MOSE SHERER KILLED.—Destructive dogs have again been on the rampage among the sheep on the farm of Mose Sherer, near Mr. Oscar Nelly, of Hanley Mountain, on Saturday last having killed a black bull for the residence of thousands of the inhabitants of the neighboring republic delight to spend a portion of the summer months along the Atlantic shore, the shores of the Bay of Fundy, in the charming villages and fishing towns, and never cease in their praise of the delightful climate and scenery they find wherever they go, from Cape Sable or Frobisher to the Bras D'Or lakes in Cape Breton. Englishmen are beginning to find their way to our shores, drawn hither by the name our apples have obtained in London and other English markets, and the time seems near at hand when an excellent class of immigrants will be sought in the conditions of our province. Most certainly to the facilities of travel by land and sea; to the inauguration of railways and the rapid improvements in ocean steamship lines, by which both time and money have been economized almost to a minimum, while the comfort and safety of travel have been raised to a high standard. Not in historical interest wanting in the province. In this country we forced the earliest European permanent settlement in North America, though, as yet, we have not provided for the use of foreign visitors a hand-book to point out to them the places around which cluster the memories of the earliest European settlements, and this is a want that is being supplied before long, for we have it on the word of a gentleman living in Annapolis that constant inquiries are made by travellers for information concerning the old French dominion and the succeeding English conquest, who wonder that no written record can be obtained of the events which in former days have made the district of Annapolis Royal historically famous. All this is as it should be, and somebody must prepare a condensed sketch of the history of the old town and vicinity for the use and edification of the increasing hosts of tourists from all parts of the world, and which will in the near future, turn the whole province into one vast watering place. Few of our own inhabitants are aware that there still exist very distinct remains of the old, old breast-works erected in the early days of French occupation, for the defence of the first grist-mill built in the Dominion of Canada—may the first erected in North America. These remain, though within a mile or so of the town, are still visible to the tourist, who glances at the old fort in the town, believing it to be the site of the old Annapolis in the country. This error and many another which prevails must be corrected, and the real values may be the privilege, if they desire, to become familiar with the older remains and memorials of our earliest history.

The usefulness and value of a horse depend largely upon his early training and management.

Some years ago I lived in a small town in Southern Iowa, where a correspondent wrote me that he had a horse which he was in the habit of sending to Chicago or New York for sale.

I frequently sent small sums of money with my orders, without taking a precaution to register the letters.

A Little Farm Well Tilled.—Those many of farmers are "land poor" and remain so to the end of their weary lives.
