district No. 1 of the health map. The report given in the words of the correspondent 'An epidemic of diphtheria commenced in this village about two weeks ago. The first case, a boy about five years of age was taken sick, Friday, Sept. 28. The next, a girl about the same age, on Thursday, Oct. 4. Both of these cases proved fatal. I saw the first case a few days after it began, pronounced it diphtheria, and advised isolation and proper care and treatment. The parents could not be made to understand the gravity of the disease and did not exercise any caution. The second case I saw four days after its beginning and found her very bad. An old woman in the village took this case out of my hands. The neighbors went out and in this house. A woman with a large family laid out the corpse, no sanitary precautions being observed. The disease has spread so rapidly that I advised the closing of the schools. It is difficult to trace the origin of this epidemic, but no doubt it is due to the introduction of the germ from the village of about 400 and unless the greatest precautions are observed the disease will probably remain endemic in the village for months. Municipal authorities are everywhere reminded that the health act gives them power to enforce isolation by law.

ARE THE MILLERS PROTECTED. To the Editor of the World. Sir: I am not a protectionist; you are, and I own I am sorry you are. I am like the proverbial old lady, of whom maybe you've heard, who was wedded to her own opinions, asked if she couldn't be convinced to the contrary. Oh, yes, she said, I can be convinced, but I would like to see the body could convince me. Even if we allow that a barrel of flour can, on the average, be got from 4 1/2 bushels of wheat, even then the Canadian miller is discriminated against to the extent of 17 1/2c per barrel, and the Yankee miller can fetch his flour here paying the duty and underselling us to that extent. True, our government does not allow you Canadian millers to import the wheat you have the bran, and if you imported the bran it would be sold at a price of twenty per cent out at val' but we don't want the bran, and your importing it is an act of loss

to ourselves, as it helps to over stock our market for that commodity, and makes our sell so much cheaper what we make from here than we could make from the States into Canada, finding it more profitable to do so than to import here.
