The Merchants Bank of Canada has opened a branch office nt Sherbrouke, Que, with Mir. A. O. E. Delmege, lately accountant in the Quebee branch as Manager, Business wins commenced in the new brarich on Monday last.

Ebyamd Wablace, dealer in tens, Toronto, recenty called a mecting of his creditors and informed them that sereral judgments had been issued agninst bim. The meeting adjourned, Mc. Wallace promising to make an assignment, but he bas not done so, and the stock was adrertised to be sold by the Sheriff on the 11th instant.
The Butisn and Canadian Lumbering Company, with henduunters in Turonto, recently purchased the extensive saw mill nemr that city known as Skead's Mill. The sum paid is said to be about $\$ 100,000$. Tbe Compmay puchasthg is a strong concern; ind will whe the mill to its full capacity. The lumber shipments will probably be made by ruilroad.
A Sr. Jons, N.B., despatch stales that the liabilities of Mr. T. Sherman Pelers, of tha city, Whose failure was recently announcen, mount to about $\$ 17,000$. The assets are placed at S13. 000, including $\$ 7,000$ of book debts.-Robert Baxter, furniture dealer, Hatifax, N.S., has assigned in trust to Mr. George J. Harris, of that city.
T. J. McGinsis, hotel-keeper, Othana, who commenced sume five jeara ago, was recently sold ont under a handord's warrant. Tho rssets, it appeare, consisting of hotel fittinga and personal effects, were $9 w a l l o w e d$ up in rent and taxes. The trouble is atiributed 10 competition and his haring an olltof-the-wny slal d, together with want of capital.

Messhs. Drew \& Moren, umders and fish denlers at hiverpool, N.S., have called a meeting of creditors. They owe sume $\$ 20,000$, and it is stated that Mr. Drew offered 50 c un the dullar, securd, jmyable in six and twelve months, which the crediturs were not geverally disposed to entertait. The fint attribute tbeir dilliently to having been bunt out and

having no insurance, and to loss on shipments of fish.

the budget speech.
We have noticed with much satisfaction that the dry goods importers in Montreal, Toronto and elsewhere are agitating for the abrogation of the specific duties, which, in imitation of the United States, have been added to the ad valorem duties on several leading imports by the last tariff. The object of the merchants was not to raise any opposition to the general policy of protecting the industries of the country, but, on the assumption that the manufactures must be protected, that there should be much higher ad valorem without the addition of specific duties. The resolutions adopted by the meeting at 'loronto were as follows: "In view of "the above feeling, without wishing to "express an opinion on the question of a "protective versus a revenue tariff, this " meeting would respectfully suggest the "advisability of having, so far as possible, "a uniform ad valorem duty of 25 per "cent on all goods which have been pay"ing 20 per cent, and on which it is pro. "posed to raise the rate by adding a "specific duty." The above resolution was moved by Mr. Geo. Mchfurrich, secended by Mr, MY T. MoMaster, after
which Mr. P. M. Ryan, secondel by Mr. J. B. Smith, moved: "That.this meeting, while " not expressing any opinion on the prin"ciple of a protective against a revenue "tariff, is strongly of opinion that a uni" form ad valorem duty should be imposed "on all classes of woollèns, dry goods, and "textile fabrics, imported into the "Dominion of Canada, and that the "specific duties should bo abolished." A deputation was appointed to wait on the Finance Minister and represent the views of the meeting.

Apart altogether from the objection that we have elsewhere urger to specific duties on cottons and woollens, they are most unjust, as pressing with the greatest severity on the lowest-priced goods, which are consumed by the chasses least able to afford to pay them. When the combined duties were imposed in the United States, the competition in the market was between the comparatively cheap manufactures of Europe, and those of the United States, and they therefore had not the effect of being differential. With us it is different. The United States has been an active competitor with Great Britain in the Canadian markets ; and as British goods are cheaper than those manufactured in the United States the combined duties have the effect of discriminating against Great Britain. It cannot be said that the resolutions adopted in Toronto aro unreasonable from a Protectionist standpoint. It will be found, on reference to the proceedings of the manuacturers prior to the adoption of the present tariff, that 25 per cent was as large a pro. tection as was ever suggested. We con. fess that we have but little hope that the importing merchants will be successful during the present session, but it is most desirable that the subject should be thoroughly ventilated, and the demands are so reasonable that they must bo ultimately couceded.

