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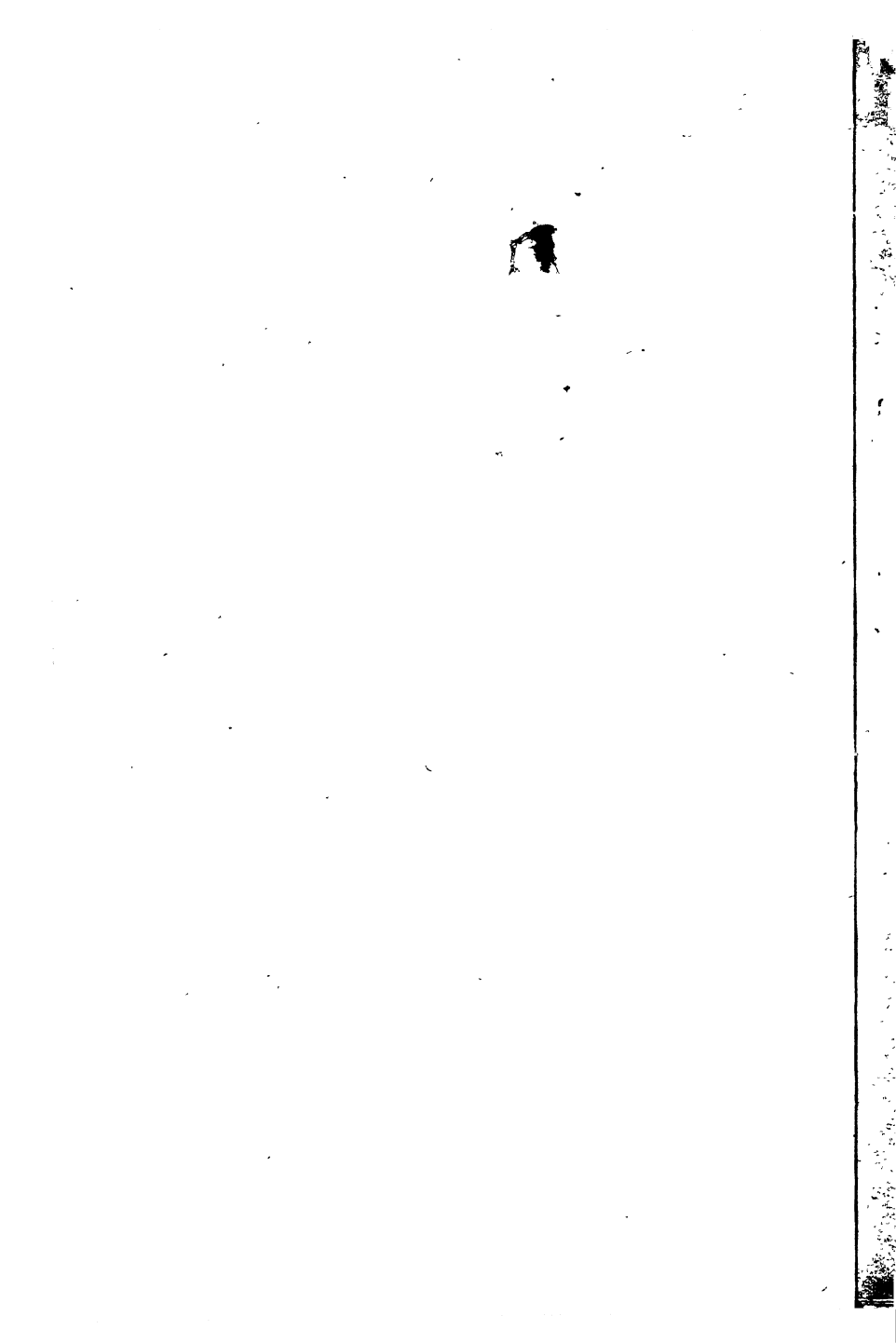

