#### OUR SERIOUS ARTICLE.

Experience has proved to the people of New Westminster that our present mail steamers do not study the interests of our city in the smallest degree, but to the contrary, and we need not expect any better treatment from any line; of steamers that are owned in Victoria. The influence of that city has always been used against the advancement of New Westminster. Now, the question arises, what can we do to remedy these evils? We need a steamboat for he Victoria route, buit for the express purpose of coming into this port at any season of the year. At no time during the past winter would a boat thus constructed have been unable to reach us. The winter of 1862 was an exception to the rule, and even that is 23 years The steamboat we require need not be a very large one, but should be built for speed, and be able to make the trip in from 5 to 6 hours. Such a boat ought to be built for about \$20,000 The sum could surely be raised in our city for this purpose if the principal merchants take any interest in this very important matter. The Nanaimo people own a controlling interest in the Amelia, and no difficulty was experienced in raising the money. If a city smaller than ours can do this, surely we can. Another steamboat is required for the river trade. The Columbian has shown, in a leading article upon the subject, the extortionate demands made by the railway contractor; and again, any person travelling on the road in its present state, is risking his life while so-doing. The settlements up the river are all very anxious to have a steamer that will run through to That place itself wou'd bout, and as the trade would no ! do catch the right man be careful and

warrant the construction of a steamer like the Irving or Rithet, a small one nearer the size of the Reliance, would meet with ample patronage to pay good interest on the investment. Something must be done during the coming season, and what is to be done should be done quickly.