## DISCRIMINATING DUTIES.

The Montreal Gazctic has administered a well-merited castigation to the Globe for its most unjust criticism on Sir Leonard Tilley's announcement of the determination of the Goverument to place a differential duty on the exports of all countries that do not admit Canadian exports on the same footing as those of the most favored nations. The Globe considers this to be pracically the same thing as a declaration of the right of Canada to negotiate her own commercial treaties. It might have been desirable to have reminded the Globe that this ques-
tion was most fully considered several years ago, and that, after discussion, the constitutionality of the imposition of such duties was fully admitted. We refer to the differential duty of 10 per cent on direct importations of tea and coffee from the United States, which was imposed to counteract a similar duty then imposed by the United States on direct importations from Canada. I'he Imperial Governinent took exception to the discriminating duty, and was at first inclined to disallow the Act.' This intention was abandoned, after the consideration of a memorandum from the Minister of Finance, slating the grounds on which the duty was imposed, and that it was not incon. sistent with treaty obligations.

We may remark here that although the United States has abrogated its diseriminatinis duty on tea and coflee, it is still maintained in Canada, The reason for this is obvious, alhough far from being satisfactory. A very large portion of the tea imported into America comes viu San Francisco, and our direct importers are protected to the extent of 10 per cent against the importers into New York and other Eastern cities, who might otherwise compete on equal terms 'for the supply of the Canadian retailers. We mre not aware of any other discriminating duty against the United States nor of my in that country against Canada. It is a penny wise and pound foolish policy at best; to set a bad example which may be invoked against us some day. We must not, however, be diverted from the subject more immediately hefore us. The Gazetle has shown clearly the true distinction between the advocates of the right to negotiate commercial treaties, and those who simply desite to enforce justice from nations which refuse it. It seems so obvious that the establisbment of discriminating duties by a colony against the Empire of which it is a part, sould be tantamount to a declaration in favor of separation that we are strongly inolined to suspect that the alvocates of what is now termed "Commercial Independence " are really in favor of revolution. As the Gazelle well puts it: "If a "treaty is not to discriminate against "Great Britain then wo have already all "the right and power necessary to its "negotiation." Canada is not in a position to interfere with the tarifls of olher countries, so long as they are not discrim. inating, and if they are diecrimintiag she has ample power to protect herself by the adoption of the retaliatory policy which Sir Leonard Tilley should have adopted four years ago, and which he has now only ventured to threaten. The Globe
has endeavored to convince our Foreign aggressors that the threats cannot be enforced.

