, probably dedicated to Apollo. Originally this temple had fifteen massive columns on each side and six at each end but only seven of them are standing to-day. They are heven out of a single rock. To record the fact that each column was over twenty-three feet high, nearly six feet in diameter at the base and over four feet at the top gives but a faint idea of this magnificent temple which, in Corinth's days of splendor was probably her most conspicuous building as it is now her most magnificent ruin.

Gen. Israel Putnam

The historian Bancroft informs us that 137 years ago General Israel Putnam, American patriot, was called out of the cornfield by fate and planted on a pedestal which nobody has seen fit to tamper with since. They were about to pull off the battle of Lexington and spill a little fratricidal gore in behalf of freedom, and as they wanted somebody who could sound the tocsin with something besides resolutions of respect they sent for Israel. Few men have answered the call to arms more promptly. Israel was out in the field, testing some seed corn which he had bought of a neighbor who was long on piety and short on weights and had just discovered that he had been short changed to the extent of two bushels of Yellow Dent, when he heard the minute men tuning up the tocsin over at Lexington. A great many men in Israel's place would have said: "Why sound a tocsin which has never had a trial heat? Why sound the tocsin in Lexington, where there is no daily newspaper or long distance phone? Why stir up a tocsin with which everybody is perfectly satisfied? Let sleeping tocsins lie." But did Israel hesitate or falter? History relates that he did not. It also relates that he rode one hundred miles in one day, arriving at Lexington in a very cautious and patriotic condition, just as the tocsin went up. We have nothing personally against Mr. Bancroft, but when he tells us that Israel Putnam rode a Clydesdale chunk one hundred miles in one day, in the spring of the year, when the Connecticut roads would stall a sand hill crane, we skip the next few chapters as a token of respect to his memory. Anyway, Israel arrived at last and cast consternation into the embattled premises in a hickory shirt and overalls which had been attached in several conspicuous localities. He fought with great valor and succeeded in running a three-lined pitchfork through a number of the enemy before they realized what had taken place. For this act of bravery he was made a major-general and went without overalls until the close of the war. Just before he retired on half pay Israel broke into the high school histories by jumping off a fair sample of New England precipice, one hundred feet high, on horseback, without breaking anything but a half-pint bottle and the broad jump record. This is presumably the same horse that Mr. Bancroft speaks of in his neat little tome.

750,000 Pounds From the Sea.

We are informed that only seventy bars and one box of silver (worth a few thousand pounds) now remain in the liner Oceana, which sank off Eastbourne with £750,000 worth of bullion. When the last of the silver is recovered an attempt will be made to save some ivory, and, possibly, some of the mails.

The wreck, however, is dangerous to navigation, and Trinity House will probably take immediate steps for its removal.—D. M.

New Commander

Jos. Coulaud of Montmaguy, has been appointed captain of the Canadian government steamer Arctic, which will leave in a few days for Hudson Bay, where she will make soundings for the Canadian hydrographic service. He replaces Captain J. E. Bernier of Polar fame, and was appointed pending the investigation of Bernier's alleged fur trade with Esquimaux while in command of the last Arctic expedition. George Hayes of Halifax has been appointed first officer. (Hayes is a Newfoundland, a native of Harbor Grace.)

Two coloured men, Fitz Cook, 22 years of age and Henry Webster, 24 years, were overcome by gas in their room recently and were in a precarious condition to-day at the General Hospital, whither they had been removed. The men are coal miners and came here on Sunday from Sydney. When they went to the room they blew out the gas.

GOOD BANKING FARE—The banker Kuvera arrived at Catalina yesterday with 600 qtls. off her first herring baiting. The vessel has done well.



Bleeding the People White.

Evidence is abundant on all hands of the pressure of the times on the earnings of the people. New York tells us that it is more expensive to live this June than at any time since war times. At home the Daily Mail is conducting a full inquiry on the Unrest of the Times. In Newfoundland the effect of high prices abroad is intensified by the extraordinary high rate of duties, which are largely assessed on the invoice value of the goods. This means that the Newfoundland consumer feels the pressure far more than the people of the country of production or those of the country of low duties. In the country of production the consumer is called upon to pay just the economic rise on the article. For instance, in the States and Canada this would apply largely to foods and to manufactures in Great Britain. In the country of low duties like the latter, the increase of price on foods and goods would be mainly the economic rise in price. But in a country like Newfoundland, where duties are high and mainly reckoned on invoice values, the rise in price is affected by the increase in the invoice price and by the increased payment in duty. If an article advances fifty per cent. in price in the country of production, a dollar article would advance to \$1.50. In Newfoundland among the factors going to make up the price would be the high duty. If the latter was 40 per cent. ad valorem, the invoice price and the duty would originally be \$1.40. After the rise in price, the forty per cent. would be reckoned on \$1.50 instead of \$1.00, and so the elements of prices from these factors would come to \$2.10; the importers would lose their profits on \$2.10, they are out of pocket instead of \$1.40, (disregarding all other items which go to make up the price). It follows that owing to the high duty in this case, in Newfoundland a consumer would pay instead of the 50c. rise in the States, the 50c. rise on the invoice, 20c. extra in Customs duties and the importers' profits on both. The result is therefore that the revenue booms by exacting it from the people through the extra payments of duty on the increases in invoice price.