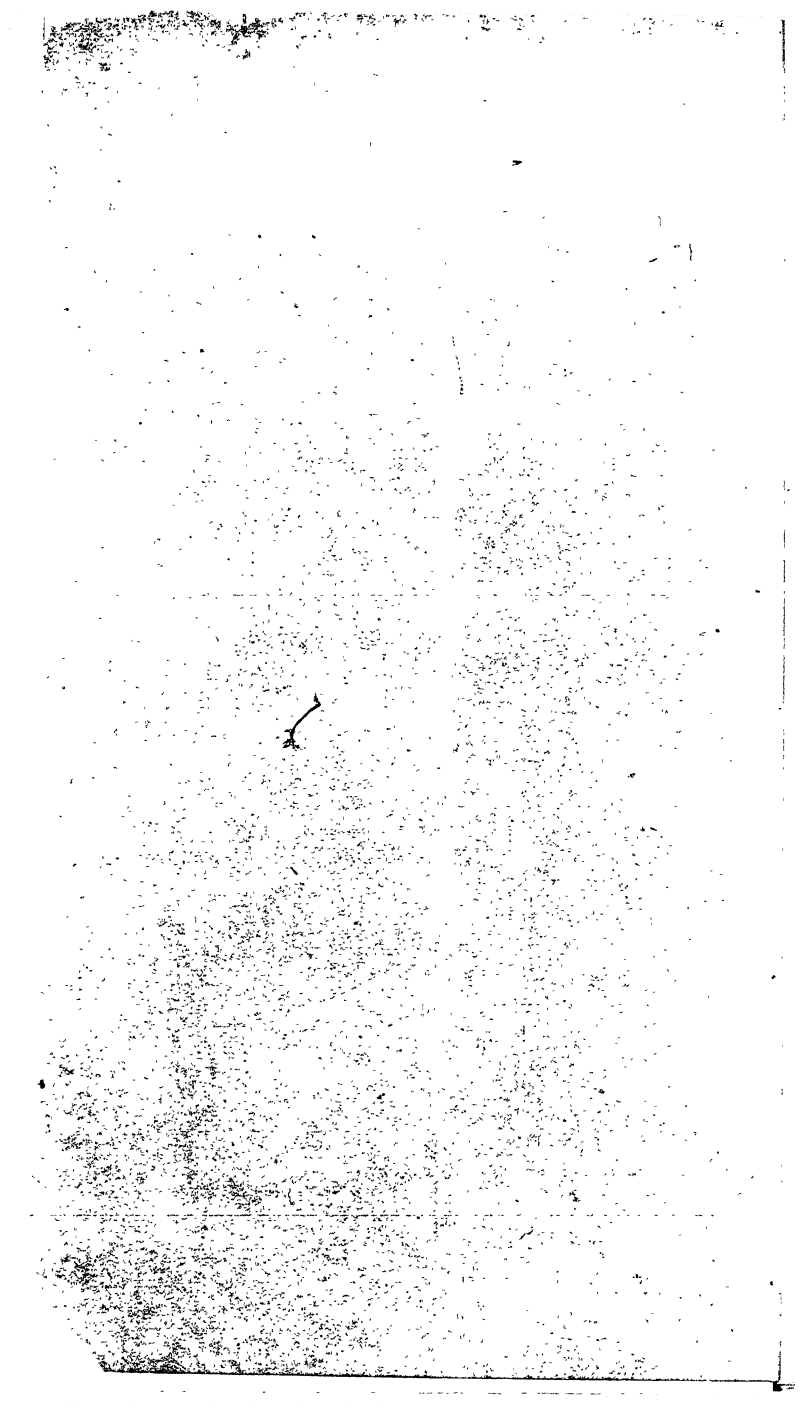

PROCEEDINGS

*Of a Public Meeting of the Contributors to the Destitute
Widows and Orphans' Fund, held in the Old City Hall,
1st May, 1848.*

Rev. Dr. McCaul, Chairman of the Managing Committee having been called to preside, and having made some explanatory observations as to the conducting of the Asylum and the objects of the meeting, and a statement of the Committee's proceedings, with an abstract of the Treasurer's account, having been submitted, the following resolutions were adopted:—

1st. Moved by Mr. Fitzgerald, seconded by Dr. Hayes—

That the statements now submitted be approved, and that a detailed Report of the affairs of the establishment, from its opening to its close, be prepared and published, under the direction of the Committee, for the information of the contributors to the charity.

