Entirely Mistaken.

The Leader of Monday, speaking in its wisdom, says, before giving the total votes for the four candidates for South Wellington, that "Mr Stone's absence in England" during the entire contest will account for his defeat. Some people are perfectly satisfied with the knowledge they possess. It is the easiest thing in the world for them to give a reason for either the most common occurrences, or the most extraordinary phenomena. Those who don't know different may believe the assertion made by the Leader, but we know of at least one party who won't take it down—and they are Mr Stone's own friends. That journal would perhaps be surprised to hear (and we have no doubt Mr Stone will be astonished, after his "absence in England" has been accomplished,) that no one ever entertained the faintest hopes of his being elected. Indeed if he is not possessed of a more than ordinary equitable disposition, we cannot understand how he will fail to be indignant at the insult. The Conservatives looked upon the contest as not between four candidates, but two—Messrs. Gow and Leslie. They had not the shadow of a hope that Mr Stone would defeat Mr Stirton, and they carefully and studiously avoided embracing any such delusion. What then was the position? Simply that Mr Leslie was set into harness and expected to make good time, but to give him every chance that lay within the compass of his power, they hitched Mr Stone along with him as "running mate."

Who is unvarnished and undeniable truth. The party not only did not expect to succeed in returning Mr Stone to the House of Commons, but actually insulted him, and published their own duplicity by their declarations of having no hopes for Leslie. Probably when the Government returns, and discovers what a member it had of him to trot a Tory member into the House of Assembly, we will not find it difficult to show all the gratitude he will feel for the honor that was done him.

The Knight of Kingston.

The Cobourg World truthfully says:—

We are very much disposed to question whether a political contest in any recent country has ever exhibited a more pitiable spectacle than that now being brought to light in the actions of our premier. The only thing we remember at all to be compared to it is the famous stumping tour of President Andy Johnson, about a year ago, when he "left the constitution to the people's hands," and "swung round the circle," from Washington to Chicago and all the way back. The idea of a man who occupies the distinguished and should-be dignified position of first minister of the Crown, making a hack of himself and mounting the rostrum, to tug and spout by the hour in favour of candidates whose chief recommendation is their promise to sustain him in power, is absurd in the extreme. We say nothing new of his unauthorized and pertinent interference in the elections for the legislature of Ontario, a matter with which, irrespective of the nearest description of party squabbling, he has no earthly business; but we call attention to the undignified position he occupies in thus taking to the stump in western constituencies, when he ought to be attending to the business of the country at Ottawa. The idea of a Knighted Premier fitting from house to house during a contest, hauling up voters for his favour, and at the close mounting the stump to address the crowd, whom he ought to be addressing in his heart's ease, is pitiable in whatever light it may be viewed.

Very Ungrateful.

The Advertiser is very ungrateful yesterday in its treatment of Mr Leslie. It says that he was brought out on the supposition that he would poll a large vote in Puslinch. This Mr Leslie did, and we have reason to know that this vote was nearly as large as he had promised his friends in Guelph to secure in his own township. Why should the Advertiser then berate its candidate in this unmanly way, and because he is defeated endeavor to throw the blame on his shoulders, and insult him by saying that the Conservatives made a mistake in bringing him out? Is this the kind of treatment that Mr Leslie deserves, after being dragged through the mire and dirt by the Conservative organ and its friends? If there was any deception in the matter, Mr Leslie was as much the victim of it as his supporters in Guelph, for they promised him majorities in the Town and Guelph Township, and failed to keep that promise. Even had Mr Leslie obtained all the votes they say he promised to get in Puslinch, he would still have been a long way behind his opponent. The Advertiser gets into a perfect muddle when it speaks about the majorities, and makes the ridiculous statement that Guelph township gave Mr Leslie a larger majority than Puslinch. The truth is, Mr Leslie was in a minority in both Townships.

Our cotemporary could not let the occasion pass without having its sneer at Mr Stirton. It says that as he gained his majority in Puslinch he will be known as the member for that Township. It had not the honesty or fairness to say that he also had a majority in Guelph Township. We explained yesterday the reason he was behind in the town, and every person who knows anything about the election will agree with what we said, that had the Reformers thought it necessary to concentrate their efforts on him, they could have also secured a majority for him in town.

We are greatly amused at the remark made by our cotemporary that the result of this election is no proof that the electors are unfavorable to the government. Was not the issue put clear and plain before them? Are not Messrs. Stone and Leslie out and out supporters of the Government, and are not Messrs. Stirton and Gow opposed to coalitions on principle? How foolish then it is to talk in this fashion. The coalition and the principle on which it is formed has been most emphatically condemned by the electors of South Wellington. The talk about Messrs. Stirton and Gow's success being attributable to their nationality, their personal canvass and superior organization of their friends is hardly worth noticing. Who, we would ask, began and industriously kept up the nationality cry? Who, but our opponents. And there is not the least doubt that they were as well organized, and worked as hard as the Reformers. Their defeat is not attributable to any of these causes. It was because they were trying to bolster up a bad cause, and with incompetent candidates, that they failed.