That is why prices are bearing so heavily in Newfoundland. That is why it is so iniquitous for the Morris Government to disregard their own pledge to Reduce Taxation. They boast of overflowing revenues and they get the overflow by bleeding the people white.

LARGE INCREASE IN USE OF MOTOR BOATS.

According to information supplied Vice-President Gosling of the Board of Trade, there has been a very large increase in the use of motor boats for fishing. As there are no figures obtainable showing the catch by motor boats alone, the British Vice-Consul at Bergen could not say how far the enormous catch of codfish this year has been occasioned by their use. The number of men is much the same during the past three years, viz. about 48,000. There is a marked decrease in the number of steamers and sailing boats employed, but the increase in the use of motor boats is most marked. In Lofoden 370 were in use in 1910 as against 828 this year; in Rosedal 82 as against 1,039, and in Firmarken 1,116 in 1911 as against 1,752 this year.

Big Norwegian Catch

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According to information supplied Vice-President Gosling of the Board of Trade, there has been a very large increase in the use of motor boats for fishing. As there are no figures obtainable showing the catch by motor boats alone, the British Vice-Consul at Bergen could not say how far the enormous catch of codfish this year has been occasioned by their use. The number of men is much the same during the past three years, viz. about 48,000. There is a marked decrease in the number of steamers and sailing boats employed, but the increase in the use of motor boats is most marked. In Lofoden 370 were in use in 1910 as against 828 this year; in Rosedal 82 as against 1,039, and in Firmarken 1,116 in 1911 as against 1,752 this year.

The Ellinor Will Leave.

It is said that the surveying ship Ellinor which has been here for several months will leave for Bermuda some time in October next, and after a brief sojourn at the West Indian Island will proceed to England. During her stay in St. John's an enormous expenditure has been incurred in surveying. No sympathy or support was given by the Government, hence the ship has been ordered home by the Admiralty.

A Marine Feat.

Just 23 days ago the little schooner F. J. Morris, of only 39 tons, left here for Jamaica laden with fish by the Smith Co. Ltd. Many seamen were sceptical as to the possibility of such a small craft successfully performing such a long voyage, and the result has been a surprise to many. Vessels coming this way reported favorable winds, so that the little craft had head winds the whole time and did well. She is the smallest vessel which ever left this port on such a long voyage.



Ask for a National Strike

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
Some 200,000 transport workers will give up their jobs on all foreign and coastwise shipping which will be tied up indefinitely if Union men obey the orders of the General Council of Transport Workers' Federation which last night sent telegrams to every port in England, Scotland and Wales calling for a National Strike. The shipowners have decided to reject compromise. The terms of the Government's proposals were a general organization of employers to treat with Unions; money guarantee by both sides, as insurance against violations of agreement. The employers maintain their interests are so diverse that any organization embracing cabinet's proposals, particularly the financial feature is impracticable and set their faces strongly against giving a labor monopoly to the unions. Then the Federation's Council learned of the employers' decision, sent telegrams broadcast reading "The employers point blank refuse to accept proposals for settlement. The National Executive recommend a general stoppage at once." The country has not been thrown into a panic by the calamity which threatens, because there is generally a hope that comparatively few men will respond to the leaders' manifesto. Notes of dissatisfaction are reported in several cities. At Newcastle, one of the most important ports, Miller, leader of N. O. coast unions, said there will be no strike there. The Executive of Sailors' and Firemen's Union issued a manifesto to-night pointing out the rules of union forbidding joining in a national strike, until the members have balloted and will not take part in strike. The executive of railway (?) servants will consider question at earliest opportunity. Indications are that South Wales is disinclined to join movement and Glasgow will take a ballot. Bristol is apparently favorable.

Adela Verne Next Thursday.

