By this means he hopes in the spring of the year or in case of the occurrence of heavy rainfalls to get the water off the street before encreaching on the sidewalks or flooding the cellars.

In the matter of sidewalks he has found a thanken number in a very dilapidated condition, in fuct-almost past repairing. He suggests that some method be adopted whereby sidewalks in worn out and in a dangerous condition can be replaced and the expense charged to the property benefited without waiting for the usual petitions. The commissioner further recommends that the contract for next year's new sidewalks include the whole of the work, that is both laying and grading, or that the city should take upon itself the whole of the work and a price of the wor Rev. John Burton read a paper dealing with some phases of the "Anti-Poverty" question. He held that the land question was but one of many that must be solved. The nationalization of land was taught in the Mesaic Scriptures and is already recognized by English law. He pleaded that the poor should be provided with a piace for free burial.

Rev. B. J. Macdonnell took exception to the expression "the acmo of Pharisaism and the counterfelt of Ciristianity." He knew something of our charitable institutions in Toronto, and he did not think that they deserved anything akin to the language used. What they do in some cases did tend to make paupers, but he would like to know how to avoid it. Instancing the House of Industry and the Ladies' Relief Society, who relieve between them some 19,000 poor people annually, he contended that while they could not always distinguish between deserving and undeserving poor, still they accomplished a vast amount of god. He admitted that it was not fair that he should receive from four to five thousand a year while a laborer can hardly keep out of starvation, lie was ready for a redistribution to-morrow if it could be done so as to aid the poor.

Rev. Dur Hunter feared that much of the charity given produced pauperism.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.-The Department Agriculture's grain report issued to-day says: The returns of farm prices to the Department of Agriculture emphasize the year's average in production, notably by the heavy decline in in production, notably by the heavy decline in corn and large advance in wheat. Oats have slightly declined in sympathy with corn, but other small grains have advanced. The average reduction in value of corn exceeds 20 per cent, a difference not greater than the disparity in the size of the two crops. The advance in wheat from 68c last year to 22c is due less to reduction in home product than to foreign deficiency. The average price of oats is reduced from 30c last year to 28c. Barley has advanced from 52c to 59c, tyck wheat from 56c to 63c. The decline in potatoes from 68c to 40c marks the lowest average recently recorded, while the highest was 900 9 mills in 1881, when the product was only 9 mills in 1881, when the product was only 109,000,000 bushels.