We must not leave this subject without again noticing Sir Leonard Tilley's announcement in his budget, speech, that the Government of whose fiscal policy he is, the exponent, has it in contemplation to make an effort to establish discriminating duties against countries which bave given no kiud of provocation. We quoted in our last issue at some length from his speech, and will only at present refer to his avowed object, which is " to reduce the "duty on sugar to all countries that would "give us an equivalent by the reduction of "the duty on the manufatures and pro"ducts of Canalla." Now, we imagine that there can be no dispute as to the meaning of the foregoing language. It holds out an offer that Canada is ready to grant a preference in her markets to all countries that will grant her a preference. Now let us take a practical view of the question. We shall first deal with the British Colonies in the West Indies, about 14 in number, which have all independent revenue tariffs framed to meet their own requirements. The rates of duty on manufactures vary in all these colonies, In one the ad valorem duty is 3 per cent, in apother 5, in another 10 . And similar variations will be found in flour, fish and lumber', all being strictly revenue duties. Now let us apply a practical test to Sir Leonard Tilley's scheme. Would it be of the least advantage to the Canadian manufacturer that British Guiana, Barbados or 'l'rinidad should admit Canadian manufactures duty free if it also admitted British on the same terms? Does Sir Leonaid really beleve that Great Britain would allow the West Indian Colonies, some of which we may rematk are Crown Colonies, for whose acts the Imperial Government is responsible, to establish ditfer. ential dutien against her own manufactures?
But we have not done. Let us suppose the Canadian negotiator face to face with a representative of British Guiana. The Canadian wants a reduction of import duties and offers his equivalent, which is "to reduce the duty on sugar." But how? He will he at once asked: "are you prepared to admit the crystallized centrifugal sugars of this colony at fair revenue duties, or do you intend to exclude them in favour of the low-priced sugars of Bra. zil or elsewhere? The refiners of Canada will hardly thank Sir Lennard for propasing negotintions with sugar colonies. But let us put amother case. Suppose it were possiblo to effect a satibfactory negotiation with one of the num-
erous semi-indepentent West India Legislatures, would Sir Leonard 'Tilley subject all the others, about 14 in number, to discriminating duties, and if so, does he imagine that Great Britain woald refuse to the colonies disoriminated against, that protection against aggression which they would most assuredly demand? Canada contemplatas, julging by Sir Leonard 'Tilhey's spoech, punishing all British Cohmies by diseriminating tuties against them whach reftuse to reduce dutios, imposed on and paid by their own people for revenne purposes alone. We have purposely denlt with this question in its bearing on the group of British sugar producing colonies. But let us imagine that the immonal bargain is struck with a forelgn country, such as Spain or Brazil. It is simply absurd to imagine that the British Colonies would look quietly on and allow a British maket to be monopolized by foregners white they are rigidly pxcluded from th. Their demand ior protection agninst injustice could not be ignored. What is most extraordinary is chat in the very same speech in which Sir Leonard Jilley dechares his intention to retaliate ggatist France, he himsell avows his own intention to propose discriminating duties.

## TRADE WITII BRAZIL:

We had ocension, when treating in a late issue the subject of the trade of the Dominion, to make special reterence to the recent eflorts which have been made by the Brazilian Consul General to divert the tirade which is carried on by the Dominion with tropical countries gencrally to the Empire of Brazil. We were not then aware of the precise meaning of the appeal which was mule by him in very genoral terms, such as the assertion that the Consul had done his duty, and that it remains for the Government and people of Cumada to do theirs; that there has been a continual ery for direct foreign trade, and that the Consul hopes that those who have started this ory will put their shoulders to tho wheel and practise what they preach, etc., etc. It appears from hate information that the precise mode of stimulating the trade with Brazil which the Consul General is endeavoring to eflect is by incrensing the subsidy which has been already granted to the line of French stenmers engaged in the trate, but which, so far as we can judge, has not been successful. It has been recently proposed to grant subsidies to several new European lines, and the Brazilian Consul would like to monopolize the subsidies, and secure them all for his favored French line.

We have more than once pointel out that the trade between Canada and Brazil is quite insignificant, belug not more than about one per cent of our ageregate trade. It, moreover, is not a trade that can be forced by subsidizing steamers. In common with the British West India colonies and other tropical countries, Brazil has taken and must continue to take our codfish anil lumber, and possibly some flour, although we shall compete under a disulvantage for that trade with the Southern staports. The policy of the Canadian Govemment is inexifable. When the Commissioners specially appointed visited the 'lrnpics in 1S66, they received an assumance from the Governors of British Guiana, Trinidad, Barbadoes and Antigua, that those colonies would be prepared to defray hall the subsidy which would be required to establish steam commanication between Canada and the British West Indies. Canda at that time diclined to fultil its part, but it has recently granted to a foreign country, Brazil, what it refused to the British colonies, and it is to be feared that influences are at work that will lead to a mosi scandalous waste of the public money. We feel assured that Cumada must continue to supply the various tropical couthtries with lumber and salt fish, but as to finding a market for her manufactares in those regions, the iden is absurk. We doubt much whether either the imports or exports to and from the Tropies are likely whe carried by steamers, and we are not therefore surprised to find that the Buazilian line is not a success. What we ohject to is the attempt to bolster up an euterprize that has proved a failure by increased subsidies from the Dominion T'reasury.