The public who are so fortunate as to be present at the Grand Piano-forte Recital which will be given by the World Famous Pianist, Adela Verne, in Methodist College Hall, next Thursday evening will carry the memory of that pleasure they will have for many years.
The artist has prepared a specially interesting programme for her recital, which will include The Prelude, Fuge, and Choral by Mendelssohn. Several numbers by Chopin, "The Jugglers" by Moszkowski, "Dance Macabre" by Saint-Saens, a weird descriptive piece depicting a skeleton dance in a grave yard at midnight, the stupendous Overture to Tannhauser by Wagner-Liszt, with which she created such a sensation at her first recital, and last, but by no means least, the beautiful Sonata in F minor by Brahms. His Excellency the Governor and Lady Williams have signified their intention of being present next Thursday evening at the Recital.

Alexander Carlisle, the Belfast ship-builder, was amongst the experts who testified at the resumed Titanic inquiry. He said unqualifiedly that there were not enough boats on the Titanic, saying that he had declared so over and over again to Lord Pirrie and others. He had prepared alternative plans, arranging for four boats and two boats for each davit. The plans had been submitted to Ismay, whilst Harold Sanderson and another director of the White Star Line were present. Neither plan was utilized because the Board of Trade had insisted on an increase in the number of boats.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, June 10.
The Daily Mail has reason to be alive that, as a result of the recent conference at Malta, some arrangement will be made with reference to France sharing with Britain responsibility for the protection of British interests in the Mediterranean. It was decided that, owing to the necessity for concentrating Britain's naval strength in the North Sea, her naval and military policy in the Mediterranean must be changed and her position in these waters be strengthened. The plan proposed is still to be considered by the Imperial Defence Committee, but the Mail has reason to believe as follows: The weak squadron of four old armoured cruisers at present on duty for the British Navy in the Mediterranean will be strengthened by ships of the modern type, and some arrangements will be made with France. The exact limits of this division of responsibility does not involve any radical change in the entente between the countries, and no formal alliance is contemplated.

MORE SCARLET FEVER.—Yesterday two cases of scarlet fever were reported from a residence near the Cross Roads, one from Cabot Street, Lime Street and also a case in the Methodist Orphanage.

Mrs. Tucker says there's a silence hovering around the locality that makes a person feel the approach of a thunder storm, and when you reach the steps leading to the Chamber of Exhibits, you are at once led to believe that if you enter in you will meet death in a terrible form. No one is in sight and no friendly greeting awaits you. At the risk of never again returning to friends and kindred, Mrs. Tucker entered, feeling that she was encroaching on some sacred spot. She is a woman, however, that must take risks in order to hold her position with the public, therefore she braved the terrible silence. She pushed open the swinging door and was soon in the presence of stuffed seals, bottled fishes and ancient barges. 'Twas silent outside, but 'twas more than silent within the building; not a visitor was present. Out of the two hundred and thirty thousand inhabitants who live on the island not one save herself was present. As she moved around the spacious chamber her step resounded in such a manner that she feared herself. Soon the genial keeper hove in sight and greeted her with a kindly smile and did all in his power to make her feel at home. He appeared delighted that at least one woman had shown sufficient courage to visit the aristocratic quarters.

Mrs. Tucker says that the Museum would well repay a visit and takes this opportunity to intimate to the General Public that we have an up-to-date Museum in the city, that it is situated on Duckworth Street on the site of the old Athenaeum building. She would like it to be understood that you won't be arrested if you enter and act in a decent manner. A visit will cause your spirits to jump up, especially now when the cost of coal is so high, for she saw big samples of fine black coal in all directions. Mrs. Tucker would like to know if we knock off digging for coal in this country when we get sufficient to stock the Museum with exhibits. Coal boring, she says used to be talked of a great deal around here some years ago, but now we scarcely ever hear the name mentioned. If we have coal lying out in the wilds undisturbed, such as the samples show, Mrs. Tucker thinks Mr. Howley ought to get a gang of men with shovels to go and bring it in to town. 'Twould be a great benefit to us in here, and she says we'd get up a torchlight procession to welcome it. But on the other hand if all the coal is in the Museum, then we should give it to the poor, for 'tis only a fake inducement to drive men half mad looking for more. There's quite a lot of gold and silver samples in the Museum, so Mrs. Tucker says, and if 'tis all in the Museum it ought to be converted into hard cash and placed in the Revenue, but if there is any more out where the samples come from, she thinks we ought to be piloted to where it lies, for Mrs. Tucker says gold or silver is a very handy article to have now that the rents are gone up and the price of provisions is so high. Think it over.

Saw Husband Shoot Wife Dead

John Cummings Now on Trial at Montreal for Murder.
Montreal, June 6.—The case of John Cummings on trial for the murder of his wife last November, will probably go to the jury to-morrow.