2nd. Moved by G. P. Ridout, Esq., seconded by J. Mulholland, Esq.—

That it is expedient to close the Widows and Orphans' Asylum before the arrival of the emigrants of the present season, and at a period which may meet the expected requirements of the military authorities; that the necessary arrangements be made for closing the establishment on the 15th of the present month, and that such provision be made as may be found practicable, for the friendless inmates who by reason of their age or infirmities are unable to support themselves; that the moveable property in the Asylum be carefully packed, and committed for safe keeping to the charge of the Mayor and Corporation, if they will undertake the care of it, and that the fixtures be sold, and the premises restored as nearly as possible to the condition in which they were received.

3rd. Moved by Dr. Herrick, and seconded by G. P. Ridout, Esq.—

That the balance of the funds remaining in the hands of the Treasurer, after the payment of all just claims on the establishment, be placed at interest in a bank, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Widows and Orphans' Asylum, for the benefit of the widows and orphans of the last and future seasons; and that the existing Committee and Treasurer shall continue to exercise control of the funds, as at present, until otherwise directed at a public meeting of the contributors.

4th. Moved by Mr. Fitz-Gerald, and seconded by Mr. Ridout,—

That the thanks of this meeting be given to the Managing Committee for their efficient services, and that the meeting gratefully recognize the valuable assistance rendered by the Treasurer and Secretaries, whereby the interests of the institution have been so materially promoted.

5th. Moved by Mr. McCord, seconded by Mr. Howard—

That Dr. McCaul leave the chair, and Mr. Ridout be called thereto, and that the thanks of the meeting be given to Dr. McCaul, for the very efficient manner in which he has presided.

R E P O R T .

THE Committee of the Widows and Orphans' Asylum desire to commence their report of their proceedings, by the expression of humble thankfulness to the Giver of all good, that He has been pleased so abundantly to bless their efforts to carry out the benevolent intentions of the subscribers to the institution.

The Asylum, it will be remembered, was established at the close of the summer of 1847, in consequence of a resolution passed at a public meeting of the citizens of Toronto, on the 16th of July, relative to the expediency of providing a House of Refuge for the destitute and helpless emigrants' widows and orphans, at that time so numerous in the city. At that meeting a Committee was appointed for the purpose of attaining this desirable object, consisting of "Geo. Gurnett, Esq., Senior Alderman; Drs. McCaul, Connor, Herrick and Hayes; Messrs. W. A. Baldwin, J. Duggan, T. J. O'Neill, M. O'Beirne, Brett, J. Craig, and all members of the Relief Committees, together with the clergymen of all denominations."

This Committee held their first meeting on July 20th, when a Sub-Committee, consisting of John Cameron, Esq., Dr. Connor, Clarke Gamble, Esq., the Sheriff and Rev. Dr. McCaul, was appointed "to prepare a plan of operations and management," and "the said Sub-Committee was requested to have such plan ready for reporting to the Committee on Monday morning at 9 o'clock." At the meeting on that morning, it was decided that "the operations of the Society

should be confined to making temporary provision for the widows and orphans of those who die in this city;" and the plan submitted by the Sub-Committee having been approved and adopted, the following officers were appointed: the Hon. Wm. Allan, Chairman; A. T. McCord, Esq. Treasurer; E. G. O'Brien, Esq., Secretary; and Drs. McCaul and Connor, and Messrs. J. Cameron, J. S. Howard and T. J. O'Neill, members of the Managing Committee.

The Society having been organized, immediate steps were taken by the Committee for collecting funds, procuring a suitable building, and obtaining the services of a competent superintendent and matron. With reference to the first, in addition to employing a collector to solicit subscriptions and donations, they entered into communication with the Provincial Government, and with the Relief Committees. In the Treasurer's accounts a full statement will be found of the results of their measures. By the liberality of the military authorities, who placed the Bathurst Street Barracks at the disposal of the Corporation, for the purposes of the Society, the Committee were enabled to provide superior accommodation, and for a larger number, than was at first believed practicable. They were also so fortunate as to obtain the services of a Superintendent and Matron, who had the advantage of considerable experience in the management of a poorhouse in Ireland.