## THE MONEY MARKET.

The recent advance in the value of money and consequent higher rates of interest hiss frovoked a good deat of discussion among our neighbors. There has been some anxiety manifested to get hold of the large 'l'reasury reserve for speculative purposes, but, so far, all attempts of the kind have proved fruitless. The chief cause to which the present scarcity is attributed is the demand for money in the West, where there has been a large movement of grain. There has been since the spring a considerable traffic in grain, which, owing to low prices and the henvy snowfall, had been long withheld from market. It is satid that, owing to the active foreign demand for grain, the movement has been so great as to tax to the utnost the carrying capacity of the a ahmas. Among olher causes assigned
for the recent tightness in the New York money market is that some Wall street speculators borrowed, a few weeks ago, several millions, and sent it away with the ohject of making the market more stringent. ILow far this charge may be true it is of course impossible for people at a clistance to determine; but there can be no doubt that the value of money is largely affected by the operations on the Stock Exchange, and we clonbt whether it will be found practicable to prevent its being so. Among other causes for an advance in the value of money is the resumption of specie payments in Italy. [ $t$ is eatimated that there will be si230,$000, \mathrm{CO0}$ in specie as a basis for resuming ; and although during the long suspension of spucie payments there must have been a large amount of hard money retnined in the country, yet it has been founil neces. sary to negotiate a loan of $\$ 1 \geqslant 0$, vint,10) in order to laciltate resumption, and some of this has been drawn in pol from America. l'ue Binkers' Migazine antuipates that the stringency will not latst beyond the middle of April. This Western banks are said to be under large alvances for whiskey, and are anxious for the success of the pending negotiations for its admission into Canarla. We harilly understand on what grounds any parties in the United States can expect to obtain commercial facilities from Canada.

## TARIFF DISCRIMLNATION.

The respective supporters of the Gorernment and of the Opposition seem determined to establish the truth of the old adage that figures can be made to prove anything. Mr. Patterson, the critic selected by the Opposition, proves, no doubt to the entire satisfaction of himself and of Mr. Blake, that whereas duties amounting to $\$ 10,011,811$ were exacted on goods imported from Great Britain valued at $\$ 50,597,341$, while on goods valued at $\$ 48,289,052$ imported from the United States only $\$ 5,073,912$ of duties were levied, it follows logically that there is a discrimination against Great Britain of about 5 per cent. 'The Montreal Guzetle undertakes to reply to Mr. Patterson's criticism by taking the aggregate duties in 15 is, and showing that under the old tariff there was actually a greater discrimination, viz. $7 \frac{1}{2}$ instead of 5 per cent. Nothing can well be more absurd than such a mode of using figures, the obvious intention of both parties being to mislead. In the year ending 30 th June, 1882, which is that selected by Mr. Patterson, the free goods imported from Great Britain were valued at $: 0,137,611$, while those from the

United States mere $\$ 15,347,991$. It must be apparent that the aggregate duties would amount to a larger percentage on the cuatiable goods from Great Bitain than from the United States, and that the result affords not the slightest guide whatever to the discriminative character of the tariff.

The Guzettc is equally at fault with Nr . Patterson. He has to prove his case, and to find figures to answer his purpose. He takes all datiable goods, and then he excludes breadstuffs and coal on the ground that we do not receive them from the Mother Country, and he makes out that the imports trum the United States average 29 per cent, rgainst 26 and a fraction from Great Britain. The whth is that the tariff does discriminate against Great Britain, as we have bad ocasion to point out on other occasions. The true mole of testing the question of discrimination is to select suecific articles which are im ported lrom both countries, and which therefore come into competition. Promin. ent among such articles are cotton manufactures, the leading article of British expot and of Canditian consumption. Now we have already pointed out, and now repeat the assertion, that there is a discriminating duty against Great Britain on bleached and untlearhel cotions, also on ginghamis anl plaids, also on denims, drit lines, bed-tickinge, the. Again, there are diserminating duties against $G$ reat Britain on nails and other iron manufactures. The practical effect of imposing combined $a d$ vulorem and specific duties is to discriminate auainst the country which can produce manufactured goods at the lowest rate, and this can scarcely be unknown to Sir Leonard Tilley. The discrimination will also be found in woollen goorls, and doubt less in every case in which combined duties have been imposed. 'The Gazelte must not, therelore, imagine that because Mr. Patterson failed altogether to make out the case which he unclertook to do, it is not true that the Canadian tariff discriminates against Great Britain and in favor of the United States.

