The Apologist.

We have much pleasure to-day presenting, what is, we presume, the official explanation of the omission to provide a guard of honor or funeral escort, for the non-commissioned officer who recently died at Jensen Camp and whose remains were taken out by train to Placentia. We are fully aware that guards have been furnished on numerous previous occasions to escort military corpses to the railway station.