At the commencement of September arrangements had been so far completed, that the establishment was opened, and the number of widows and orphans admitted before the close of the month was 42. Soon after the first admission it was found necessary, in order to guard against the introduction of infectious diseases, and to ensure due care of the health of the inmates, that the daily visits of a physician should be secured, and accordingly Dr. Lucius O'Brien was

appointed Medical Attendant. The Asylum was now in efficient operation, under the constant care of the resident Superintendent and Matron, and the daily supervision of one of the members of the Committee, and of the Medical Attendant. There was, however, a want which was yet to be supplied, before the state of the Institution could be regarded as perfectly satisfactory. No means had been provided for the regular instruction of the orphans, already amounting to a very large number. At the beginning of November this want was supplied, by the appointment of a Schoolmistress, under whose charge the children were placed, and by whom they were taught reading, spelling, writing, arithmetic, sewing and knitting. The religious instruction of the orphans was also provided for, not merely by the casual visits of ministers of different denominations, but also by the regular attendance on Sundays of the Rev. Dr. McCaul, and of members of the Christian Doctrine Society. The whole establishment was now in complete working order, for, in addition to the appointment of the requisite officers of health, discipline and instruction, a code of rules had been drawn up for internal management, comprehending daily occupation, diet, and all other particulars in which it was deemed necessary or expedient to have definite instructions.

It has been already mentioned, that it was originally intended that the benefits of the Asylum should be confined to those, whose husbands or parents had died in Toronto. It was soon found, however, that the number of these was not as great as had been anticipated; and as the state of the funds, and the extent of accommodation, were sufficient for the relief of many more than those for whose benefit the Asylum was instituted, the Committee, feeling that they ought not to withhold the aid which they had the means

of affording, opened the establishment to other destitute widows and orphans who were then wandering through our streets friendless and helpless. The first extension was made in favour of those at the time in Toronto, whose husbands or parents had died at sea. This was subsequently enlarged, by including those who had died at Grosse Isle; and afterwards the right of admission was given to all the destitute widows and orphans, emigrants of 1847, who were found in the city.

In the Committee itself, also, it was found necessary to make some changes. The pressure of the duties was found so heavy on the members, that it was considered advisable to increase their number. Accordingly, in October, the following gentlemen were added:—Dr. Hayes, C. Gamble, Esq., Messrs. W. Mathers and S. Shaw, and subsequently the Hon. J. Elmsley, and W. A. Campbell, Esq.

The resignation of the Hon. Wm. Allan and E. G. O'Brien, Esq., of the offices to which they had been appointed, having rendered it necessary to commit to others the continuance of the duties which these gentlemen had so efficiently discharged, the Rev. Dr. McCaul was appointed Chairman, and J. S. Howard, Esq., Secretary.

On the benefits which have resulted from the establishment of the Asylum, it is not the intention of the Committee to enlarge. In some degree they must be apparent to every member of the community, though they cannot be fully appreciated except by those who witnessed the amount and intensity of the misery that was relieved.

They merely give here a general view of the results.

The balance at the disposal of the Committee has been deposited in Bank at a certain rate of interest, where it will be readily available for application to cases of similar distress at a future time.

Six-hundred and twenty-seven widows, children and orphans, were admitted into the Institution; and a like number disposed of, either by being provided with suitable homes, dismissed, or left without leave, for detailed statements of which the Committee refer to the subjoined appendix, which will, they trust, afford satisfactory evidence, as well of the careful application, as of the beneficial results of the bounty of their fellow-citizens.

A P P E N D I X.

1. SUPERINTENDENT'S AND MATRON'S DUTIES.

The Superintendent and Matron shall severally perform such duties as are herein set forth, together with all such other duties as the Committee of Management shall require them to execute.

Superintendent.

1st.—To attend in the Board Room of the Asylum, at such times in each week as the Committee may direct, for the purpose of receiving applications for admission, or other duties.

2nd.—To duly register the individuals admitted into the Asylum, filing all certificates of such admission; and cleansing, clothing and classifying the male inmates, according to the established regulations.

3rd.—To enforce industry, order, punctuality and cleanliness, and the observance of the several rules for the government of the inmates in general of the Asylum.

4th.—To read prayers to the inmates, before breakfast and after supper every day (or cause prayers to be read).

5th.—To cause the inmates to be inspected, and their names called over, immediately after morning prayers every day, in order that it may be seen that each individual is clean, and in a proper state.

6th.—To provide for and enforce the employment of all the male inmates capable of working, during the hours allotted for that object.

7th.—To visit the sleeping apartments daily, at the hour of *bed-time*, and to see that such apartments are duly cleaned and ventilated.