## MR. BRIGELE AT GLASGOTV.

It is so long since Mr Bright has had a favorable opportunity of giing utterance to his views on public affairs that his speech on the occasion of his installation as Iold Rector of the University of Glasgow, when he was createl an LED., must have ereated a giol deal of puinje interest. Mr. Bright touched on agreal variety of subjects, including the Rovolu tiun of the United States, the French Revoluion, the American Civil War, the

Irish Question and the War with Russia, but we cannot do more than glance at his treatment of the British Coloning Empire. The population of that Empire, which he estimated at $250,000,000$, or one fifth or sixth of the whole population of the globe are, he said, now controlled and governed, directly or indirectly, by the $35,000,000$ who are inhabitants of the United King. dom of Great Britain and Ireland.
Mr. Bright then proceeded to notice the interesting speech delivered at Erlinburgh by the High Commissioner from the Dominion of Canada. There is no indication in his remarks that he entertains any donbt whatever as to Sir Alexander Galt having been a faithful exponent of the sentiments of the Government by which he has been accredited. It would be stringe, indeed, if he or any one else should entertain such doubts. The High Commissioner of Canada, in a speech delivered at the Capital of Scotland, avored himself to be favorable to a federation of the Empire, and although f'arliament has been a considerable time in session, there has been no disavowal of his sentiments on the part of the Government which he represents. Mr. Bright then assumed that it is in accordance with Canadian opinion that it is doubtful whether Canada would be pleased to oontinue in her present position, (a position by the way in which Sir Alexander Galt was instrumental in placing her); and also that it is doubtful if a bond of sentimental attachment would be suffient.

Mr. Bright proceeded to assert on Sir Alexander Galt's authority that "what "Canadians wanted was to be true part"ners, so that they could share the losses "and gains," and he added for himself; with a touch of sarcasm, which elicited cheers and laughter from his audience, "For my part I should rather prefer a " partnership in which I shared the gains, "and avoicled the losses, and that is the " partnership which now exists between "this country and the Dominion of Can"ada." Mr. Bright is perfectly correct in his description of the nature of our subsisting relations with the Mother Country, and it is inconceivable to us that any feeling of delicacy, or perhaps we should say apprehension, should prevent a repudiation of the truly absurd theory of Imperial Federation by the Dominion Government. The absurclity was well pointer out hy Mr. Bright who asisumed that Canada would expect a representation in the Imperial Parliament in numbers som where between the 60 from seotland and the 100 from Ireland, atding, "you will see at once that the proposition "on the faee of it is absolutely impracti
"cable, and could be of no service if it "were possible to carry it into execution. One thing is apparent, which is that Canada nust be held responsible before the world for the extraordinory utterances of her High Commissioner which have been tacitly assented to both by her Government and Parliament, notwithstanding the notoriely of the fact that there is hardly an individual who really shares the opinion suddenly expressed by the very eccentric High Commissioner.

After referring to the Australian colonies, and their rapid growth in wealuh and population, Mr. Bright, with reterence to the subsisting colonial connection, expressed a hope that in all time to come, be it under the sentimental attachment or be it under some other system, no accident may happen to disturb the perfect harmony and the brotherhood that exists between the Australian Eng. land and the Eugland of the United King. dom. Mr. Bright proceerted to dicuss the position of the Great Indian dependency of the Empire, and concladed with an appeal against the evil of war, and the enormous cost of the army. Lie has been repeatedly reminded that, so long as foregn nations maintain large military forces, Great Britain must provide for her security by adopting a similar policy.