Mrs. Donald Cameron, mother-in-law of the accused; Edwin L. Packer, a young man who was walking with Mrs. Cummings when the fatal shots were fired, and Chief Carpenter, who secured a confession from the accused, were examined at length to-day.

The afternoon session of the court, when Mrs. Cameron took the stand, was dramatic in the extreme, and Cummings, the accused was probably the only person in the court room who maintained absolute composure. Even when Mrs. Cameron shook her fist at him and cried: "May God forgive you, for I will not," and later told how her daughter had lived in fear of her husband and had on one occasion said to her, "Don't you leave the house, mother, for you will get killed as well as me, and there will be nobody to look after the children." Cummings only smiled slightly and showed no other trace of emotion. Mrs. Cameron testified that her daughter and her husband had lived together until she learned that Cummings had another wife in Scotland. The husband had left and had boarded at various places in the city. He had at times drunk heavily.

Packer at the morning session told how he had heard Mrs. Cummings express fear of her husband, and how he had escorted her from the factory where she worked on the night of the alleged murder.

Cummings appeared and fired two shots, one entering the head, and the other the back, the woman dying as a result.

13,000,000 Pounds a Year.

What Mr. Rockefeller Thinks He Has.

Since the appearance, recently, of Mr. Rockefeller in the witness-box, lawyers have been engaged in computing the present wealth of the richest man in the world, whose bland innocence and engaging desire to give information in his power have exasperated the Government investigator of the Oil Trust.

Mr. Rockefeller baffled the most searching questions aimed at elucidating how the parent company of the Standard Oil Trust maintained its control over the daughter companies since the Trust was officially dissolved.

The estimates now made in the Supreme Court's judgment have added at least £29,000,000 to the wealth of Mr. Rockefeller, whose fortune is believed to amount to £18,000,000 sterling. Mr. Rockefeller has himself confessed that he is unable to estimate within two millions the value of his possessions. His income from the Standard Oil Trust amounts to £8,000,000, and from other sources he receives annual revenues which fluctuate between three and five millions. The amount of his donations for philanthropic purposes exceeds £34,000,000.

Trick Driver Was Killed

In full view of hundreds of holiday-makers Mr. Arthur Heppell, better known as Professor Cyril, was killed on the pier deck of the West Pier, Brighton, when about to perform his customary high dive with a bicycle into the sea.

His method was to cycle down a plank about a yard wide sloping from the Pier Pavilion across the pier deck to a point over the sea, and then plunge with his bicycle into the water. Yesterday the bicycle swerved in the middle of the run.

The rider made a desperate effort to straighten it, but shot over the edge and amid cries of horror from the spectators fell head first on the deck twenty-five feet below. Death resulted from a fractured skull. He was aged thirty-five and had successfully performed for years the feat which yesterday ended tragically.—Daily Mail, May 22.

Prisoner Was Cooked Alive.

Terrible Accident Enacted Before Firemen's Eyes at Sault Ste. Marie.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., June 5.—Cooked to death in a caged west end lock-up in sight of the fire-fighters, was the fate which overcame an Austrian named Andrew Worpelski, shortly after one this morning.

The man had been put there in an intoxicated condition early in the evening to await his removal to the Central police station. Apparently he had dropped a lighted match which ignited the bed. On the arrival of the department the place was in flames, and the hapless man could plainly be seen first running about in the lock-up and then attempting to crawl under the bed as the flames got to him.

The outside door was securely locked also the inside, and the only person with a key was the night patrolman, who could not be found. The charred remains have been removed to Simpson's morgue, and an inquest will open to-night. Members of the department say it was the most horrible experience in their career. At one time Worpelski was seen to go on his knees to the firemen outside, who could not bear to look at him.

Exterminate Nova Scotia Seals, Says Captain Farquhar.

Halifax, June 7.—Capt. J. A. Farquhar, one of the best nautical authorities in Nova Scotia, writes advocating a bounty of two dollars to exterminate the seals on Sable Island and the coasts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. This is a different species of seal from that in Newfoundland.

The captain's contention is that the seal is a pest and is highly destructive to our best food fishes. He estimates that as there are 30,000 seals on the sands of Sable Island and 12,000 along the maritime provinces coasts, a bounty of \$2 would come to \$84,000 and he contends this amount would be well spent if the seals were destroyed. A seal eats, he says, twenty pounds of fish daily which amounts he figures, to a value of \$6,132,000 annually. The seal itself has no commercial or food value. Capt. Farquhar wants the government to pay such a bounty as he says is done on the United States coast.