8th.—To see that the meals for the inmates are properly dressed and served, and to superintend the distribution thereof.

9th.—To say Grace before and after meals.

10th.—To see that the dining-hall tables and seats are cleaned after each meal.

11th.—To visit the rooms of the male inmates at the hour of *bed-time* every night, and see that they are in bed, and that all fires and lights are extinguished.

12th.—To apprise the medical officer in case any inmate is taken ill, and to take care that all such are provided with such medicines as the medical attendant may direct.

13th.—To take charge of the clothes and other articles of any of the inmates, and deliver an inventory thereof to the Committee of management.

14th.—To keep all books of account, or others necessary for the due conduct of the institution, which may now or hereafter be ordered by the Committee of Management; and such books shall be constantly open to the inspection of the Committee or any one of them, and be submitted at the meeting of the Committee.

15th.—At each meeting of the Committee, to submit an estimate of such provisions and other articles as will be required for the use of the Asylum, and execute the orders of the Committee thereon.

16th.—To receive all provisions and other articles purchased or procured for the use of the Asylum, and before placing them in store, to weigh, measure, examine and compare the same with the bills relating thereto; and having proved the accuracy of such bills, to authenticate the same with his signature, and submit them to the Committee at its next meeting.

17th.—To take care that the rooms, store-room, kitchen and all the utensils and furniture thereof, be kept clean and in good order.

18th.—To report to the Committee from time to time, the names of such boys and girls as it may be desirable to put out to service or other permanent employment, and take such steps for effecting the same as the Committee may direct.

19th.—To report all matters of interest or importance, as the same shall occur, to the Committee, and to keep them informed of the state of the Asylum in every department; and to offer suggestions to the Committee for the correction of abuses, and the introduction of improvements in the management of the Asylum, and generally to observe and fulfil all orders and directions of the Committee.

Matron.

1st.—To cleanse and clothe the women, girls and children, on their admission, and to place them in their proper places.

2nd.—To see that the work assigned to the women and girls, is as far as possible duly performed, within the hours prescribed.

3rd.—To visit all the rooms of the women, girls and children, at the hour of bed-time every night, and see that the inmates are in bed, and fires and lights extinguished.

4th.—To pay particular attention to the moral conduct and orderly behaviour of the female inmates; and to see that they are clean and decent in their dress and persons.

5th.—To take care of the sick inmates and young children; to see that they are clean in their persons, and to supply them with such diet, attendance and other necessaries, as the medical officer may in writing direct.

6th.—To superintend and give the necessary directions for making and mending the clothing and linen supplied for the use of the inmates and Asylum.

7th.—To see that all the inmates of the Asylum are supplied with clean linen once a week, and that the beds are kept in a clean and wholesome state.

8th.—To take charge of the linen for the use of the Asylum and inmates, and to superintend the washing and getting-up of the same.

9th.—To assist the Superintendent in the general management and superintendence of the Asylum, and especially in enforcing the observance of good order, cleanliness, punctuality, industry and decency of demeanour among the inmates; the cleansing and ventilating the sleeping apartments and all parts of the premises; the placing in store and taking charge of the provisions, clothing and other articles belonging to the Asylum.

10th.—And generally to observe and fulfil all orders of the Committee.

2. RULES FOR SCHOOL-MISTRESS.

1st. It shall be the duty of the School Mistress to take exclusive charge of the children, during the hours appointed for school, and at other times to assist the Superintendent and Matron in supervision of them.

2nd. She shall instruct them in spelling, reading, writing, ciphering, sewing and knitting.

3rd. She shall distribute them into classes, according to their proficiency, and place over each class a monitor or monitors, superintending the whole herself.

4th. She shall keep a roll, from which the names shall be called in the morning and afternoon.

5th. She shall pay particular attention to the cleanness of the children, as they answer to their names, and to their orderly conduct during school-hours.

6th. She shall maintain order and attention by such light punishments as may seem to her suitable. Should severe punishment be required, she shall report the offence to the Superintendent, who shall inflict the punishment, and make the usual entry in the book kept for that purpose.

7th. She shall submit to the Committee, at their weekly meeting, a statement of the attendance and occupation of the children during the past week, with such remarks as she may think proper to offer.

3. FORMS OF PRAYER,
To be used Morning and Evening.

Morning.