## COMBINED EXPERIENUE IN FIRE

 INSURANCE."Truth is stranger than fiotion," and though it may appear extraordinary it is nove the less true that the general public, as a rule, looks upon Life Insurance from a different stand point to what it assuines towards Fire. When the combined experience of the oflices is mamed in regard to the former, people admit the wislom and reason of such experience being used as a basis for operations, but let the same argument be used respecting Fire Insurance and there is an outcry at once against what is * termed unfair monoply, atrocious extortion and so forth. What is the reason, let us ask, of this gross inconsistence, and why should the public be prepared to acknowledge that the Life Companies understand their business, yet reluse to bow to a like experience with the Fire oflices? In both cases, by protecting themselves the companies grant what the insured pays for and has a right to expect, namely, indumnity and security, A Life Company which plays the yame alone generally ends by being "euchred;" $s$, to spoak, and the same holds good in Fire Insur. ance.

There are, wo think, 'rat least two answers to the above anomaly. First, the fact that the premium on a life becomes higher each year it the policy is dropped and transferred to another company (which is not so in Fire) naturally makes an insurer doubly anxious that he should be securely fixed in the first instance, and also prevents future competition for the risk. Secondly, very few imagine they have any knowledge of Life Insurance, but you will find it extremely dificult to persuade a large proportion of the population that they aro as totally ignorant of Fire underwriting.

Replying to the first of these reasons we may say that the necessity for greater security in lifo as compared with Fire Tnsuranco is more apparent than real. It is true that if a man has insured his life for twenty years, and suddenly finds the company worthless, he is a hoavy loser, whereas in the case of Fire Insurance he simply transfers his policy to another ollice. It must not, however, be forgotien that during the currency of his Pire policy in an unsound company he was rumning the risk of losing at any moment more probably than he did by his lite policy. As to the second reason, we are aware many will tell you glibly that they know perlectly well the value of such and such risks, that lite underwriting requires littlo or no training, and no manager or ngent can buldoze them! There is much virtue in the maxim that "a litile knowlodge is a dangerous thing," especially, we may neld, when playing with fire; and wo would point out to these wiseacres that while hey may bo acquainted with one or two ratings, yet as regards the principle of Firo amberwiting they know as ittle ath they do of life, or a child just perfect in its aphabet knows of syntax.

Aller all, the combined experience of associated ollices brought to bear upon a turili is in reality merely an honest endonvor to secure fitir and equitablo rates, fillowing out the theory that "Lwo hoads are better than one." Fire Insurance hansacted at a loss---like any other business-brings, sooner or later, a misfortune to the community at large, and it is asabsurd for ansurer to fancy he is "smurt," as our Yankee friends put it, in buying cheap insurance, as that he shows his wishom in purchasing inferior Bank Bills ati a recluced rate, for though he maty escape loss in either case by good luck, he rmas a risk such as the trilling saving botween the prices he pays and what would be charged for lirst-chass securties by no means compensates him for.

As regards extortion, the bestanswer to this, so lam as Canada is concomed, is a
reference to the figures given in the Government returns, and it will be found from these that the companies rather than the public have the better right to complain. We are glad to perceive signs of the smaller companies beginning to acknowledge that there is some sound common sense contained in combined experience, and that opposition is being withdrawn to the formation of tariffs in some of the towns in Ontario. This is infinitely wiser than waiting for the more terrible lesson as taught of late in Quebeo city, and should the offices be as success; ful in establishing adequate rates in Hamilton, Oltawa and other cities needing alteration in this respect as they have lately been in London, the public will undoubtedly sliare in the benefit which will ensue.

We are convinced that rates so fixed will be according to value of the risks, both individually and generally, and that any improvements decreasing the hazard will be considered by the offices in a fair and courteous spirit, if only for the sake of their own reputation as underwiters, while there is quite a sufficient number of companies to prevent any monoply or extortion.

The associated oflices in the old country have for years insured the public under a just and moderate tariff, some years making large profits, others only small ones, and a few, as of late, none at all. but the average (which is ihe only way of lonking at a business like Fire Insurance) hats been reasonable to both vendors and purchasers, and so it would be in Canada, if Eire underwriting were placed upon a sound basis, and governed by the combined experience of those most capable of judging tho different interests iuvolved.