In this connection we may contradict a statement made by the Advertiser in speaking of the procession. It says that the crowd groaned when opposed Mr Stone's residence. It is not true. It also says that they gave the Herald three groans. The very opposite is the truth, for when they passed the office three cheers were proposed and given for the Herald, as being a consistent Conservative paper.—These manifestations of disapproval were reserved for the Advertiser alone, which, by its tortuous policy and base desertion from the Reform ranks, has justly earned the condemnation of every true Reformer. That's where the shoe pinches, and the Advertiser need not try and drag others into its hateful company.

The Four Powers.

Concerning the difficulties which the opponents of the government have to encounter, the *Hamilton Times* thus speaks:—

"It is now apparent that the Reform party is fighting the present contest against tremendous odds. This is not an ordinary contest between a Government and an Opposition. If we had but the one power opposed to the other, it would be a very different affair. But as it is, the Reform party has to fight the following four 'great powers':—

1. The Government.
2. The Bank of Montreal.
3. The Grand Trunk Railway Company.
4. The entire contracting, jobbing and Crown Lands speculating interest of the Dominion.

Now it is not to be denied that the Government, under a system such as ours, has a right to defend itself against the Opposition, and while elections are pending, to use its influence in every fair and legitimate way to secure the return of its own candidates. Nobody expects a government either to give or to promise its favors to opponents. If the present contest were a fair stand-up fight between the Government and the Opposition, the country might safely risk the consequences, and take them, without any grumbling. But it is notoriously nothing of the sort. The Government which ought to be strong enough by itself, if in the right, has on its side three other Powers, the influence of which can scarcely be over-estimated. Of these three powers, two are outwardly and visibly organized, while the third, the contracting and jobbing interest, is virtually so. That the three are united in favor of the present men, and against the Opposition, is an ominous fact for the people of Canada to consider."

The Princess of Wales.—A Sad Story if True.

The poor Princess of Wales, after many months of torturing confinement, without the possibility of exercise, has been ordered to the baths of Germany, as a last resort. It is to be feared that this most delicate and beautiful Princess has been crippled for life. She was too young, too fragile for the duties of her exalted station, and the burdens of maternity. Three children in less than three years exhausted her vitality, and brought on a rheumatic fever, which, scientifically treated by the best surgical skill in England, has resulted in a lameness from which she may never recover. It is a sad case. Never was beautiful Princess received more triumphantly, than this one on her marriage with the Prince of Wales. Never was the opening career of a future monarch and his bride entered upon more joyously. Now the prospect is clouded. The Prince of Wales has not the qualities which would enable him to take his place at the head of the youthful aristocracy of England. The Queen may live for forty years, and there is no seeming likelihood, either of her assuming the social position a Sovereign is expected to fill, or of abdicating the crown. The prospect of holding the awkward position of heir apparent during the long period of the probable life of her Majesty is not an enviable one. To go through life in a series of hurrahs and National Anthems a thousand times repeated, replying to thousands of Lord Mayors, laying corner stones, presiding at charity dinners, and having the duties and annoyances of royalty without its emoluments or its possible glories—all this is not a career of a very heroic or even enjoyable character. A clerkship in a government office at £300 a year seems a more desirable situation.

DICKENS COMING.—It is now pretty well settled, that Dickens is to visit America again. He will give a course of readings, and notwithstanding the manner in which he has ridiculed the Yankees in *Martin Chuzzlewit*, he is likely to be again lionized. Already the press is bedabbling him with overstrained eulogies, and piling together as many incidents of his career since he began to give readings as many a man has in a long life time. A news paper correspondent relates the following:—"Incidental to this visit, which is a private speculation of mine, Mr. Dickens will give a course of readings, which will be attended by all manner of theatrical agents and persons of an idea. A man came out here last year to hire John Bright, Spurgeon, and Dickens to give lectures. He meant to yoke them together, and get each to praise the succeeding one at every performance. Unfortunately he called first on Mr. Bright, who asked for his credentials, and finding him *minus*, then showed him the door. A Philadelphia stationer offered Mr. Dickens the sum of \$30,000 for 100 nights during this year, and a Boston manager offered him two-thirds of the gross receipts, bearing no part of the expenses. The character of *Eugene Wrayburn* in 'Our Mutual Friend' is said to have been suggested to Mr. Dickens by an American journalist of plausible address, who called upon him with such handsome offers of money for a winter's readings that the novelist was bewildered. Making inquiries, Mr. Dickens found that the man had positively no money, and no hopes of any."

It is a dangerous presumption to make innovations, if but in the circumstances of God's worship.