Almighty and everlasting God, the source of every blessing which we enjoy, we humbly offer unto thee our heart-felt thanks for thy merciful preservation of us during the past night. Take us, O Lord, under thy protection during the day. Bless us, we beseech thee, in our different occupations, and grant that we may feel resigned to thy heavenly will, and content with any condition in which it may be thy good pleasure to place us. Imprint upon our hearts a grateful sense of thy unmerited mercies towards us, and inspire us with the continual desire to do that which is pleasing in thy sight. Make us to love thee more and more, and to manifest in our lives that love which we ought to feel towards each other, as the children of the same merciful Father, who hath sent the Saviour for our redemption, and the Holy Spirit for our sanctification.

Hear us, O God, we implore thee, for the sake of thy Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Evening.

Most merciful God, we humbly approach thee acknowledging our manifold transgressions. We have sinned—grievously sinned—but, O Gracious Father, thou, who desirest not the death of a sinner, have mercy upon us and forgive us. Grant us such contrition and penitence of heart, as may lead us to avoid whatever is displeasing unto thee; and vouchsafe unto us the assistance of thy Holy Spirit, to guide and direct us.

We thank thee, O God, the bountiful Giver of all good, for all the mercies which we have enjoyed during the day. We bless thy holy name, for having in thy anger remembered mercy, and raised up friends to relieve us, when in thy just chastisement for our sins thou hast removed those whom thou gavest to us as our protectors and guardians.

Unto thy protection we now commit ourselves this night. Watch over us, O thou, who never slumberest or sleepest, and in thy goodness grant, that we may enjoy refreshing sleep, and rise on the morrow ready for the duties of the day. May we ever bear in mind the hour, when we shall close our eyes in the sleep of death—may we be prepared to lie down in the grave, and may it be ours, through the merits of our blessed Saviour, to wake up to a glorious resurrection.

Hear us, O God, we beseech thee, for the sake of thy Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

4. RULES FOR DAILY OCCUPATION, &C.

Five o'clock, A. M.—Bell to ring for rising.

Five to seven, A. M.—1st. Inmates to wash and dress.

2nd. Beds to be put in order.

3rd. Rooms to be cleaned.

Seven to eight, A. M.—1st. Roll to be called.

2nd. Prayers to be read.

3rd. Breakfast.

Eight to ten, A. M.—Recreation or work for boys and girls.

Ten, A. M., to half-past twelve, P. M.—School and work.

Half-past twelve to two, P. M.—Dinner, recreation and work.

Two to four, P. M.—School and work.

Four to six, P. M.—Recreation or work.

Six, P. M.—Supper.

Seven to eight, P. M.—1st. Roll to be called.

2nd. Prayers to be read.

3rd. Prepare for bed.

Half-past eight o'clock, P. M.—Lights to be extinguished.

From 1st of November to 1st of May—Rising hour, six o'clock; breakfast, eight to nine; supper five. Lights to be extinguished at half-past seven o'clock, P. M.

Visitors to be admitted between four and six o'clock.

5. RULES OF CONDUCT,

To be fairly written and hung up in the Rooms.

- 1st.—Any inmate who shall neglect to observe any of the rules of the institution applicable to him or her ;
 Or who shall make any noise when silence is ordered ;
 Or use obscene or profane language ;
 Or by word or deed insult or revile any other inmate of the Asylum ;
 Or who shall not duly cleanse his or her person ;
 Or neglect or refuse to work ;
 Or pretend sickness ;
 Or who shall wilfully waste or spoil any provisions, or stock, or tools, or materials for work ;
 Or wilfully damage any property whatsoever belonging to the institution ;
 Or disobey any of the orders of the Master, or Matron, or School Mistress, in their respective spheres of duty ; shall be deemed *disorderly*, and shall be put upon such diet as the Committee or the Visiting Members shall direct.
- 2nd.—Any inmate who shall, within seven days, repeat one of the offences, or commit more than one of the offences specified in the foregoing rule ;

Or who shall by word or deed insult or revile the Master or Matron, or any officer of the Asylum;
 Or who shall be guilty of any act of drunkenness or indecency, shall be deemed *refractory*, and shall be punished either by alteration in diet, dismissal from the Asylum, or such other mode as may be prescribed by order of the Committee or the Visiting Members.