## C. U. SNOFDON: 00 .

The attendance at the meting of c. C. Suowdonit Co.'s creditors last Tuesday mumbered about fifty. Mr. Arehibald, of Frothingham \& Workman, was named charman. Considerable discussion followed the reading of the following general statement, several creditors requiring information as to the caluse of the deliciency shown:

The assignee explained that, althongh a system of books had been kept, no proper balance sheet had been made as fite back as 1872; there were memoranda in pencil on loose sheets for sevaral years, but not for all. That for 1877 showed a surplus capital of $\$ 60,000$, which had decreased to $\$ 18,000$ in 1879 . These were probably far approximations, but they could not be verified without lengthy investigation. There was one disigreable feature of commercial tranactions conspicuous ly its absence: the firm had not used: "accommodation "paper for its own purposes, although endorsers for other even weaker brethren. The chief interest at the meeting centred around an alleged preferentin transfer or pledge of goods to ont of the largest creditors. Another large creditor said the books showed that the aforesaid creditor's clam of $\$ 15,000$ had been secared to the extent of nearly $\$ 12,000$ through the purchase of goods to the cxtent of six or seven thousand dollars from the insolvent, and by a warelouse receipt covering over $\$ 5,000$ more. Being questioned, the insolvent said the goods bad been sold in ordinary course of business, 4 mouths or cash at 30 days, less 3 per cent. The questioner showed that pajment was due betore tho nssignment, and as the purchasers were well able to piay, it should have been collected and put into bank. Ihe fact, that the purchasing creditors buy litte or nothing in this market could not fail to be remarked. Other entries in the books during the last year or two were also a subject of notice: The ditference made by the alleged preference would make about 5 c . in the dollar, and it sice can be offered, it is probable that it will be accepted by the one or two dissenting creditors. The offer proposed at the meeting was 50 c . in $3,6,9,12,15$ and 18 months, withont interest, the last two payments secured. There is some probability that satistactory negotiations will be forthcoming and arrangements made to continne the business. The annual turn-over for the last three jears whe nbont half a million, and with such a volume of trade the losses from bad debes is notably small. If experience. energy and persomal economy avail aught, Mr. Suowton, who is yet a comparatively young man, should not despair in recovering the grompd he has lost, and to this end he has the best wishes of the editor of this jutranal. It may not be de trop to say that his brother, Mr. H. L. Soowdon. the well-known adrocate, is a creditor for about \$15,000, money advanced from time to time, and for which be holds absolutoly no security.

The National (Fire) Assurance Company of freland, having made the usual necessary deposit with the Dominion Government, has opened up business in Canada. The hend office is in Montreal. As may be seen by advertisement, Messrs. Scott \& Boult are joint agents for the Dominion. Mr. Hugh Scott will continue to reside in Toronto, where his other interests will still claim bis attention also. Mr. Louis H. Boult, who has taken up his residence in Montreal, was, it will be remembered, for several years assistant manager, and subscquently general manager of the British America Fire Assurance Co. in Toronto, and came to Canada years ago with an Euglish reputation as an underwriter. Mr. Scott, well known as an insurance man for the last quarter of $a$ century, is the associate manager of the Queen Oity Fire Insurance Co., the Gand.in- Hand, etc., and is still surrounded and supported by many of the men of sterling worth who stood beside him in his early carcer. The new company will not enter into any illegitimate competition with firsteclass companies in any part of Canada. Rstablished in 1822, the National of Ircland, with its fully sulseribed conpital of one million pounds sterling, and assets of over $\$:, 000,000$, claims to be second to noue in stability and perfect security to policyholders. Losses will be adjusted without reference to the Home Olfice.

