





Yesterday morning Rev. Canon Bolt was unable, owing to illness and a long absence from the country, to read a paper to the Convention on "The Study of the Bible." ed was a very helpful one. The Principal of Queen's College (Rev. N. S. Facey, M.A., LL.D.) then read a paper on "The Supply and Training of the Ministry," with special reference to the problems and needs of our own Diocese. He mentioned that the syllabus at Queen's is the same as that for the "general or dination examination," which practically all candidates in England have to take. He then referred to the supply of students, which is at present very good but uncertain. It was necessary for all Parish priests to keep before parents and youths the call to the Priesthood. Passing to the question of training, Dr. Facey thought this ought to begin as soon as a lad felt the call, even though it were during his preparation for Confirmation. Care should be taken that his education should be with a view to his making the most of his later training; an "Ordination Candidates Union" would afford the Bishop of the Diocese, the Principal of Queen's and the Priest of the Parish an opportunity of keeping in touch with, and following the career of, future ordinands. Last Day of Baby Week

Yesterday's attendance of the moth-Week, at the Star Hall, was even larger than on the opening day. Exhibits of various kinds to ensure cleanliness in handling foods, were inspected, and the model kitchen came in for particular attention. The appliances to prevent the entry of flies, for the protection of goods, and to lessen household labor were simple, ffective and inexpensive, and it is to be hoped that many of them will be adopted in the homes. At 4 o'clock Dr. Fallon gave an address on clear liness in the home and the value of preventative measures in combatting diseases. In plain language he explained the dangers incurred by exposing goods to contamination, by neglecting to observe simple rules of deanliness, and stressed the importance of fresh air and sunlight in the homes. He illustrated his points by references to the precautionary methods taken in the Army and in the Canal Zone to guard against diseases, and in referring to the dangers of tuberculo sis, quoted figures to show how successful had been in recent years the preventative measures taken to com-

bat the disease. Mr. J. W. Morris then showed most instructive film dealing with milk in its various processes, its benefits as a food and its dangers, and at the conclusion Dr. Fallon explained the various illustrations. He regretted that owing to the lack of proper precautions taken in handling milk here, he could not recommend its extensive use, and urged that more effective methods should be enforced and greater care taken to guard against contamination.

> Making the Weather Clear

WHAT AN ANTICYCLONE IS.

Now that summer is approaching and outdoor pursuits are in season again, the weather forecasts given in vireless are receiving more attention han usual. The technical terms that

neavy lines known as isobars. The word is from the Greek, and the lines erve to join up places where the barneter is registering the same presure at the time if preparing the map. Again, the general idea of a cyclone that it is a severe hurricane, dangerous to life and property. Actually, a cyclone is an area of low pressure shaped somewhat like a cone, so that he lowest pressure is in the centre. The winds, which are not necessarily strong, blow spirally round this centre. The winds, which are not necessarify strong, blow spirally round this entre, creating an atmospheric condition similar to a whirlpool seen in

Cyclone and depression are identical terms, so that the oft-heard wireless announcement that "a depression is spreading from the Atlantic" may be taken as a hint to wear a mackintosh.

Conversely, when an anticyclone is on the way, one may not take this precaution. An anticyclone, as its name suggests, is the opposite to a cyclone; that is, it is an area of high pressure, also cone-shaped, with the highest pressure in the centre. The winds revolve round this area, so that it may be compared to an inverted whirlpool,

In the area of an anticyclone the air descends and becomes dry in the process. Radiation of warmth and cold takes place easily. 