## FRUIT PRESERVATLON.

On Tharsday last, at the Natural History Society's roons, under the auspices of the Montreal Forticultural Sociely, the Canadian Fruit Export Company (Lim.) made an exhibit of fruit that batd been preserved in its antural state. by Mr. Geo. A. Cochrine's patent cnse and nethod for a period of six months. There were twenty-five cases of varions kinds of fall and winter apples, all of which were in a most remarkable state of preservation, looking as fresh and plunap as if just taken from the tree. There were four cases of Ca: adan's famons fameuse upfies from the orchards of R. W. Shepperd, jun., Como, P. Q.; Iran T. Wotherspoon, St. Anns, P. Q. F H. Charlpbois, Pointe 'laire, PQ. and G. B. Edwards, Covey Bill, P. Q. These atracted great attention from Hiontreal Island fruit growers, who were present in goodly numbers, and were obliged to admit they wese equal to ary grown on Hontreal Island in flavor and siz:. A case each of Minden Blish and Talman Sweres from the orchard of the late thos. Carerhill, Mountain street, were particularly fine. A ense of Alexuders from the orchard of Hagh MeCall of St. Josephdu-lac, P. Q., was the greates attraction, as the apple is an early Fall variety, und its coudition at this time of year was surprising to all. There were cases of Kups, N. Spys, Greenings, Seeks, Twenty nz. Pippias, Buldwins, Blue Permain, Ben Davis, Cramberry Pippin and Swinrs from orehards in Untario, all of which were very fine specimens, when considering how poor the crop of 1882 was. The exbibition, so far as showing the benefit of enploying Mr, Cochrane's care and method of preservation, was a complete suiccess. Mr. Walter Paul, the enterprising grocer of St. Catherine St. west, bonght the entire exhibit at three dollarsar case, which is equal to seven dollars aud a half a barrel. The Cochrane case is particularly adapted for soft fruits, such as peaches, plums nind pears, which will carry any distance without buruising or injury in this case. It appears to us that this case must come into general use and favor with fruit growers and dealers, as it prevents the benyy loss now sustained from bruising and other injuries in bringing the more delicate fruits to market:

Alex. Paul, of Browusburg; Que., general storekeeper, is in tronble, and has assigned in trust. He recently negotiated a sale of hisstock, ete., at Coc on the dollat, with a view, it is alleged, of raising the wind to enable him to pry his linbilities, but these procecdings were stopped by some Slontreal creditors, who appointed an assignee to investigate the cstate. The liabilities nmonnt to $\$ 8,000$ to $\$ 10,000$. He is suid to have both secured and given credit too freely.

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## MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS. Thorsday, 12th April, 1883.

There is an improved tone and feeling pervading the matkets this week, induced largely no doubt by the more congenial, Spring-like weather. The chilly atmosphere, bowever, which manifested itself here last Saturday in a snow-storm greatly retards the breaking-up of the ice in the river and the progress of Spring operations. The country roads are reported in a wretched condition, but remithances uevertheless continue to improve, and are generally good. Bank stocks fairly active and well maintained. The market was stronger this afternoon, and closes with an advance since morning of nearly 1 per cent. for Bank of Montreal, and of $1 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. for City Gas ; the former sold at 201 regular and 1982 ex-liv., and the latter at $170 \frac{1}{2}$. See table of quotations on nother page.
Dry Goovs.-Remittanoes bave continued to improve, as has also the city and country retail trade; there have been more buyers here the past week, and with the warmer, more Springlike weather the market has assumed a brighter aspect. A quiet sorting-up trade has been done during the week, chicfly with near-by conutry fud cily customers, but not mueh injrovement is anticipated until the travellers, who start on their sorting-up teip next week, are heard from.

Damy Produce.-New Buttor is coming forward very slowly, and all receipts are being rapidly picked up by city grocers at 25 c to 28 c , and between houses it is quoted at $2 \overline{5} \mathrm{c}$. Old stock has been placed nt 210 to 23 c for fair to fine grades, but supplies were so short yester-day that even 25 c was obtained by some holders of old butter. There is no shipping demand for the best of all reasons, there are no stocks. The local Cheese market bas developed no new features; a very limited local trade continues to be done at last week's prices. Liverpool market has advanced 1 s to 713 per ewt. Lower prices all round are expected bere as suon as the new tonke of dairy produce is properly commenced.
